Investment Company Charter Granted by Secretary of State.

Large Criminal Docket. Portrait of Colonels for Fair Week. Football Season Opens Saturday. The Penitentiary Lease.

JOURNAL BUFEAU, Raleigh, N. C., Sept. 21.

Next week will be the time for the holding of Wake county criminal court. There are about sixty cases on the docket. The criminal docket lately has been a pretty heavy one. Crime of all sorts seems undoubtedly to be on the increase.

Mrs. Mayhew, Mrs. Garing and their sister Miss Cradup reached here yesterday from Meriden, Miss. Later in the day a case of yellow fever was reported from Meriden, but there were no cases here when this party left.

No. 100 seems to have followed Williams' example of enforcing quarantine. Some persons here want Raleigh to establish quarantine against Southern cities, but it will hardly be done, especially now that the thermometer has made such a rapid drop.

The portraits ordered by Mr. Randall of the three Colonels of the 20th N. G. regiment, Vance, Lane and Burgwynne, will be presented to the State on Wednesday of Fair week. Governor Russell will either receive it himself or else designate some one to act in his place.

Applicants for license to practice law will be examined on Monday the 27. On Tuesday the 28th appeals from the 1st district will be called.

The murderer Lemm Haynes who it is to be hung at Whiteville, Columbus county on September 24th, still refuses say anything except that he knows all about the murder of the man John Lee.

The city schools will open on Friday the 24th. More capacity is to be provided for the colored children. It was hoped that an additional school would be open for whites, but that cannot be done yet.

Hon. Kerr Craige of Salisbury, the special master in the hearing of the alleged frauds in the lease of the N. C. R. R. will hold an adjourned hearing in New York this week. The first hearing was in Salisbury, but there will be hearings in New York, Baltimore, Washington and Raleigh before it is finished.

Today the wind blows quite a gale from the east and whirls the dust far up over the tree tops. Rain has fallen all around here, but none in the city. The thermometer is down near the 50 mark.

Capt. T. G. Baswell the genial Pullman conductor from here to Greensboro is sick again with typhoid fever at the Hospital here. He has had one attack this summer and this relapse or second attack is very much regretted. Capt. Baswell is from Richmond.

College football season begins on Saturday between the A. & M. College and the Guilford college teams. The hospital for the A. & M. College will be completed in about 60 days. The smoke stack is 90 feet high.

The meeting of the board of penitentiary directors called in extra session here for yesterday will handle several matters. There is a proposition made to the directors, by a Northern syndicate, represented here by Mr. John H. Winder, and by a syndicate of men from Goldsboro, Wilmington, Raleigh and Greensboro, to lease the stock, farms, convicts, and the whole outfit for a number of years. To pay the expenses of the institution in other words, and run it in competition to free labor. The question is if the directors have the power to thus act. Many lawyers think not. Chairman Dockery thinks not. A caucus was held last night and the question comes up before the board tonight. Governor Russell was present at the caucus. He strongly favors the lease. The fact that the penitentiary is a dead expense to the State and has been except under Superintendent Leazars management, makes the Governor anxious to shift this expense off of his party. Then some he has put over there at the heads of the different departments have put the institution in a pretty fix. A scandal has developed that should be thoroughly investigated, and the parties guilty punished to the extent of the law.

There are now 30 companies in the State guard and one independent one, the Fayetteville Independent Light Infantry. There are 87 applications on file to form new companies, but the appropriation is not sufficient. The Secretary of State today grants charter to the New Berne Investment Company. Incorporators are Thos. C. Daniels, J. W. Stewart and Enoch Wadsworth with \$100,000 capital. Real estate and investment business is the object.

The work of putting down brick pavement on the Capital Square is about finished. The slowness of the convicts doing the work is very often commented upon.

The governor has his hands so full of the penitentiary muddle that he forgot yesterday to bother the two offending (?) railroad commissioners so the commission met today to discuss freight rates. What a pity the governor can't look into two matters at one time.

