BLOCKED BY SNOW.

Railroads Barred, Storms at Sea. Much Damage, in Maine Traffic Has Ceased.

New York, February 2.—The great blizzard has brought a complete snow blockade. All through New England the storm has prevailed from the northeast and was the most severe in very many years.

Two passenger trains are stalled at Green Point on Long Island. The passengers have left the cars and are being taken care of in the farm houses near Riverhead.

Vessels have been dashed to pieces on the coast and a number of lives are lost.

Telegraphic communication between Boston and this city is still entirely cut off. Wires are leveled in all directions and the electric light service in all eastern towns is crippled by the mass of wet snow which lodged and broke the poles and wires.

In Maine the severity of the blizzard was felt to the utmost. The entire State is blocked and all travel is tied up.

It is now estimated that the storm has cost Boston two million dollars. The losses in the New England States is put at ten millions.

Japan Preparing For War.

LONDON, February 1.—A dispatch to the Daily Mail from Nagasaki, says: The far eastern situation is very serious and it is believed that Japan is actively preparing for war.

WAS REMEMBERED.

Ex-Collector Simmons Receives Presents From Employees.

Commission Still Disturbing Matters. Governor Takes a Vacation. Church Celebration. Leazer for Congress. Dissatisfaction Among Office Seekers.

RALEIGH, N. C., Feb. 2, '98.
Last night the old employees of the revenue office presented ex-Collector Simmons a handsome desk, couch and two chairs for his new law office.

The Railroad Commission reduced the rate in car load lots of corn about 3 1/2 per cent. They demanded that certified lists of all passes issued for the past 3 years by the A. C. L. and the S. A. L. At its last meeting the Commission asked very courteously the head officials of these two roads, if they were willing to give the Commission these lists, and they replied they would most probably do so. The Southern R. R. people said openly that they did not like the Commission's manner of ordering them to do a thing, and at the same time enquiring if the other railroads could do it. Now it seems the demand is made on the others also. The Commission orders the A. C. L. and the S. A. L. to furnish it with lists of all special freight rates granted to any persons or to hotels.

The Commission further orders that whenever freight is lost or damaged, or an over charge made, if the company shall fail in 30 days after notice to deliver the goods lost or damaged, in good order, or refund any over charge the company shall be liable for the full value of such goods.

One of the officers on the torpedo boat Winslow that had such a terrible time off Hatteras last week is ensign Worth Bagley of Raleigh. The boat had a close call, but proved herself a staunch one.

Governor Russell has gone to Wilmington to rest—after the notice that the U. S. Supreme court held probably out his pet commissioners.

The adjourned term of Federal Court will be given here on Feb. 8th.

Capt. S. A. Ashe after presenting the office furniture to ex-Collector Simmons on boarding a street car fell and hurt himself quite badly.

Mr. W. H. Willard who was operated on at Rex Hospital 10 days ago is very ill there.

It has been stated that if the U. S. Supreme Court decided against the new commissioners, that it would only reinstate Maj. Wilson as Otho Wilson failed to file bond for the supercedes. This is a mistake. J. S. Carr of Durham and H. C. Brown, clerk of the commission went on Otho Wilson's \$10,000 bond.

New carpets for the Revenue office here had been ordered and now they have come, and will be put down immediately. They are very handsome ones.

Thursday at the Roman Catholic church, will be celebrated the ceremony of the Heart of St. Blotus and of the Blessing of the Throat. This blessing is believed by the Romanists will prevent any serious throat trouble to all who go and receive it.

The steamer Lily, the State's oyster patrol boat and the one Governor Russell and Treasurer Worth were so opposed to, is undergoing repairs and being repainted.

This excessive cold comes in marked contrast to the bright spring like weather we had almost all of January. Yesterday the thermometer registered 22 degrees and today it went still lower, reaching 12 degrees.

A book club has been formed by the society girls here. They call themselves "The Four O'Clocks." It is purely a literary organization.

The name of A. C. Leazar the ex-superintendent of the penitentiary is to be used as the Democratic nominee for Congress from the 7th district so rumor has it.

About \$7,000 worth of improvements are to be made in the government building here during the spring.

It is said that Butler's opposition to Ewart for the U. S. Judgeship is because he is anxious for Judge Douglas to get it. It is a hard blow to Douglas to fail to get it.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1.—The condition in the Senate respecting the Hawaiian annexation treaty, has greatly improved and the friends of the treaty, including Senator Davis, chairman of the Foreign Relations Committee, are confident that sixty Senators, whose votes are necessary for a two-thirds majority, will vote for ratification. Confidence in the changed condition is found in the determination of the friends of ratification to press forward the treaty to a final vote.
