REX HOSPITAL
Being Placed in Thorough Repair for Occupancy.

A Good Hotel Property. Bonds Sell Well. Cotton Too High. Cutting in Capital Square. Corporations Being Looked After.

JOURNAL BUREAU, RALEIGH, N. C., June 30.
Rex Hospital which for a month has been closed for repairs, will be opened tomorrow morning for patients. It is now in as thorough repair as it could be put. The board of directors are looking anxiously for the time when they can erect a handsome new hospital. As it is, all the walls of the present one are soap stone so that the hose can be turned on and they can be thoroughly washed down. The new operating rooms are completed and the furniture ordered. The Ladies Hospital aid association had agreed to pay for the tiling for the rooms and put in all necessary tables, cabinets, and some of the instruments. The Junior Hospital Association donated a handsome \$125. operating table. The ladies have the money in bank to meet their obligations which amount to a little over \$500. This has been raised in one year with only about 40 active members. Too much praise cannot be given them for this work.

The Park Hotel owned by the Page Lumber Co. of Moore county was yesterday sold to Mr. J. C. Brown of Littleton for \$27,000. It cost the former owner over \$60,000, but under bad management it has not been a paying piece of property. If the present proprietor proves to be a hustling hotel man he has fine material to make a splendid hotel. The broad airy corridors, bright cheery rooms, and a lovely situation makes it more desirable than any other hotel in the city. It is earnestly hoped Mr. R. V. Crawford the efficient Steward will retain his place, as well as Mr. J. T. Tucker the night clerk and book-keeper.

Raleigh bonds, yesterday, to the amount of \$25,000 at 5 per cent interest to mature in 1919, were sold. No bid was made for less than \$1.05 and interest. The Penn. Mutual Life Insurance Company of Philadelphia was the purchaser. This is a good showing for the credit of the city as the purchaser pays \$109.19,20 for each one hundred dollar bond.

Raleigh is being imposed upon by having the sick from other towns brought here to be put in Rex hospital. This hospital is a city hospital and not for the State except as pay patients.

The Caraleigh Cotton Mills of this city will have to close in a few weeks unless more cotton can be bought at present prices. The price of cotton goods will not justify the paying of a larger price.

The State is making requisition on the war department for supplies for the 1898 issue. Some of the requisitions are to dark blueannel shirts for the entire guard. All the supplies asked for are for service wear.

Stewart Bros. have not yet employed counsel in the suits brought against them. The agricultural department wants an accounting with them badly.

The cutting of trees in the Capital Square by the new keeper is outrageous. The severest censure is due him for the ruthless work.

At the meeting of the R. R. commission the telephone rate is to be again discussed. Today they are handling the charge of the S. A. L. track at Gaston.

The State Auditor is making an effort to get a list of all the corporations in the State, so as to secure reports of all stockholders.

The attorney general's decision that the expenses of the local aid to public school election is of the school fund to be paid out of the general and not out of the school fund is very important. It will, as before stated be fully \$30,000.

CONTROL OF TRUSTS.
An Amendment Agreed Upon by the Senate Committee.

Counterfeit Silver Certificates in Circulation. Chinese Getting Admission via Nashville. Queen Lil in the Senate. Pettigrew Recovered.

WASHINGTON, June 29.--The Republican members of the Senate Committee on Judiciary today had under consideration the form of an amendment to be submitted to the control of trusts. They practically agreed upon an amendment making it an offense punishable by fine and imprisonment for any person or corporation to monopolize or to conspire with any other person or corporation to monopolize the trade in any article protected by the tariff bill.

The amendment, when completed, will prescribe penalties and supply directions for the detection of fraud. The preparation of the amendment has been referred to a sub-committee.

The first counterfeit of the new design of silver certificates has reached the secret service bureau. It is of the \$5 denomination and bears check letter B. plate No. 4. It is a photo-lithographic production and is printed upon two pieces of paper, between which silk fibre has been distributed and then pasted together. Much of the work on the note is blurred and indistinct.

Information has reached the Treasury Department that large numbers of Chinese admitted into this country as participants in the Tennessee Exposition are clandestinely leaving Nashville for San Francisco, Sacramento, St. Louis, New York and other cities, thus evading the spirit and letter of the law authorizing their admission. A count has been made recently of the number now employed at the exposition and it has been found that 117 are missing.

Ex-Queen Liloukani, of the Hawaiian Islands, spent some time in the private gallery of the Senate today accompanied by three members of her suite. She first appeared in the Senate Marble Room and sent her card to Senator Perkins, of California, who, after exchanging a few words with her and introducing her to many of his colleagues, escorted her to the gallery, where she took a front seat and appeared to be an interested listener to the debate on lead ore.

Senator Pettigrew was on the floor of the Senate today and was congratulated by his colleagues on his speedy recovery from his recent illness.

CAUSE OF BIMETALLISM.
A Statement That France and England Have Joined the Movement.

LONDON.--The next issue of the National Review will contain an article announcing an important bimetallic development at the hands of the United States Monetary Commission, consisting of Senator Edward O. Wolcott, former Vice-President Adlai E. Stevenson, and General Charles Jackson Paine, which will arrive here in a few days. The commission, according to the National Review, will present to the British Government a joint statement from France and the United States, declaring their "desire to terminate the disastrous experiments inaugurated in 1873, and claiming our good will and active concurrence."

The National Review adds: "We are able to announce that England's reply will be that the Government is willing to reopen the Indian mints, to make a further substantial contribution to the rehabilitation of silver by extending its use to England by increasing the local tender of silver, making the silver the basis of notes, empowering the bank of England to use its silver reserve, and that material assistance and strong moral support will be given to the object of the United States and France have in view."

NO SOCIALIST COLONY.

Eugene V. Debs is Said to Have Abandoned the Scheme.
MILWAUKEE, Wis.--Victor S. Berger, editor of a Socialist organ, gave out a statement last night on his return from a conference with Eugene V. Debs.

He says the scheme to plant a Socialist colony in the West has been abandoned and to take its place there will be a small migration of unemployed men to the State of Washington.

They will look for homes there the same as other settlers and the expense of transporting them will be paid through a per capita tax of 15 cents a month on members of the Social Democracy, Debs' new party. Debs will remain in the East and he and his associates will devote themselves to the case of Socialism through this political party and the ballot.
