The annual meeting of the Stockholders of the Atlantic and North Carolina railroad was held yesterday at Morehead City. A number of those interested went down Wednesday night, and a few Thursday morning, on a special from this city. The attendance was large and great interest manifested. The stockholders went into a meeting of organization, with E. H. Meadows temporary chairman, and George Green, temporary secretary, these officers being made permanent. The day was spent by the Proxy committee making up its report, finally completing same by 8 p. m. with following votes. 5,353 shares held by private stockholders, 12,666 shares held by State, represented by L. J. Moore. As directors on the part of the private stockholders, the following were nominated by Robt. Hancock: J. A. Bryan, W. L. Kennedy, F. W. Hughes, J. M. Morehead. For the same, the following were nominated by L. H. Cutler: Thos. Daniels, Dempsey Wood, J. M. Morehead, N. M. Jarney. The Cutler nominees were elected by a majority of 150 to 175. On the Finance Committee, the following were nominated by R. Hancock: S. I. Wooten, J. A. Bryan, T. A. Green. By L. B. Cutler, for same, W. R. Tucker, W. L. Kennedy, F. W. Hughes, the first three, S. I. Wooten, J. A. Bryan, T. A. Green, by 200 majority, the State voting for the Hancock nominees. The following Proxy Committee were nominated by Robt. Hancock.—H. R. Bryan, Arnold Borden, C. E. Foy, John Fields. By L. H. Cutler, W. L. Arendall, J. H. Davis, Geo. Bizzell, E. B. Hackburn, Wash Lamb. The Hancock nominees were elected. The following resolution was offered by W. W. Clark. Resolved, That the stockholders of this company in recognition of the faithful and efficient services of F. C. Roberts, Esq., as secretary and treasurer recommend his re-election to the Board of Directors. Voted down by a vote of 905 to 731, R' Hancock and friends voting against it. Number of gentlemen from Green and Lenoir counties were present, advocating the construction of a road from LaGrange to Snow Hill. The matter was referred to a committee to investigate and have a survey made and report to a called meeting of the stockholders. Meeting adjourned to meet in New Berne, on the fourth Thursday in September 1898. The directors held no meeting so no changes in offices are to be reported at present. Great Crowds in Attendance. Cotton Crop Will be Short. September 22nd. Married at the home of the bride's mother, Miss Sudie Jenkins and Mr. H. M. Pollock. The happy event took place on the 15th, inst. J. D. Herritage, J. P. officiating. The farmers claim that their cotton, and in fact all crops are very much injured by the drought. Cotton it is claimed will not be over two thirds of a crop. Bale cotton is coming in slowly as our farmers appear not to be anxious to place on the market at present prices, 45 bales were sold here on Friday last.
