## OBJECTION TO WHISKEY

Advertisement by Sensitive "Experts" in Exposition Car.

A Satisfactory Appointment. Association of Academies. Officers Raleigh Academy of Medicine. No Room at Soldiers Home.

JOURNAL BUREAU. RALEIGH, N. C., Dec. 17. The announcement from Washington City, of the reappointment of Judge Thos. C. Fuller, of this city in the bench of the land claims Court was gladly received. The same telegram gave the appointment of Henry O. Dockery as U. S. Marshal of this district to succeed Marshall O. J. Carroll.

It was noted a short time ago that a Mrs. P. F. Chase of New Hampshire had the flag of the 4th N. C. Regiment, and wanted to return it to survivors of that regiment. It is now proposed to have her come to Charlotte on May 20th next and present the flag herself to the survivors of that regiment.

The members of the Agricultural Board at first expressed themselves as much pleased with the "Rolling Exposition Car," but afterwards part of them, headed by J. W. Bailey, concluded they would make a kick, because a whiskey house had paid for a prominent advertising space and used it. If the State is not a big whiskey manufacturing place, then why is the U. S. Court so crowded with whiskey cases. The majority of the board did not sustain the fanatical proposition to require the whiskey ad to be removed. Some people are too narrow minded to be contented.

The report of the Labor Commissioner as regards the tobacco industry in the State is very full. Col. Jas. S. Cunningham, of Person county, who is the largest tobacco planter in the world contributes much information.

The association of academies will meet here Dec. 28-29. This association is one of the principals and teachers of private

schools all over the State. This is their first annual meeting. Mr. Hugh Mason, principal of the Raleigh Male Academy is president of the association.

The Raleigh Academy of Medicine elected officers for the following year as follows: President, Dr. A. W. Knox, Vice President, Dr. J. R. Rogers, Sec'y., Dr. Hubert Royster and Treasurer, Dr. A. W. Goodwin, Board of Censors, Dr. K. P. Battle, Dr. F. J. Haywood, and Dr. W. I. Royster.

The Register of Deeds has no death of marriage notices to report. Yesterday he issued seven.

There are 100 applications on file for admission to the Soldiers' Home, but there is no room at present.

Ex-Judge Avery and Mr. Robert Strong have formed a partnership to practice law here.

The Governor has appointed Mr. Daniel C. Champlain of Buncombe county a notary public.

Rev. James Battle Avirett who delivered his address "Plantation Life Before the War" in New Berne last night will deliver the same address here in January.

The executive committee of the Episcopal mission work in this diocese met here yesterday. Bishop Cheshire, Revs. Murdock, Smith, Ingle and Wincroft, and Messrs. C. M. Busbee, John Wilkes, R. H. Battle and W. L. London were present. Only routine business was transacted.

The Agricultural Board is still in session and today visited the herd of cattle at the A. & M. college that is infected with tuberculosis.

The board meets twice a year. This year it met during the Fair so as to see the Fair and cost the State \$800. Some propose to meet every 60 days, but others say they will defeat this even if they have to leave and break a quorum. That they have dragged out the work for the per diem is visible to any one who cares to see.

A penitentiary guard says that one of the wardens let two convicts escape on condition that they go to a house he owned and paint it.

Rev. Dr. Cunningham, a well known Methodist minister is dangerously sick at Greensboro.

Ex-Judge Spier Whitaker stands no chance whatever of getting the U. S. District attorneyship.

Chairman Wilson of the R. R. commission has written a letter to the S. A. I. saying the commission never intended any change as to the freight rate on cotton on the C. C. R. R. The debt of the road is large, but does not think the people along the line should for that reason be forced to pay a higher rate.

## TERRIBLE DEED.

William Terriss, the Great English Actor, Murdered.

LONDON, December 16.—William Terriss, the well known actor, was assassinated tonight, being stabbed with a knife as he was entering the stage door of the Adelphi Theater.

The murderer rushed at the actor as he was stepping across the pavement from his cab and stabbed him just below the heart. As the actor fell his murderer was seized by people, who were outside the theater. The wounded man was carried into the theatre and doctors were called from the Charing Cross Hospital but Terriss expired in fifteen minutes.

The murderer was taken to Bow street police station, followed by an angry crowd. His name was given as Archer. It is said that he had been a "super" at the Adelphi Theater several years ago, and for some days past he has haunted the theater.

## Alphonse Daudet Dead.

PARIS, Dec. 16.—Alphonse Daudet, the novelist and litterateur, is dead.

Mr. Daudet expired at 8 o'clock tonight. He was dining with his family, and was in excellent spirits, when he was seized with a sudden syncope. Physicians were summoned, but he died almost immediately.

## NOT BUSINESS LIKE.

Department Clerks Do Not Give Full Value in Work.

The Democratic Caucus Declarations Against Greenbacks Retiring. Direct Election of Senators. Pressure on the President to Retire.

JOURNAL BUREAU. WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 17.

Every year when the Legislative, Executive and Judicial appropriation bill is before Congress there is more or less talk about the need of reform in the pay and control of the department employees in Washington. This time, in addition to talking, the bill puts some restrictions upon the employees, particularly as to sick leave, which everybody in Washington knows has been abused awfully. Some day a Congress will come along with the nerve to properly handle this business, and put it on the footing of any other great corporation. It is notorious that at least nine-tenths of the employees of the government are paid more—much more—than is paid for the same class of work in private establishments; the other tenth, whose duties require special knowledge, experience and expertise, are paid less than private establishments pay for the same class of work. Representative Bingham stated on the floor of the House that members of the Appropriation committee, including himself, believe that more than a million dollars a year could be saved by making the salaries fit the work done in the departments, and these gentlemen are unquestionably right.

The House Democratic caucus came out strong against the retirement of the greenbacks and any extension of national banking privileges or reductions of their taxes, and for the recognition of Cuban belligerency and a "just and wise" bankruptcy law, but it did not say a word about Hawaii, although it had been previously announced that the caucus would declare against annexation. A resolution against annexation could easily have been put through the caucus by a majority vote, but as a number of influential Democrats announced their intention to bolt the caucus if it was done, it was decided to ignore Hawaii entirely.

The House committee on election of President, Vice-President and Representatives in Congress has made a favorable report on the joint resolution proposing to amend the Constitution so as to have Senators elected by direct vote; also on a bill allowing electoral returns to be forwarded to Washington by express or registered mail, instead of by messengers only as the law now prescribes. No matter what the House may do, the Senate is not yet ready to consent to the direct election of Senators. It is doubtful whether the sentiment in favor of the direct election of Senators is as strong in that body now as it was a few years ago.

It is said that Senator Hanna has declared to the President that he will not be responsible for the President's political future if the last Civil Service Cleveland order is not rescinded. This indicates the importance which the Republican leaders attach to the present situation. The President has not yet said what course he will pursue. Republican Senators who are interested in the matter say that the 45,000 offices will be soon made available for good and faithful Republicans.