A. AND N. C. DIRECTORS.

Governor Russell Makes Appointment of Eight Members.

A Proposition Made to the Governor in regard to Using the Labor of the Convicts in the State Penitentiary.

Special to Journal. Raleigh, N. C., September 21.—Governor Russell appoints as Directors of the Atlantic & North Carolina Railway, D. W. Patrick, J. E. Person, Robert Hancock, W. H. Chadbourne, E. H. Meadows, T. D. Hewitt, W. H. Sawyer, and John F. Mewborne.

John H. Winder, formerly general manager of the Seaboard Air Line, made a proposition, today, which Governor Russell endorses. The proposition is to take all the convicts and maintain them and the penitentiary without cost to the State, with the proviso that he gets all the returns of their labor.

Weekly Crop Report.

The State crop report says: "The week ending Monday, September 20th, continued extremely hot and dry up to the evening of Friday, the 17th. At some points in the central portion of the State higher temperature occurred on the 14th than ever recorded in September. Light showers, with cooler weather, followed on the last two days of the week, but the amount of rain was too small to break the drought, which continues unabated. All late crops continue to be greatly damaged by drought. Stock is suffering for water. Cotton has continued to deteriorate during the past week; shedding premature opening and damage by rust continue to be reported; many fields look as brown as in the middle of October. The crop is opening very rapidly from one half acre for two of it is open and will be out before the average date of the first frost. The crop is now expected to be much below the average. Early cotton, however, is good, and has been saved in fine condition, and from a few sections, corn and cranberry crops report a good yield received. Cotton is being planted and raised as soon as possible. All late corn, field peas, late sweet potatoes, uncut tobacco and rice have suffered severely. Peas have been cut short. The showers at the end of the week helped to start but were not sufficient to put ground in condition for sowing wheat and oats. Gardening is over and vegetation is rapidly taking a fall appearance."

Latest News Items.

Evangelist Lee of Greensboro is still stirring Winston, N. C. He preached to over two thousand men Monday, nearly all of whom stood up, thereby promising to join the anti-saloon league which will be organized before he leaves.

Unless unforeseen developments occur the anthracite coal strike in Pennsylvania is ended. Nearly five thousand strikers have returned and a little less than that number are still out, with inclinations in favor of their joining the workers.

A dispatch received at Copenhagen from Haanmerfest the northernmost town of Europe, in Norway, says the whaling ship Falken has brought the third pigeon dispatch from Professor Andrus, the aeronaut, who left the island of Tromsø in a balloon on July 11th last in an attempt to cross the polar regions.

It is officially announced that peace between Greece and Turkey had been signed and that the Ministers of War and Marine have so notified all the Turkish military and naval commanders. Most of the European ambassadors have congratulated the Sultan.

Public interest in the alleged lynching of Arroyo in the City of Mexico is stimulated by the rumors and disclosures in the press, for as light is thrown on the matter, it is seen there is strong probability that Arroyo was not killed by a mob of people, but by some member or members of the police itself.

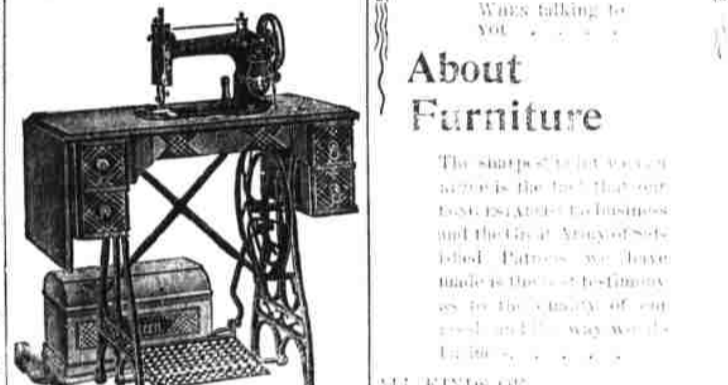
