## NICE RUSSELL SPEECH.

What He Thought Good for Private Stockholders.

**Rates on Railroads Reduced For Fertilizers. Auditors Expense. Trying to Attach Pearson & Caldwell. Lien Bonds on the Increase.**

RALEIGH, N. C., Jan. 14, '98.  
A sad accident occurred here yesterday afternoon when five girls went out near the city limits to visit a playmate, and in handling a gun one of the girls accidentally fired it, and instantly killed little Pearl Weathers, aged 10.

The Park Hotel which was closed two weeks ago will tomorrow be opened as a family hotel by Mr. John A. Tucker. Mr. Kaney, the lessee of the Park Hotel in renting the hotel to Mr. Tucker stipulates that he is not to take any transient guests. The Yarboro House, that has the monopoly, now charges 10c a bus fare. The management is making an oversight and losing nickels by not charging for hat rack space at meals. Mr. Tucker has for a long time been connected with the hotel and will keep a good house.

It is stated that Col. Andrews in an interview at Salisbury says that soon after Russell was inaugurated he offered to sell the State's interest in the N. C. R. R. for \$30,000.00, and when asked "How about the private stockholders he said "The private stockholders be damned."

The Railroad commission has served notice on the different railroads to show cause as to why they should not reduce passenger rates. The commission issued an order reducing fertilizer rates in the State in car load shipments one sixth as to present rates.

Judge Purnell will, on Monday administer the oath of office to Henry C. Dockery the new U. S. Marshal for this district.

The State auditors report will show that the cost of bringing convicts to the penitentiary for the year ending November 30, 1897, was \$6,250.00 and the year before it was nearly \$9,000. The report will also show some of the other State expenses as follows. Executive department \$4,800; fugitives from justice; \$3,248.12; judiciary \$62,583.03; earnings and disbursements of penitentiary \$134,016.38; R. R. commission \$10,409.97; Geological survey, \$10,000; interest on 4 per cent State debt \$141,839.94 and on 6 per cent debt \$161,107. Pension warrants, \$103,757. The total expenditures for the State are \$1,303,904.41.

The R. R. commission yesterday had Mr. S. Otho Wilson up for having his 20 passes and he told them that he never had a pass until he was urged by Governor Russell to use them as a member of the board of equalization. Russell denies this but Wilson sticks to it.

R. O. Burton, Maj. Wilson's attorney goes to Washington on the 18th to make a motion before the U. S. court that Messrs. Pearson and Caldwell be attached for violating the superseas of the court. The commission did not meet today. The Superior court yesterday returned true bills against Col. A. B. Andrews

The Professor regards the news as being of sufficient importance to call for closer investigation.

## NOT ON THE FLOOR

But in Committee Rooms the Financial Question is Talked.

**Fight Against the Civil Service Law Not Going to Abate. It is Now Said That Annexation is Not so Certain After all.**

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 14.

Financial topics have been much discussed at the Capitol this week, but it was not on the floors of the House or Senate, but in the committee rooms and between individual Senators and Representatives. Early in the week Senator Chandler started the ball rolling, as it were, by declaring in the most emphatic language that he has just had a talk with President McKinley on the subject, and that the President was just as good a bimetalist as he (Chandler) was, and that he had not given up international bimetalism, but intended to send the commission to Europe again at the first favorable opportunity. Then there was a breezy little talk in the room of the Senate Finance committee on the resolution offered by Senator Teller, declaring U. S. bonds to be payable in silver dollars, at the option of the government. Consideration of the resolution was postponed a week. Then there were long financial talks by ex-Senator Edmunds and ex-Secretary Fairchild, members of the monetary commission, before the House committee on Banking, and Currency, in favor of the bill prepared and recommended by that commission.

If those who favor a retention of the present civil service status really believe, as they say they do, that the members of the House who said so many bitter things during the debate on the Legislative, Executive and Judicial appropriation bill, which was passed this week, are satisfied now that they have gotten their speeches in the Record which can be distributed among their constituents, they are likely to get a rude awakening later on. The ants are working harder than ever to make converts and are expressing confidence in their ability to get their bill providing for a modified civil service law before the House, and to pass it, before the present session closes. Some of them now express hope that the President will not modify the present rules, because that would weaken them, by satisfying some who would otherwise vote for their bill.

The outlook for the annexation of Hawaii through the treaty, which is now under discussion by the Senate, is not as good as it was a week ago, although the friends of the treaty are still claiming that the necessary two-thirds vote will be obtained for it. Senators Thurston, of Nebraska, and Gear, of Iowa, who had been put down as favoring the treaty, this week announced their intention to vote against its ratification; and Wellington, Maryland; Mason, of Illinois, and Spooner, of Wisconsin, are in doubt as to how they will vote. Guesses as to how long the Senate will debate the treaty before taking a vote run all the way from two weeks to three months.
