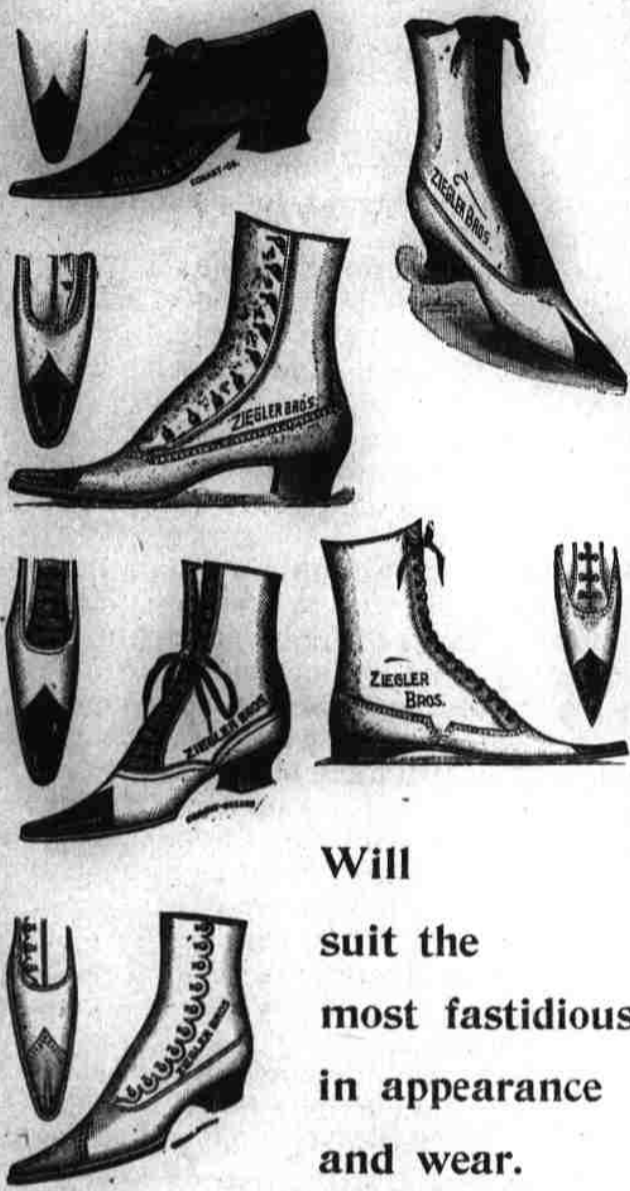

RECIPROCITY ASKED.

France Wants to Secure Benefits Under the New Tariff.

Architects Looking for Office. The Use of Carrier Pigeons for the Navy has Been Successful. An up-to-date Directory.

JOURNAL BUREAU, WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 6. France is the first country to notify this government of its desire to secure both forms of reciprocity provided for by the new tariff law, and the French Ambassador has formally applied for the reduction in the duty on articles of French production that the President is authorized to make by proclamation, whenever, in his discretion, he considers the concessions offered to warrant such action on his part. These articles are limited to brandy, champagne, still wine and vermouth, and paintings, drawings and statuary, and the reduction of duty to about 25 per cent. The French Ambassador has also given notice that his country wishes to negotiate a general reciprocity treaty with the United States, in accordance with the provisions of the new tariff. This law provides that these treaties shall, in addition to being ratified by the Senate, be "approved by Congress." This is the first time that the consent of the House has been made necessary to put a treaty into effect, but that is no reason why it may not be a good idea.

Either somebody has been mistaken about the salary being insufficient to attract a first class man, or a lot of second rate architects are trying for the position of Supervising Architect of the Treasury. A special examination to fill the office is being held, and so far, nearly eighty architects have presented themselves for examination. This official has charge of the erection of all public buildings throughout the country.

The civil service commission wishes everybody to know that it is simply throwing away money to pay for any information connected with the examinations, either in Washington or elsewhere, when such information may be had without paying a cent, by addressing the U. S. Civil Service commission, Washington D. C.

The experiment of using carrier pigeons to carry information from our warships to land, which was tried during the evolutions of the North Atlantic Squadron in the Atlantic off Cape Charles, was such a complete success that the Navy Department will, hereafter, regularly make use of these birds for news carriers. The news was in this case taken from the flagship New York, to Norfolk Navy yard, and from there telegraphed to Washington, thus keeping the department informed of every movement of the squadron.

