W. E. PATTERSON ASSAULTED.

While Returning From a Young Lady's House Saturday Night He Was Brutally Assaulted.

The following was taken from the Charlotte Observer and relates to a gentleman well known in this city: "A very mysterious affair occurred in the city Saturday night about half past 10 o'clock. Mr. W. E. Patterson of New Berne, who travels for Whitman & Co., of Philadelphia, was the victim of a very brutal assault made by an unknown man on West Fifth street, near the railroad.

Mr. Patterson is well known in this city, as he has been traveling here for years. His relatives live in New Berne. He arrived here early last week and registered at the Buford. He sells to Fasnacht, and Saturday night he was in the store about 10 o'clock. Miss Bessie McCarter, the young lady who clerks in the store, started out of the store going home. As she was alone, Mr. Patterson, with the gallantry for which he is noted, offered to see her home. They went down Trade and up Clarkson street to the old J. V. Irwin house, where Miss McCarter lives. Mr. Patterson remained at the house for a few minutes, and then started to leave. He remarked to Miss McCarter that he hardly knew how to get back up town. She told him to keep right up Fifth street and he would come to Tryon, the street the hotel was on. Mr. Patterson left, going up Fifth, as she directed. He walked along whistling until after he passed the railroad. Just after leaving the railroad a man came up behind him and struck him a fearful blow across the mouth with a sandbag. The blow almost knocked him down. Before he could recover a second blow followed, this time in the eye.

Mr. Patterson put his hand behind him to his hip pocket, and his assailant, thinking he was going to draw his gun, ran.

Mr. Patterson was groping his way along Fifth street when he came up with Mr. Jim Steele. The latter got a carriage and took him to the hotel. A physician was summoned and Mr. Patterson assisted to bed. He was found to be in a bad condition. His face was terribly beaten up. His nose was broken and one eye was so swollen yesterday that it was entirely closed. He has no idea who his assailant was, beyond the fact that he was white. Mr. Patterson had money and his watch and chain on his person, but no attempt was made to rob him. He is at a loss to account for the attack, other than that he was taken for some other man. It will be some days before he is able to get out.

A telegram received last night stated that Mr. Patterson was better but would be unable to be around for several days.
