**NO TELEPHONE RATE**

Decided Upon as Yet by The Railway Commissioners.

New Charters Granted. Penitentiary Funds. More Counsel for Russell. Pleasure Party Injured. The Mormons. Very Dry Weather.

JOURNAL BUREAU, RALEIGH, N. C., Oct. 2.

The railway commission did not today decide as to the telephone rate. It announced that it would take the voluminous evidence under consideration at the next meeting. Senator Daniel addressed a powerful argument in favor of the Bell company, against the low rate and ridiculing the Inter-State company left for home today.

The State charters the Railway and Street Car Indicator company of Edenton, for 30 years, H. A. Donnan, W. S. Summerhill and B. E. Byrd incorporators, to make the indicators and sell patent rights.

The Superintendent of the penitentiary today turned over to the treasury \$30,744 of penitentiary earnings. He says that next Monday there will be a regular exodus from the penitentiary to the cotton farms, leaving there only those persons who are sick. It is as he says, "the first cleaning out the penitentiary has ever had."

Gov. Russell appoints W. C. Douglas and John W. Hinsdale his counsel in the injunction case of the Western Union Telegraph company to prevent the State from enforcing the 15 cent message rate. This is the case which is to come up before Judge Simonon at Wilmington.

The September revenue collections in this district were the largest, with one exception, during Collector Simmonson's term of office. They were, whiskey \$13,878; cigars and cigarettes \$25,808; tobacco \$30,859; total \$122,002.

Last night a party of ladies and gentlemen from this city went to the insane asylum to attend one of the semi-weekly dances given the patients. On the return the driver drove over an embankment and as a result the carriage was wrecked and all hurt, two of the ladies badly.

The "Rolling Exposition," or "North Carolina on wheels," the \$10,000 car which contains North Carolina's resources in miniature will be here in view during the State Fair. Then it will begin its long tour through 25 States.

Counterfeiters are giving the public and the officials much trouble in the Charlotte and Salisbury sections.

Two Mormon preachers or elders arrived here today and will preach tomorrow in the city hall. They were specially interviewed and said: "Our number now at work in this State has been increased to 40. Ezra C. Robinson is our president or presiding elder. He has no headquarters, but spends his time visiting the elders. He is president of what we know as the North Carolina Conference. We have about 400 members in the State. During the past 2 years none have been going to Utah. Of late most of our special work has been done in Moore and Montgomery counties. We have a church building and quite a congregation at Cameron. We are doing a good deal of work in Wayne county. In Wake we have two congregations, one at Varina with 23 members and one at Eagle Rock with 20. As a rule we elders stay in a State from 2 years to 30 months."

Robert Busby, an old ex-slave living near Benton Harbor, Mich., has been advised by a Charleston, S. The old planter left an immense estate, and his fondness for Busby, who had been his slave for 33 years, led him to remember him in his will.

The first meeting of the Cabinet since the return of the President from Massachusetts was held Friday and was attended by every member save Secretary Gage who is not in Washington. The meeting lasted longer than usual, in explanation of which fact it was said that several of the Cabinet members were present for the first time in many weeks and naturally they sought the opportunity to inform themselves fully upon the condition of affairs.

**TO BORROW CONVICTS.**

State Will Take Wake County Convicts For Work on Roanoke Farms.

RALEIGH, N. C. October 2.—The State will borrow fifty convicts from Wake county to pick cotton on the Roanoke Farms, and later will give the county the use of that many or more of the State convicts for road work.

**HENRY GEORGE NOMINATED.**

The Fourth Ticket Put in the Field. Tammany Scored Heavily.

NEW YORK, October 1.—At the city nominating convention of the Democratic Alliance of Greater New York, held tonight Henry George was unanimously nominated for Mayor.

The nominating speech was made by Charles Francis Adams and the nomination was greeted with enthusiastic applause.

The platform is a strong condemnation of Tammany, and endorses the Chicago platform in full and calls for municipal ownership of franchises and other reform.

**HELD UP A TRAIN.**

Hold Bandits Take Everything in Sight. Surprised the Trainmen.

EL REZO, Okla., October 1.—Bandits robbed the south-bound Rock Island passenger train and all its passengers at 11 o'clock this forenoon at siding No. 1, about five miles south of Mingo, in the Indian Territory.

The trainmen were completely surprised and they were not prepared to offer any resistance when five masked men came up to them at the lonely siding. The place is uninhabited, and the only persons in the vicinity at the time were four section men. These men flagged the train, the robbers having compelled them to do so. The bandits were hidden at the time in a brush pile and jumped out as soon as the passenger train had taken the siding.

Under the pressure of Winchester and ugly-looking six-shooters the trainmen, the express messenger and all of the score or more of passengers were made to climb down from the train and stand in a line, hands up, on the prairie along the railway. While three of the robbers covered the badly frightened crowd with their guns, the other two coolly and carefully robbed them, passing from one passenger to another down the line.

The bandits secured about \$300 in cash and such other valuables in the way of watches, pins and jewelry as were in sight.
