RIGHT TO LICENSES.

Question Whether County Commissioners Can Grant Them.

Commissioners Chatham County Hold They Can Grant Liquor Licenses. Decision of Judge Adams.

RALEIGH, N. C., September 29.—The county commissioners of Chatham county, held they had a right to refuse liquor licenses to any one.

Mandamus proceedings were instituted to require them to issue license.

Judge Adams issues a mandamus ordering them to pass on each particular case, and find the facts in each, and if facts agree with statute, then license must be issued.

This gives the commissioners discretion only so far as finding facts.

Latest News Items.

The yellow fever fright has struck the State of Texas in earnest. Nearly all of the towns in eastern central and southern Texas have declared shotgun quarantine against Houston.

Captain-General Weyer has published a decree of declaring still in force his prohibition of the exportation of leaf tobacco, produced in the provinces of Havana and Pinar Del Rio.

George Fred. Williams, of Dedham, was nominated for Governor of Massachusetts by the Democratic State convention on a platform that squarely endorses that adopted by the national convention at Chicago last summer.

Captain Auguste E. Blom has left Washington for Norfolk, Va., where he will take charge as master of the new Diamond shoal Lightship No. 69 on her arrival from New York.

The Blackfeet Indian reservation in Montana will soon be thrown open to settlement.

Three members of the expedition which went to Peru last March have returned. They tell a story of privation and hard luck, and give anything but a glowing account of the Peruvian gold fields.

The Prussian police are on the track of a powerful anti-dynastic movement in South Germany, which includes many members of the best families, among them two notable university professors. The Berlin authorities are endeavoring to conduct the inquiry with the utmost secrecy.

CRISIS APPROACHING.

Resignation of the Spanish Cabinet Creates Excitement.

The Spanish Minister De Lome Returns Hastily to Washington. The Queen Regent Arrived in the Spanish Capital.

New York, September 29.—It is announced this afternoon from Madrid that the Spanish Cabinet has resigned.

The Queen Regent returned to the Spanish Capital yesterday and it was apparent that some event of importance was at hand.

The Spanish Minister, Dupuy De Lome, returned yesterday to Washington unexpectedly from Lenox, Mass., where he has spent the summer with his family. Upon his arrival he went to the State Department to see the Secretary of State.

The State Department officials are very reticent and no intimation of the contents of the cipher dispatching passing between the two Capitals is given.

STILL PRAISING RUSSELL.

Butler Approves His Appointees. Hearing of the Lease Matter. Maj. Wilson Declines Invitation of Sheriff to Go.

JOURNAL BUREAU. Raleigh, N. C., Sept. 29.

The hearing of the lease matter before Hon. Kerr Craige still goes on here today. The files of the Tribune were introduced in the evidence yesterday to show that Col. A. B. Andrews the vice-president of the Southern R. R. was a stockholder, and to try to show false and misleading statements that had been made by the Southern Railway as to the earnings of the N. C. R. R., etc., but special Master Craige ruled such evidence out of order. It will be strange if any thing against Col. Andrews can be proved.

North Carolina receives from the Peabody fund this year \$2,400 in scholarships at the Peabody college at Nashville and \$5,400 in cash.

Chairman J. W. Wilson of the R. R. Commission had served on him a written notice by the Sheriff of Burke county from L. C. Caldwell demanding the office of R. R. commissioner. Maj. Wilson reply was "I most respectfully decline to accede to your request."

The will of the late Mr. B. R. Harding was admitted to probate yesterday. The estate is valued at \$11,000 to be equally divided between his wife and five children.

Judge Robinson of the Criminal court in his charge to the grand jury called upon them to indict railroad officials for giving free passes that it has long been overlooked but is on the statute books and it is the duty of all the Superior court judges to charge the grand juries to bring in an indictment against any railroad that is known to have violated this law. This created some comment. Judge Robinson is the first Judge that has so charged.

The Caucasian, Butler's paper, endorses the course Russell has taken in the R. R. commission fuss. He denounces the rightful commissioners, and praises Russell's new appointees. This same paper calls for a full investigation of the penitentiary affair and says remove Dr. Smith if the charges are proved.

The following military commissions were issued yesterday to the Fayetteville Independent Light Infantry: B. R. Huske, major; L. L. McGelvary, 1st Capt.; Lightou Huske, 2nd Capt.; J. G. Hollingsworth 3rd Capt.; J. H. Robinson, Jr., 4th Capt.

The weather is still quite cool and yet rain is very badly needed.

There is an effort on foot for the city to lease from the State the large rock quarry from which granite is to be taken for the paving and curbing of the sidewalks.

Two car loads of oak furniture from the White Rickel company of Mebane has been secured for the State museum. It is all of N. C. timber. This firm is to equip the museum.

Two of the State officials are said to be "sanctified." Wonder which two.

The State Superintendent of Public Instruction says the fact that made him write, last spring, a letter favoring compulsory education was that in one county in the State where one negro child was unable to read and write, two or three white children were unable to do so.

Keeper of the Capital Burns is making himself so obnoxious that the board of public buildings and grounds may dismiss him.

zens Union, got less than 50 of the 348 votes cast.

His name was received by the delegate and spectators with jeers and hisses and Jacob Worth, the leader of the opposition to Senator Platt, was cried down when he essayed to present Low's name. None of the defeated Low men, however, expressed any intention to bolt the regular ticket.

The Citizens' Union several days ago announced that the withdrawal of Low was out of the question, and the Republican committee at the same time presented an ultimatum to the effect that Low was not acceptable to the Republican committee.

A union of the anti-Tammany forces seems now unlikely.
