IMPORTANT DECISION.

Judge Simonton Files Decree in Tucker's Suit.

The Suit Against Governor, Attorney General, President A. & N. C. R. R. and Others. Legislative Act of February Construed by Judge.

RALEIGH, N. C., October 6.—Judge Simonton today filed decree here in the suit by private stockholder William R. Tucker against Governor Russell, Attorney General Waiser, the Board of Public Improvement, and the President and State Directors of the Atlantic and North Carolina Railway.

The Judge dismisses the complaint as to the Governor, Attorney General and Board of Public Improvements, and dissolves temporarily the restraining order which he granted at Charleston so far as it enjoins the enforcement of the legislative act of February 25th, last, which required the Governor to sue for the possession of the road, and the Judge to appoint a receiver.

But the Judge makes the temporary restraining order permanent so far as it enjoins enforcement by the railway company of the act of last February to amend the charter, but the Governor is permitted to appoint a State proxy.

The road is forbidden to attempt to enforce that part of the act of last February repealing section 4 of the charter and amendments, and that provision requiring the State proxy's presence necessary to constitute a quorum, unless at a meeting of all the stockholders held afterwards, until the act of last February be unanimously adopted by the major part of all present as a charter amendment.

The Governor, Attorney General and State Board of Improvements recover their costs of Tucker, and he recovers all his costs from the road.

BALTIMORE TAKES THIRD.

Better Score and Boston Loses. Looks Safe for Baltimore Winning Temple Cup.

NEW YORK, October 5th.

Sales 10,000 bales in Liverpool and a better tone here is the result of the large exports last week and the improved condition of affairs in the Southwest, especially as regards yellow fever. The Houston "Press" in a graphic cartoon, represents the "yellow fever" as continuing to have large influence in Southwestern affairs. Merchants are selling cotton goods very freely and our exports of domestic manufacturers never were better or a more promising trade in sight for the future. The spinners and exporters appear now buying more freely than at any time during the season or at corresponding dates of largest export years. We look to see this demand increase and startle the bears who have thought that because it was delayed that it would never come. There is a certain relation between supply and demand which cannot be denied or ignored. It is about to assert itself in cotton or else we entirely misjudge the situation.

The Manchester correspondent of the "Chronicle" writes discouragingly on the outlook for cotton goods manufacturers of Manchester and the United Kingdom generally. Doubtless they feel the effect of American and Indian manufacturers more nearly holding the market of the Eastern and Western world, which England heretofore had a monopoly of. That the Europeans will allow their machinery to rust because of any discouraging conditions is less likely than that they will try to use agitation on the subject to depress market in order to secure a supply of American cotton at low prices. The Liverpool stock of American cotton is not much over one half that of a year ago.

CRISIS FOR TAMMANY.

Prospect of a Split. Sheehan Protests. Henry George Does Some Talking.

NEW YORK, October 5.—A grave crisis has been reached in the affairs of Tammany Hall. Leader John C. Sheehan has written to Richard Croker declaring that he intends to resign. He has told Mr. Croker that the position which he occupies has become intolerable, that he can no longer endure to act as the leader of an organization in which he has no authority.

John C. Sheehan repeated today his declaration that Judge Van Wyck would not retire from the Democratic ticket, but four out of every five of his followers who came to Tammany Hall this morning expressed the opinion that the ticket would have to be changed.

One of them, a member of Congress, predicted that Henry George would poll 100,000 votes if Van Wyck could not be induced to leave the field. Others said that even if George did not poll so many votes he would draw so heavily from Tammany as to endanger the success of the Democratic city ticket.

Henry George this afternoon talked freely about his campaign. Among other things he said: "I am not altogether for free silver or for the gold standard either. I am more of a greenbacker than anything else. All the friends of Bryan are with me in this fight. Jerry Simpson and others have offered their services in the last few days. I believe in returning to the doctrines of Thomas Jefferson. The silver question is a mere incident, and I stand for the great principles back of the Chicago platform."

WILL STICK TO BUSINESS.

The President will Stay in Washington. The Yantic for the Lakes. White House Brushed up.

WASHINGTON, October 5.—The President does not contemplate accepting any invitations between now and the time Congress assembles that will involve his absence from the city, and expects soon to turn his attention to the annual message, which he hopes to have completed by Thanksgiving Day. The cabinet meeting today was largely devoted to the forthcoming annual reports of the several heads of departments, which serve as a guide to the President in making recommendations to Congress relating to the various offices.

Secretary Long today issued orders for the transfer of the Yantic, now at the Boston navy yard, to the Michigan reserves, in charge of a crew of forty men, two naval officers and two officers of the State reserve. The vessel will be in condition to make the sea journey to the St. Lawrence by October 15, and on entering the river will proceed slowly until Quebec is reached. At Quebec the reserves will take charge of the vessel and conduct her through the canal to Detroit.

The White House has this week taken on its winter apparel. A deep green carpet, with gold colored harps, has displaced the well-worn covering of years on the upper floors, and down stairs heavy curtains and hangings have taken the place of light summer effects. The mansion is now practically in readiness for the season and the President and Mrs. McKinley have settled down for the winter.

The late Barney Barnato, the so-called "Kaffir King" and "Diamond King," who committed suicide by throwing himself into the sea from the British steamer Scot, on June 14 last, while on the passage from Cape Town to Southampton, left a fortune amounting to 962,865 pounds.
