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RALEIGH BANKS.

Statement of Deposits of the Five Institutions.

Wants to Go to Klondyke. Reunion of Veterans at Bentonville. A New Name Suggested. Predicts Democratic Victory. Officials Back Again.

JOURNAL BUREAU, RALEIGH, N. C., July 30. The statement of the Raleigh banks show that the five have a deposit as follows: Citizens National \$414,005.79; National Bank of Raleigh, \$312,465.00; Commercial and Farmers, \$275,777.81; Raleigh Savings, \$195,559.16; and Mechanics Dime Savings, \$93,470.43, making a total of \$1,291,281.79.

There is firm belief in the Klondyke gold fields of Alaska in one man's mind here as is shown by the fact that he writes to one of the papers, and says if any one will pay his expenses to the gold fields he will divide his gold for the first six months, he is there. He is here waiting for some one to take his offer.

On August 4th there will be a big Confederate Veterans reunion at the Bentonville battle field in Johnston county. Ex-minister M. W. Ransom will deliver the address, and General R. F. Hoke who was in command at the battle will be present. A handsome monument was unveiled there two years ago.

The \$100 reward was offered yesterday by the State for the arrest of a negro rapist D. Davis alias Daniel Webb of Chowan county.

Gov. Russell has been on an inspecting tour of the State farms with Superintendent Smith of the penitentiary. Mr. Smith has put in the different positions at the penitentiary so many people from Goldsboro, that it is said the name of the prison will be soon changed to West Goldsboro.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 29.—The Navy Department has felt the evil effects of the gold cross. The firm of Moran Brothers, located at Seattle, is building the torpedo boat Rowan, and had made good progress until the Alaska expedition set in. Now they inform the Navy Department that so many of their workmen have dropped their work to go to Alaska that they are obliged to appeal to the Navy Department for an extension of time in which to complete the boat.

NO FEAR OF WAR.

The Rulers of Japan Will Not be Foolish.

The President has Continued the Civil Service Rules. Handy Made Commissioner. Must Use Foreign Dry Dock. Gold in Bolivia.

Nations do not go to war without consent of their rulers, and the rulers of the United States have the very best reasons for knowing that the rulers of Japan will not consent to go to war with the United States on account of the annexation of Hawaii, just to please the few hot-heads who think that because Japan licked China she can lick all of creation. It is because of this knowledge that European-made reports of war-like intentions on the part of Japan have attracted so little attention in Washington. The government of more than one European nation would gladly see a war between Japan and the United States, and there is little doubt that their emissaries have been at work in Japan, but there will be no war. Japan has every reason for wishing to keep on good terms with us, and none whatever for fighting us and getting badly whipped.

President McKinley made himself a place among the household gods of those government employes who are in the classified service when he amended the rules so that none of them can be dismissed except for cause, and then only after they have been given an opportunity to defend themselves, which gives every office a life tenure, if their holders do their work and behave themselves. This may not please everybody, but there is no discount about its pleasing the office holders and their families. Mr. McKinley also extended the civil service rules to the employes of 65 small Custom Houses, which were left out when President Cleveland's blanket extension of the rules was made. Then he excepted several employes in each customs district and each internal revenue district from the operations of the civil service rules, the exceptions being those who hold confidential relations with the collectors. The last will be more likely to please the practical politicians of his party than the first.

In the batch of appointments made by President McKinley just before his departure from Washington was the name of Moses P. Handy, of Ill., to be Special Commissioner for the U. S. for the Paris International Exposition of 1900. This appointment ended a contest in which an unusually large number of prominent newspaper men were interested. M. H. De Young, the well-known San Francisco editor, was Handy's rival for this place, and it was nip and tuck as to which would get it until Handy brought his persuasive tongue and his whiskers to Washington. Then Handy's stock began to rise and Mr. D. Young being in Paris was probably unaware of the turn in the game until Handy's whiskers had landed him a winner.

Orders have been issued by the Navy department to have the big battle ship Indiana sent to Halifax, Nova Scotia, to be docked and cleaned, because it was considered dangerous to try to dock her at Port Royal, S. C. Actions of this sort attract more attention from foreigners than from Americans. It looks odd to see a country that aspires to a leading place among the naval powers of the world without proper docking facilities for the vessels it has. The New York dry dock is big enough to accommodate the Indiana, but it is out of order, if indeed, it can fairly be said to have ever been in order, although it is comparatively new.

Notwithstanding the occasional outbreaks of jingoism, the people of the United States as a whole have no ill feeling towards England. There is at present in Washington an intelligent Englishman—Dr. J. H. Roberts—who thus bears witness to how Englishmen regard us: "There is no ill-will among the English people against the people of the United States, and I do not believe that the mass of citizens of this country bear an unfriendly feeling against the mother land. We have sometimes thought that certain of your jingo politicians loved to slap Britain in the face, but we do not believe that they represent the true sentiment of the American nation."

The new Bolivian minister of the United States, who arrived in Washington this week, is trying to head some of the Alaska-bound gold hunters towards his country. He says Bolivia has more gold than the Klondyke region, but the Klondyke-or-bust men are not likely to change their destination on his say so. The number of recess appointments made by President McKinley before he left Washington was out of all proportion to the expectations of the waiting and hoping crowd.

THREE MILLIONS OF GOLD.

Engaged For Export To-Day. Grain Market Continues Active. Cotton Firm.

Special to Journal. New York, July 30.—A lower foreign market with the engagement of nearly three millions of gold for export tomorrow caused considerable realizing in stocks.

The conservative element is favorable to a reaction, but the persistency with which offerings are absorbed, demonstrates higher prices upon continued good railway earnings.

The Cotton position continues strong. We learn that the September option is in the hands of three persons. Foreigners continue taking all offerings and the late estimates put the coming crop less than nine million bales. Upon this basis we are bullish and look for a good advance.

In wheat the continued foreign purchases and Beertholms estimate of 300 million shortage in foreign crops with smaller receipts, were the features. New records were made and although the market declined somewhat near the closing on profit taking.

The farmers will get big prices for their holdings in thirty days. We have advised the advance for the past month and still believe in higher prices.
