## IN THE WAY.

Speaker Reed Blocks Patriotic Action in Congress.

Naval Board Completes First Branch of Examination. Spanish War Vessels to be Watched. Spain to Buy War Vessels.

Special to Journal. WASHINGTON, March 4.—It is officially admitted at the Navy department that the Naval board of inquiry has completed only the first branch of the investigation of the cause of the explosion.

No opinions are expressed by those in a position to judge as to when the work of investigation will be completed, although it is evident that Secretary Long thinks the board will return to Havana soon and make a more detailed examination of the hull of the Maine and re-examine witnesses who have already testified.

Secretary Long gives assurances that he has no information bearing upon the cause of the explosion to be given to the public. This statement of the Secretary undoubtedly refers to official correspondence.

The President is in direct correspondence with Admiral Seward but it is possible that no correspondence relative to the actual work of the board of inquiry has passed between them. That the President has received some important information of some sort over the wire is likely.

Minister Woodford has warned the State Department by cable that in the future the movements of Spanish war vessels should be closely watched by the United States.

Secretary Long has authorized a statement denying the story that a partial report regarding the disaster had been received from the court of inquiry.

The most determined foe to every measure of prudence or precaution in this crisis is Speaker Reed.

Reed opposes every preparation for war with the most stubborn opposition. The Speaker "guesses" that the Maine was blown up by accident and on this guess stops all legislation looking to war.

HAVANA, March 4.—(Special)—Warm, rainy weather is here now and the divers are working slowly but steadily during such hours as are possible in the turbid water.

The Spanish divers have been down but little. Any reports sent as coming from them are not likely to be correct.

A cable received today from Madrid denies the report the order is countermanded sending the Spanish torpedo boats to Cuba.

NEW YORK, March 4.—(Special)—The Sun says today that the information is authoritative from Washington that Consul General Lee communicated direct to the President the opinion that the Maine was blown up by an exterior explosion.

LONDON, March 4.—(Special)—Spain has purchased two war ships now building by English firms for Brazil.

### Virginia Dore.

BALTIMORE, March 4.—Mrs. Robert Randolph Cotton, of North Carolina, yesterday afternoon, read her own poem, "Virginia Dare or the White Doe," before the Maryland Society of Colonial Dames, at a reception in her honor in the banquet hall of the St. James Hotel.

The poem deals with the life of the first white child born in the colonies, and has been read by Mrs. Cotton in various parts of the country. Everywhere it has been received with favorable comment. It will be published in book form.

### Destroying Landmarks.

Special to Journal. NEW YORK, March 4.—"Indian Head," one of the most historic landmarks on the banks of the Hudson was blown up by dynamite this morning.

Ten thousand witnessed the destruction of the mass of rock. As an engineering feat it was second only to the destruction of "Hell Gate." Seven thousand pounds of powder was used in the explosion.

## THE STATE CAPITAL.

Annual U. S. Appropriation for Naval Reserves.

Western Insurance Company Takes Out License. Applications for State Lands for Settlers. Equine Hospital. Cannon Ball Found.

JOURNAL BUREAU. RALEIGH, N. C., March 4. The criminal term of the Superior Court meets here on the 23rd. There are some very interesting cases to be tried at that term.

There are several cases of measles in the jail here.

Chairman Drewry of the street committee has made a very full report to the board of aldermen showing the work that has been done and is being done. Also the work in prospect. He urges that the street car service be extended out east, and that the company use box cars for the hauling of the stone from the rock quarry. There will probably be an Athletic Park equipped out in that direction instead of out west of the city.

The Young African who came here last fall to attend Shaw University (colored), and whose lungs showed evidence of consumption in January is improving rapidly at the Sanitarium for colored consumptives, that has been established at Southern Pines.

The Park Manufacturing company of Charlotte was incorporated by the State yesterday.

The Western Mutual Life Assurance company of Springfield Ill., yesterday filed papers for license to do business in North Carolina.

Langdon the forger was committed to jail yesterday after a preliminary hearing before the Mayor, in default of a \$500 bail.

Dr. J. R. Rogers of this city has just received a commission appointing him examining surgeon for the Federal Bureau of Penitentiaries at Raleigh. The appointment was made by U. S. Commissioner of Penitentiaries H. Clay Evans.

Assistant Secretary of the Navy Theodore Roosevelt has sent notice to the Adjutant General, that the annual appropriation for arming and equipping the Naval Reserves for this year has been made and that \$2,493.89 has been placed to the credit of North Carolina.

The Educational Board which has control of the State lands in North Carolina has had application made to it, for the purchase of 100,000 acres of cultivated land for the use of settlers. The request comes from Philadelphians.

Raleigh now has a thoroughly equipped Equine Hospital under the care of Mr. W. C. Mac Mackin. This is the only one in the State. There are now 14 horses there under treatment.

While digging up the granite foundation of the capital fence on the last face of the square yesterday a large six pound cannon ball was unearthed. From the make of the ball it is evident that it was made during the revolutionary war. It has never been exploded. It will rest hereafter in the State museum.

The San Jose Fruit scale has been discovered in the orchard of Prof. W. P. Massey at the Agricultural and Mechanical college.

The report of the Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor Statistics is just out from the printers, and will be distributed at once.

It seems to be rather the fad to be very careless in regard to prisoners. Some of the most prominent county prisoners in Wake county are called "trustees" and allowed to go about unguarded. The Supreme court has decided that there is no such thing as a "trustee" allowed by law.

The fight over the confirmation of Judge Ewart is really a fight between Butler and Fritchard. It only remains to be seen which will go to the wall.

Last night rain began to fall and has continued steadily ever since. It was greatly needed, and farmers hail it with joy.

Three regiments of the State guard now expect to go in camp at Charlotte on May 20th.

The passenger train of the S. A. L. yesterday afternoon killed two negro boys and two horses, and completely splintered a wagon at Warren Plains, between Raleigh and Weldon.