The Commercial Directory, issued by the Bureau of American Republics, has annexed Hawaii without waiting for the Senate to act upon the treaty. In a hand book just issued by that bureau, is a prospectus of the Commercial Directory, and a list of the countries that will be represented therein, and in the list is "The United States (including Alaska and Hawaii)". This is keeping up to date and a little ahead.

BIG BICYCLE MEET.

Two Mile Record Broken. Won by F. J. Titus. Five Mile Championship Run in 11.25. Special to Journal.

New York, September 6.—America's fastest cycle riders met this afternoon in the second day's races at the Manhattan Beach bicycle track under the auspices of the Quill Club Wheelmen.

The races drew a large crowd this afternoon. The feature of today was the final heat of the Quill Club race with a \$3,000 handicap at two miles.

The greatest interest was taken in this race as some of the finest professional riders qualified for this race in the heats run on Saturday.

The Quill Club handicap of \$3,000 at two miles in the final heat was won by Fred J. Titus of New York with forty yards handicap, F. A. McFarlane of San Jose, 25 yards handicap came in second. W. Coleman of Boston, handicap 80 yards was third. E. C. Bald of Buffalo, scratch got fourth place.

The time was four minutes fifteen seconds, thus breaking the record of four fifteen and two fifths, held by W. F. Stanger, professional, and A. B. Gochler, amateur. Bald from the scratch covered the distance in four fifteen and two fifths thus securing the \$500 prize for equalling the record.

In the quarter mile dash race for amateurs, J. A. Powell won, John Hatcheson second. Time of race thirty four and four fifths seconds.

The half mile professional handicap was won by E. S. Aker of Philadelphia, with F. J. Jenny of Utica, second. Time of race was one minute and four fifths of a second.

In the half mile exhibition race, paced by a triplet, the distance was covered by Leroy Boy Jr., in fifty-seven, three fifths seconds.

THE STATE CAPITAL.

Russell Not Prepared for Stand Taken by Commissioners.

All Masons Invited to Masonic Day at Nashville. Purnell Buys Him a Home. Peace Institute. Republican League Clubs. State Museum.

JOURNAL BUREAU, RALEIGH, N. C., Sept. 6. Governor Russell and wife left yesterday for the eastern part of the State. No decision has been rendered as to the reply of the two railroad commissioners. The Governor evidently gave the first stroke before he prepared himself for the second one.

Grand Master Moore of the Grand Lodge of North Carolina has received an invitation from Grand Master Sloan of Tennessee inviting the Grand and Past Grand officers and all Masons in this State to take part in all ceremonies and entertainments on Masonic and Knight Templars Day at the Tennessee Centennial October 14, 1897.

Today being Labor Day therefore a legal holiday the post office and some other offices will be closed.

Judge T. R. Purnell has purchased the lovely home of Mr. E. B. Parboe on Fayetteville street here and will soon move into it.

Capt. Denson had intended to leave Raleigh this fall, and teach elsewhere, but he has accepted the State agency for the Mutual Reserve Fund Life Insurance Company, of N. Y. and will remain here.

Commissioner Haunrick of the Bureau of Labor Statistics has received reports from seven lumber mills in six counties in the eastern part of the State showing that the total amount of lumber cut by them last year was 7,000,000 feet.

Peace Institute opens September 15th. The whole place has been renovated and put in thorough order. The school will open with a thoroughly equipped force.

It is earnestly hoped that North Carolina will be well represented at the laying of the corner stone of the North Carolina shaft at Stonewall cemetery, Winchester Va., September 17th. The head stones for the 448 North Carolina dead will be dedicated. Rev. Mr. Averitt will deliver the address. Mrs. Armistead Jones the president of the N. C. Monumental Association has received a check for \$250 from Mr. Chas. Broadway Rouse towards the North Carolina shaft. The shaft is to cost only \$500.

A meeting of the North Carolina Board of Pharmacy will be held here on the 14th, for the examination of candidates for license to practice pharmacy.

The Republicans are organizing clubs and calling these clubs, "Leagues of the young Republicans of the State." These Leagues will be organized in any county of the State. This will put the young men forward. But while it is putting the young white men to the front, where are they going to place the colored man.

Rev. Mr. Davis, at Franklinton was yesterday, stricken with paralysis before leaving the pulpit. He cannot speak.

The work of changing the articles in the State museum goes on smoothly. Mr. Brimley has been very successful in his paper casts of sea animals.

Watanga is the only county as yet making no report to the State board of tax equalization.

The register of deeds has turned over the tax books to the county commissioners.

The weather report for August at Raleigh shows that the temperature at its highest was 95 and lowest 61, the mean temperature being 77. The August rain fall average is 6.31 inches.
