MOVING EASTWARD.

The Leaf Tobacco Belt Coming Toward the Sea.

A Valuable Book Discovered. Populist Pleased at Russell and Claim Him for their Own. Durham Water Works. Hop Culture.

JOURNAL BUREAU, RALEIGH, N. C., Aug. 21.

Mecklenburg's new court house is by far the finest in the State. It looks more like a State building, in fact, than a county one. It will be dedicated October 4th, by Judge Hoke.

Good news as to the tobacco crop comes in. The business in leaf is moving eastward. In ten years wonders have been accomplished in the extension eastward and Wilson has become the second market in the State. With a proper use of capital Raleigh would have been made a great market.

The machinery of the silk mill at Greensboro was tested yesterday.

A very valuable book has been discovered by the Secretary of State, which he will have bound and present to the State library. It contains a complete record of all meetings of the Quakers or Friends in Pasquotank county, from May, 1690, to October, 1785. It is written closely, and there are 1000 pages. It is a record of the meeting-house at Synons Creek. The quaint Quaker customs are shown in many ways. People gave notice that they wished to marry. A committee was appointed to see that they were "clear." Then if they were in "the light of truth" they were allowed to marry. Another committee attended the wedding and made a report as to how the guests behaved themselves.

The Populists are greatly pleased with Gov. Russell's speech yesterday. They unite in terming it "a good Populist" talk, and they also say he is far more of a Populist than a Republican. The mass of the people decline to take the Governor's administration seriously. There is daily so much of the comic as to excite laughter.

Raleigh, the newspaper graveyard is to have a new afternoon paper, which a syndicate of printers will issue.

Three Raleigh experts were the referees at Durham yesterday in the matter of the test of the water-works, preparatory to the purchase by the town. The chief of the Raleigh fire department was one and he says the test, which continued for 1/2 of an hour was satisfactory to both sides.

Raleigh's water works have cost \$223,000, and are owned by a company, mainly of Dayton, Ohio. There are \$100,000 in bonds. There are 140 public and private fire hydrants and there are 1,000 consumers.

The experiments in hop culture near Hamlet are said by experts to be satisfactory. No one seems to know why the culture of hops in this State has not been extensive.

The chief of the fire department says the losses by fire in this city this year do not exceed \$500. This is a remarkably fine showing.

The Secretary of State has an inquiry from Wilmington as to whether the Diamond Guild, an insurance association of Virginia, has a license in North Carolina. It has never had. The secretary is informed that it is doing business at Wilmington.

Gov. Russell left today for his cottage at Wrightsville, to return Tuesday.

The governor has caused the issue of subpoenas for R. C. Hoffman, president of the Seaboard Air Line; D. A. Tompkins of Charlotte, F. S. Sprull and Herbert E. Norris, as witnesses in the hearing before Special Master Kerr Craig at Salisbury September 7, in the effort to prove fraud in the lease of the North Carolina railway to the Southern. Twice the governor now has asked for a postponement of the hearing.

A private letter from Morganton says the deepest interest is felt there in the proposed electric railway to Blowing Rock. Next Monday a number of Morganton men will go to Blowing Rock to attend a meeting of the citizens of Watauga and of part of Caldwell. The preliminary survey for the line begins next week, T. P. Tate and W. E. Walton of Morganton will make it.

There is quite a lot of talk because Senator Pritchard has "held up" the appointment of a receiver for an Asheville bank, and that too after the appointment had been announced. Politics in receiverships is something new.

Mr. Cone and some others of Greensboro are raising a row about freight rates, claiming they are higher in this State than in any other. He has employed an expert railway man to investigate.

Lake Richardson, a negro who attempted to run on Mrs. Siffert, in Guilford, and who was sent to Winston, for safekeeping, will be taken to Greensboro next Monday and put on trial.

Latest News Items.

The government of Peru has ordered its postage stamps made in the United States. The first order, for one million 5-cent stamps, has been given to the American Bank Note Company, and another for two million stamps of other denominations will follow.

A correspondent of the London Chronicle, in a letter from Cuba, tells of further cruelty and distress on that island. He says the pacificos are dying by the hundreds, their bodies tainting the air close to the Spanish fort.

The Winston Tobacco Board of Trade held an enthusiastic meeting this afternoon and organized a Tobacco Fair Association and selected an Executive Committee to formulate plans for a big tobacco fair for exposition to be held the first of November.

Aeronaut Walter Allerd fell 300 feet from his balloon to the earth at Electric Park in Chicago. The balloonist became entangled in a gyropere, was dragged from the parachute trapeze, and fell to his death in the presence of several hundred persons. Every bone in his body was broken.

Dollar wheat in Minneapolis was celebrated on the floor of the Exchange by a brass band headed by the big four miller Pillsbury.

A statement prepared by the Treasury Department shows that for the first time in the history of trade relations with Japan, the United States is entitled to be considered, as a serious competitor with Europe. A recent British report from the legation at Tokio during the past year. In the supply of machinery, rails, nails and pig iron, the United States assumed a leading place.

The revival of interest in the Nashville exposition since the unavoidable apathy of the very warm weeks has been so sudden that the record for a week's attendance in July and August has been broken with pleasing regularity. Now that the weather has turned so fair and cool and the grounds have donned what seems their supreme beauty, the increase in the number of admissions is daily noticeable and will, no doubt, continue with gratifying regularity.

Information has just been received to the effect that the Italian bark Fiducia, from Pascauolo, on June 4th, for Marsellies, was spoken on August 16th, in latitude 36.04; and reported having been boarded on August 15th abreast of Cape Baba by foreign pirates, who fired into the crew, ransacked the vessel, stole the papers, charts, instruments, provisions and the clothing of the crew, cut the running gear and carried off the captain, boatswain and a seaman.

Officials of the State Department were very reticent when asked concerning a report in circulation that definite instructions have been given all our foreign ambassadors and ministers to European countries to sound and ascertain the attitude of European governments in case the United States should intervene in Cuba. While general denials were made by some of them, others intimated that the United States was ready to assume the position taken by President Grant in 1874, as shown by the instructions of Secretary Fish to Minister Cushing.

Manchester, N. H., Aug. 20.—Notice were issued today to the effect that the Amoskeag Cotton Mills will start up in all departments on September 6th. The Amoskeag employs about 15,000 operators. The Amory Cotton Manufacturing Company, will resume Monday next.

Mills 2 and 5, of the Nantuxek Steam Cotton Manufacturing Company's plant in this city, started on full time this morning, after nearly six months of a forty-two hour schedule.

The management states that the market for their goods is improving and they hope soon to be forced to order full time in the other mills, which are now running forty-two hours. About 1,100 hands are employed in the two mills.

SAN SEBASTIAN, August 20.—Michel Angiolillo, who shot and killed Senor Canovas Del Castillo, the Prime Minister of Spain at the baths of Santa Agueda on Sunday, August 8th, was executed at 11 o'clock this morning, according to the sentence of the court martial imposed upon him on Monday last, after his trial on the previous Sunday, which sentence was confirmed by the Supreme Council of War.

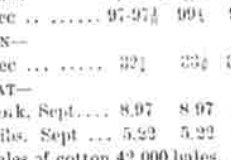
