RALEIGH POST.

Directors Select Editors For The New Morning Paper.

The X Ray to be Tried Again. Dr. McGee is Recovering. Eight Counties Without a Railroad. To Have a Paid Fire Department.

JOURNAL BERNE, RALEIGH, N. C., Nov 24.

At a meeting of the board of directors of the new city paper yesterday, Mr. Robert M. Furman of Asheville was chosen as editor and accepted the position. Mr. T. J. Pence who has done such good work on the evening paper, The Press-Visitor was put in charge of the city work. Mr. Willis Briggs succeeds Mr. Pence on the evening paper. There will be after December 1st, two morning papers and two evening papers. It was stated that the other evening paper "The Times" would stop, but that was a mistake.

Today the city schools held Thanksgiving exercises at the schools. There were songs by the children and donations for the poor. Speeches will be made by several ministers.

The thermometer dropped considerably last night and the weather is brisk and cold. This of course is a delight to all who have planned for a Thanksgiving out in the fields with gun and dog.

Today Mrs. Watson was carried back to Wake Forest to have the X rays applied to try and locate the bullet in her back. Every effort is being made to help her, but there is very little hope for it is the general impression that the spinal cord was severed and she will never walk again. In the Auditor's office the old papers and manuscripts are being neatly arranged. Some very old documents have been found, some from Washington and other early pre-idents. Some of the dates run back as far as 1741.

The map of the State made by Mr. Brown, clerk of the R. R. commission shows that there are only eight counties in the State which are not touched by any railroad. These are Ashe, Alleghany, Graham, Clay, Watauga, Darr, Pamlico, Tyrrell. Of course some of the roads that go into the counties are small ones for hauling lumber.

Ex-Judge A. C. Avery, who is L. C. Caldwell's attorney in his suit for chairman of the R. R. Commission made a motion before the Supreme court to advance the case on the docket. Caldwell won the case in the lower court, yet he himself docketed it in the Supreme court. The question is asked whether the winner has the right to docket the case for this term or not.

T. K. Bruner, ex-secretary of the agricultural department has charge of the equipping of the "Rolling Exposition" car. The horticultural exhibit especially prepared by Herbert Brinley, the curator of the museum is a superb one.

There are plans on foot to have a paid fire department here. The voluntary service here is a very fine one.

Latest News Items.

London November 21.—The Rome correspondent of the Daily Chronicle says: The report is confirmed that the Powers have decided to blockade Constantinople in case Turkey refuses to withdraw her troops from Crete and to accept European government of the island.

San Francisco, November 24.—The Call says: The coal bunkers in the United States battleship Oregon caught fire Sunday evening from spontaneous combustion, and for over eight hours the crew worked hard in smothering what looked like a costly blaze. There were over 250 tons of coal in the vessel, and prompt action alone saved the ship.

Barcelona, November 23.—General Weyler, the former captain general of Cuba, arrived here this morning on board the steamer Montserrat, from Havana. The general landed beneath the Columbus monument at 10 a. m., and was acclaimed by about 20,000 people.

Chicago, November 23.—Americanized and native-born Chinamen will appeal to Congress for the privilege of suffrage, and will ask that body to repeal the Geary anti-Chinese law. A public mass-meeting will soon be held at Central Music Hall here and prominent Chinamen from all over the United States will address the meeting.

Washington, Nov. 23.—A pension claim which has been pending twenty-seven years and which if admitted would carry back pay of \$25,000, was decided today by Assistant Secretary of the Interior Davis. It is the case of Gottlieb Ebersiek, of Missouri, whose claim for alleged total blindness, due to disease of the eyes contracted during the military service in 1864, is rejected.

Washington, Nov. 23.—The cabinet held a very short meeting today, as the President and several of its members attended the wedding of Mr. Harlan, son of Justice Harlan, and Miss Noble. The time of the meeting was taken up with matters from the several departments. President McKinley informed the cabinet that his message was practically completed, but he did not read any portion of it to them.

WHAT GAGE SAYS.

That Now is the Time for Financial Reform.

Relief for the South and West. End to be Gained Without Contraction of the Currency. Many Distinguished People at the Dinner.

New York, Nov. 23.—The one hundred and twenty-ninth annual dinner of the New York Chamber of Commerce was given at Delmonico's new restaurant, Fifth avenue and Forty-fourth street, tonight. Men distinguished in professional and commercial life were present and the beautiful banquet hall was taxed to its utmost capacity.

Secretary of the Treasury Lyman J. Gage was the guest of honor and the chief speaker.

Among the other guests were Secretary of War Russell A. Alger, Gov. Frank S. Black, Comptroller of the Currency J. H. E. Kels, Mayor Wm. L. Strong, President Daniel C. Gilman, of the Johns Hopkins University; Major-General Wesley Merritt, Commodore Francis M. Bane, Carl Schurz and Whitelaw Reid.

Secretary Gage was received with applause when he rose to speak to the toast "Currency Reform, Now or When?" The Secretary said in conclusion:

"In a word, I commit myself to the following proposition: At a cost too contemptible for serious consideration the debatable condition of our currency and banking system may be put upon clearly safe, if not theoretically scientific, foundations. This may be secured without any necessary contraction of the circulating medium of exchange and with no danger of an undue expansion, and, best of all, this desirable end may carry in its effect potential relief to those districts in the South and West which, though rich in possibilities of soil and climate, have been held back through the absence of banking capital and credit facilities. Nor will I permit myself to doubt that in the councils of our nation a wise Statesmanship, supported and sustained by the wisdom and value of a pure patriotism among our people, will find the way to the much-needed result."
