The bulk of the government money is at the subtreasury in this city That 'bridal package' is a gay deceiver. It does contain notes to the amount of \$20,000,000, of the denomination of \$10,000 each, but they're not money, because they're not signed. So instead of baving held in their hands \$20,000,000 the happy couple have fondled simply a package that reprethe paper and the printing on it. It may be cruel to shatter this pretty delusion, but my conscience forbids me to carry the burden of its concealment any longer; hence these facts."-New York


