THEY ARE IN FAYETTEVILLE.

FAYETTEVILLE, Aug. 2.—At four forty-five this afternoon the New Bern reel teams arrived here safely. Large crowds met the boys upon their arrival, and a ladies delegation with a band of music received them. The march was then taken to the respective headquarters.

SECOND WARD MEETING.

Mr. H. C. Whitehurst Recommended as Councilman For the Ward.

The meeting of the Democrats of the second ward to recommend a councilman for the ward to be elected tonight by the City Council, was held at the Court House last night.

Mr. E. Gerock called the meeting to order and named Mr. W. M. Watson as chairman.

Mr. James Carraway was elected secretary. The Chairman stated the object of the meeting. A resolution was handed by Mr. Henry Bryan to the Secretary to be read, which named Mr. H. C. Whitehurst as a candidate.

Mr. Whitehurst made a few remarks, saying that he had looked for some other recommendation, but he did not consider that any citizen had a right to refuse, and he thanked the meeting for the honor.

Mr. Gerock made some remarks in closing, after which the meeting adjourned.

The resolution was as follows: We the Democrats of the Second Ward of the City of New Bern do hereby resolve:

That, Whereas, the Board of City Councilmen have requested the Democratic voters of this ward, through their ward committee, to recommend a candidate to fill the vacancy in the Board occasioned by the resignation of Mr. James F. Clark, and

Whereas, we are sensible that only a man whose Democracy is true and untarnished should be recommended to fill such an office, be it therefore

Resolved, That we hereby heartily endorse and recommend our fellow Democrat and fellow citizen, Henry C. Whitehurst, for the position, and respectfully petition the Honorable Board of Councilmen to elect him to fill the vacancy.

County Commissioners.

The board of County Commissioners held their regular monthly meeting, Monday, August 2nd. Present, Chairman Hill, James A. Bryan, R. G. Mosley, R. P. Williams, E. W. Smallwood.

G. A. Hill, keeper of Clermont bridge was instructed to repair said bridge, and ordered to procure material necessary for same.

Report County Treasurer Chas. B. Hill was accepted.

Petition of Dr. L. Duffy was referred to Assessors for valuation.

Craven County bond No. 123, denomination, \$500 purchased for the credit of the sinking fund, was presented to board, and on motion was to be burnt, by Commissioners Bryan and Mosely in presence of Board, Register of Deeds, Sheriff and County Treasurer.

The proposition of J. A. Meadows was accepted, and lease was extended for years 1898, 1899, in an annual sum of \$50.00 which sum was paid to the board.

Ordered that petition of A. A. Smith, No. 1 township, asking the privilege of listing property, was granted, that the valuation shown on tax list, 130 acres, valued at \$250 when but 95 acres, be referred to John A. Jackson for action, to report at next meeting of board.
