SUGAR BUOYANT.

Cotton Shows Signs of Advancing. Wheat Also Strong.

The Stock Market Strong all Along the Line. Foreigners Buying Wheat and Look for Higher Prices on Both Cotton and Wheat.

New York, July 13.—Sugar was again the all important feature of the market. The advance to the neighborhood of 138 breaks all previous records. We think that the top is in sight.

The other trust stocks were strong in sympathy. The legitimate market is strong on railway earnings and is going higher.

Cotton occupies a strong position, the Government crop report is now digested and the conservative houses agree with foreigners that higher prices are warranted.

Wheat is advancing on the absorption by foreigners and by the elevator people of all offerings.

The visible supply is small and we look for considerable advance and we think that the farmers will get better prices for cotton and wheat.

STILL IN SESSION.

Lively Argument Before the R. R. Commission on Rates.

Criminal Court Cases. Epworth League Convention at Toronto. Relief of Cool Weather. Case of Graham. Conductors Excursion to Norfolk.

Raleigh, N. C., July 13.

The R. R. commission is still in session hearing the different representatives of railroads, steamboats, telegraph and telephone companies.

The arguments for and against the assessments and reduction of rates before the R. R. commission yesterday were pretty snappy. There were present a very large delegation of prominent railroad men. The communications of Judge Clark and Josephus Daniels were long.

Among the cases disposed of before the Criminal court here at its present sitting was the case of ex-enrolling clerk Swinson vs. H. W. Ayer, State auditor. The auditor was given until September 1st to file his answer. Berry Cook, who killed a woman and Tom Terrell who killed John Gill will stand trial for their lives. There are 39 prisoners in jail to stand trial, and 112 cases were docketed.

The N. C. delegates to the Epworth League convention to be held at Toronto left here yesterday. There were thirty six and they were under the care of Rev. J. N. Cole of Durham. A special Epworth League Flyer from Atlanta with 400 delegates passed here.

The present pleasant weather is promised to last for several days. It is certainly a relief to have the thermometer up to only 82 degrees in comparison to the 88 degrees and 100 degrees register of last week.

In the case of J. L. Graham clerk to Superintendent of Public Instruction who was convicted of burning his home at Newton, the verdict was for "mischief" not for arson, and he was fined \$500.

A competitive examination for the Bingham scholarship will be held here August 11.

The members of the chamber of commerce are called to attend an important meeting this evening. The next meeting will be for the election of new officers.

The statement of Governor Russell before the R. R. commission was an able one, and far surpassed that of either Judge Clark or Mr. Daniels. The railroad people say that the people are not demanding an increase of valuation and reduction of rates, that the rates are now lower than in most states; and that railroad property is assessed higher than other property.

"The conductors excursion" which left here at 10:30 this morning was one of the largest that ever pulled out from here. There were about 1200 on board. It went direct to Norfolk.

Speaker Bileman and Lt. Gov. Reynolds came down to attend the Swinson suit which was stated above was continued until Sept.

Weekly Crop Bulletin.

The crop bulletin for week ending July 12th, 1897, says: "The weather during the week has generally been very favorable for the growth of crops. Over portions of 17 out of 95 counties of the State drought has continued, seriously injuring crops, but over the remainder of the State local rains were frequent, with plenty of sunshine and warm, but not excessively hot, weather. Cotton has improved remarkably; some fields are white with blooms; it is bolling well. The chief complaints about corn are its small size and bad stand in the east and lateness in the west portion of the State. Curing bottom tobacco leaves continues. Peanuts blooming and spreading; cantaloupes and watermelons are ripe; grapes are rotting to some extent.

EASTERN DISTRICT.—Drought has continued to prevail in a few counties, especially Pitt, Pender, Robeson, portions of Brunswick, Duplin and Craven, with injury to corn and gardens, but over the large portion of the district the weather during the week was very fine; warm with frequent showers, causing all crops to do well. Farmers are up with work; crops clean and growing nicely. Cotton is fine; blooming everywhere; bolling well in south; much has been laid by. Corn improved where showers fell early enough, but early corn cannot be materially improved, and the crop will be short, more rain needed. Tobacco not altogether promising, but making larger growth; lower leaves being cured. Peanuts blooming and spreading fast. Rice looks well; about laid by. Peas, sweet potatoes and melons fine. Cantaloupes and watermelons in market. Fruit generally scarce. Most farmers are done seeding peas, which are green and growing.

Latest News Items.

Beyond the strengthening of the miners' lines along the rivers, there was little change in the strike situation.

The usual celebrations in commemoration of the battle of the Boyne took place in Dublin. Twenty thousand Orangemen marched in procession and great crowds filled the streets. Every-

thing passed off in the most orderly fashion.

An important conference was held at the British foreign office between Senator Wolcott, former Vice-President Stevenson and General Paine, the members of the United States bimetallic commission, and Ambassador Hay and Lord Salisbury, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, chancellor of the exchequer, Mr. Arthur Balfour, first lord of the treasury, and Lord George Hamilton, secretary of state for India.

The last open session of the Christian Endeavorers was held on Monday in San Francisco. The attendance at the morning and afternoon meetings was large, and at night those who managed to obtain entrance to either of the main meeting places were fortunate, for only 25,000 could be accommodated and 10,000 more sought admission. Estimates made by leading business men agree that the people brought here by this great gathering will leave not less than \$1,000,000 in the city.

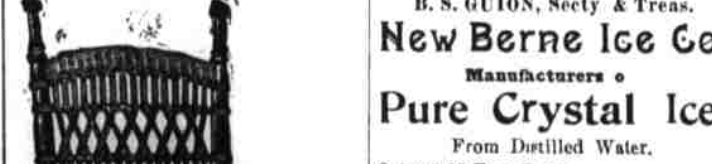
