DEMANDS SEATS.

BASED ON SUPREME COURT  
DECISION IN ASYLUM CASES.

Made at Meeting of Board of Agriculture. Man and Woman Criminal brought to the Penitentiary for Poisoning.

RALEIGH, N. C., June 15.—At the meeting of the Board of Agriculture, attorneys R. O. Burton and Shepard made demand on behalf of J. H. Tilmer, J. R. McLelland and E. R. Aiken that they be received as members of the Board and take their seats and serve until the expiration of their terms.

This is based on the Supreme Court decision in the insane asylum cases which is claimed to precisely cover this case.

A white man and woman from Galloway county, were brought to the penitentiary today, to serve a term of ten years for poisoning the woman's former husband so that they could marry.

ASYLUM CHANGES.

Party Goes to Carteret Lodge at Newport.

Raleigh Tribune Effects Sold at Low Prices. Office Changes. Revenue Collections. Attempt Made to Oust Curator Brimley.

Raleigh, N. C., June 15.

The various changes of the faculty and employees at the Blind (white) asylum, and the Deaf, Dumb and Blind (colored) asylum, here, are very great. The principal of the Blind Asylum, Mr. Ray, was not changed but the assistant principal, Mr. Young, was removed and the office abolished. The physician was not changed. There were still more changes at the colored asylum. C. T. Baily is chairman of board succeeding B. F. Montague.

The property of the Tribune was sold yesterday in lots and then as a whole. In lots it brought only \$870 net, it was sold as a whole, and bought by Mr. A. A. Thompson for one of the banks for \$1,365. The only other bidder was Joseph Daniels of the News and Observer and C. B. Poland one of the Tribune employees. This bid will, by no means satisfy the judgments against the paper. There is still about \$1,440 left against the paper.

Two North Carolinians have received fellowships from John Hopkins University. W. A. Jones, Hillsboro; A. B. Chemistry, G. C. Lee, Chapel Hill, A. B. History.

Quite a party of gentlemen have gone to Carteret Lodge at New Port near Morehead for a weeks fishing. This is quite a resort for fishermen.

State Superintendent of public instruction, wanted to pay public school committee but the attorney general says he can find no authority for such payments.

Mr. N. J. Riddick who has been clerk of the U. S. district and circuit courts here for 31 years is to retire to make a place for J. B. Fortune. This had to be done it is said to prevent Senator Pritchard from antagonizing the appointment of Judge Furnell.

The revenue collections in this district for May were \$87,773.40 which exceed May collections for 1896 by \$2,000.

There was a semi-annual session of the new board of agriculture this afternoon at 4 o'clock. One of the plans discussed was to oust Mr. Herbert Brimley the curator of the museum and State taxidermist, and put in Hymas a brother-in-law of Pritchard. Mr. Brimley is a very accomplished man, and Hymas is no fit successor for him. One of the board it seems is in favor of abolishing every office that a competent Republican or Populist cannot be found to fill.

The car wheel works here which have been shut down for some months have resumed work. They are a branch of the great Lobdell works of Wilmington Delaware.

WILL BE OURS.

Treaty of Annexation of Hawaii Drawn Up.

WASHINGTON, June 14.—A treaty for the annexation of Hawaii to the United States will be sent to the Senate soon after the return of the President, unless present plans are altered. The treaty has been written, and all its details were fully agreed upon before the President and Secretary Sherman left for the South.

The treaty is on the general lines of the treaty negotiated during the administration of President Harrison and withdrawn by President Cleveland. It provides for annexation without the execution of the conditions on the part of Hawaii.

The United States will agree, however, to assume the debt of the present Hawaiian government, but will come into possession of all the Hawaiian possessions.

COTTON ADVANCES.

Increased Business in Liverpool Sends Prices Up.

Stocks are Less Active and Fractionally Lower. Wheat Declines on Heavy Realizing Sales. Corn Rules Firm.

COTTON.

New York, June 15.—Cotton was more active today than for some time, with the feeling decidedly bullish. Liverpool reported sales of fourteen thousand, with spot prices steady and futures 1 to 2 points higher. Our market opened at an advance of four points for both the summer and fall months, and gained 3 to 6 points for the day, closing at the highest. Although the volume of business was small, yet it was confined almost exclusively to the summer months which lead the advance. There are some reports of insects in the Southeastern belt; and in the low lands some red stocks are also reported. These, with a better foreign demand may cause a temporary bulge, when cotton will be a good sale.

STOCKS.

New York, June 15.—London cables came in this morning fractionally higher than our closing yesterday. Our market opened at an advance of about 1/2 cent, and ruled strong during the first hour, with the industrial groups in the lead. Sugar advanced to 126 1/2 but under the pressure of realizing sales quickly declined \$2, a share, but rallied one point near the close. Jersey Central was the favorite again today. The opening was unchanged, and the close showed a loss of 1/4 for the day. The grangers, under the leadership of Burlington were firm, on increased earnings for the second week in June. The general market was unsettled at the close, and we would not be surprised to see lower prices tomorrow.

CHICAGO MARKETS.

CHICAGO, June 15.—The price of wheat was practically unchanged in both the home and foreign markets, at the opening this morning, but heavy realizing in the July option was noticeable during the first hour, and a loss of one cent a bushel followed the days business. There was but very little doing in the late months, and the decline was not so great. The decrease in the visible was considerable less than was generally expected, which had a depressing influence upon prices. Corn was inclined to be firm near the close on bad reports from Kansas. Provisions were less active with prices 7 to 10 cents lower, although the underdone remains strong, and higher prices may follow.

FAVORABLE FOR CROPS.

Weekly Crop Bulletin Report for the Week Ending Monday, June 14.

RALEIGH, N. C. June 15.—The week ending Monday, June 14th, has been very favorable. Fine rains occurred the first of the week, and local showers throughout, followed by fair and much warmer weather, causing general improvement in crops. Some local damage by heavy rains, and a severe hail storm was reported at Southern Pines. Cotton is forming squares in southern portions. Laying by corn has begun. The wheat harvest is in full blast, with excellent yield.

Eastern District.—A fine, favorable week, with nice showers the first three days and much warmer weather with abundant sunshine the latter half of the week. Crops are growing nicely, are clean and have good color; and, if the
