We extend to them our sincere condolences, and pray that God will temper this sad affliction to their bleeding hearts, and show them the silver lining to the dark cloud of sorrow that so densely overhangs them this hour.

To Whom It May Concern. TARBORO, N. C., Sept. 6, '97. Editor Journal:

I make this statement because this colored shlock is trying to make it appear among my friends with whom I have lived for a period of twenty years, that I am dishonest and will not pay my legal and just obligations.

In conclusion, Mr. Editor permit me to say that I may not be the "social equal" of a man who has been convicted and sentenced to the penitentiary for FORGERY. I may not be the "social equal" of a fellow who has cast off his lawful wife and innocent children, who are now struggling for existence in another State, while the father and husband is trying to buy his way into the society of decent people. I do not wish to be the "social equal" of the fellow who has been indicted for forgery and came into court while I was Solicitor and begged me to allow him to put in a plea of Nolo Contendere and let him off by paying the cost, to escape the penitentiary again.

But why need I go farther? The dockets of Craven county Superior court will tell the rest. God forbid that I ever should be the "social equal" of a man who lives by "skinning" the poor gullible unsuspecting people of the community where he lives.

Should the above statement fit any resident of the city of New Bern, I will say that on the 2nd of October 1897. I will be at my office on Broad street in said city for the transaction of such business as may come before me.
