SELLS ITS PLANT.

New Berne Telephone Company Sells Out. Important Improvements to Be Added by New Company.

The New Berne Telephone Company, yesterday consummated the sale of its entire plant and rights to the Henderson Telephone Company, of Henderson, N. C.

Messrs. H. P. Strouse, F. C. Forpliner and J. H. Bridgers, representing the Henderson Company, arrived in this city on Monday night, after consultation with the owners of the Telephone Co., here, the sale was effected yesterday morning.

Mr. H. P. Strouse, the head man of the company said to the JOURNAL after the purchase:

"We have looked over our purchase and found what is needed to improve the present telephone system of New Berne. We shall give New Berne an up-to-date telephone service, just as soon as we can get new material here."

Mr. F. C. Forpliner, who will come here, and act as superintendent, said:

"I am going away, but will be back about April 1st, when the transfer of the plant is to be made. During April I shall make over nearly everything on the old line, put in a new switch board, and the entire line will be newly equipped with the latest telephone appliances, and by May 1st, I expect to give New Berne a telephone service the equal of any in the country."

There can be no doubt that the new owners of the telephone in this city will give the people here a service which they will be glad to have and thoroughly appreciate and support.

AT THE SHOPS.

Repair Work Going on for the A. & N. C. Railroad Some Interesting Points.

The machine shops of the A. & N. C. Railroad are busy at this season, as the Spring business necessitates that everything shall be in good shape to handle it.

Engine No. 2 that has long done service as a switch engine will soon be one of the things that are not. It has survived its usefulness and some mill road may be able to secure its services for hauling logs. It's place will be taken in a few days by engine No. 8.

This engine has been in the shop for some time. It is now being thoroughly overhauled, new boiler tubes and all worn out parts replaced. The driving wheels have been put on the lathe and turned down until they are smooth and round.

The driving wheels of an engine are of great interest, not only to the mechanic but to any observer. They have a steel tire which is heated red hot and then sprung on by cooling. These tires are three inches thick or more when new, but they become worn unevenly by use and then must be cut down on a lathe until round again. As much as three-quarters of an inch must be cut off at times, so that the tire becomes too thin after several returns to the shop, and must be discarded. Seventy thousand miles would be a fair distance for the wheel to run before requiring returning.

In the car shop, parlor car 16, "Old North State" is being repaired and refurnished for the summer. Combination mail and baggage car 13 is being painted and repaired, and second class car 4 is also being painted. The molds are being made for the casting which takes place on Saturday in the foundry, which is always an interesting sight.

In the yard, now long relegated to the scrap pile are some interesting objects. These are the boiler, driving wheels and other parts of the old engine, "Dr. Hawks," which have been in the "bone yard" these 15 years. This engine was used during the war and was fitted up to carry the gun car, which carried a cannon protected by an iron shield. The cab and other parts of the engine were also sheathed in iron to protect the men from bullets or cannon shots. The old engine had many exciting adventures up and down the road in those old times.

Mr. W. R. Warters, Master Mechanic, looks after all the work at the shops and takes pride in seeing that everything is done as well as possible. The painting and repair work is especially closely looked after by Mr. Warters who is very polite in explaining those things to the uninitiated.

CHAIRMAN MANLY

Addresses the State Democracy. Redem the State.

To the Democratic Voters of North Carolina:

Pursuant to a resolution of the State Executive Committee adopted at its meeting held February 22nd, I hereby give notice that the Democratic State Convention, will be held in the city of Raleigh, at 12 o'clock noon, Thursday, May 26th, 1898.

The plan of organization, recently reprinted, is now in the hands of the Chairmen of the County Executive Committees, showing the regulations governing primaries and County conventions.

The Convention will consider the nomination of the Judges for the several Districts wherein the terms of the present incumbents expire January 1st, 1899; will announce the principles and policy of the party, and take such action as it may see proper.

Judicial Conventions should be held prior to the date fixed for the State Convention in the following districts: First, Second, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh and Eleventh.

The following resolution amending the plan of organization was adopted at the meeting of the Committee held in December 1897:

Resolved, That all white electors who intend to vote with us in the next election, and who desire the re-establishment of Anglo Saxon Supremacy and honest government in North Carolina, are cordially invited to participate in all our primaries and conventions."

In the adoption of such a resolution the Democratic party expresses no unkind feeling for the colored people of North Carolina. The record of charity and kindnesses, public and private, of the white people of this State to the colored race while the Democratic party was in full power, refutes such a suggestion. But the negro voter, with rare exceptions, cannot be considered one whom the great principles of government, the wisdom of economic policy, or the qualifications of public servants in their responsible offices, guides or controls in his choice of a ballot. His allegiance to the Republican party or its allies cannot be disturbed by the corrupt and disgraceful conduct of those for whom he votes. Thus, in this day, when the State is fast sinking into dishonor and shame under the hands of a fusion administration, which regards neither the rights of person or property, nor the good name and honor of the State, the call to duty is addressed to the white men of North Carolina.

In national matters no more vital principles can affect the people and their welfare than those which mark the present line of conflict, where the plain people of the country have thrown down the gauntlet of battle to the money power and the trusts. The increasing control of the necessities of life in the few, by open violation of the law, and the enhancement of the purchasing power of money, with the ever decreasing value of property, mark the exigency of the hour.

Of the affairs in our beloved State no words should be needed to awaken the patriotism of her sons. A political campaign is just ahead of us, in which the wage of the contest is the good name and prosperity of North Carolina. We should begin work at once; prescribing no test oath to our fellow citizens, but extending a warm welcome and full fellowship to all who want to join us in securing just laws and good government. An early convention is needed, where differences, if any exist, will be adjusted, the plan of fight mapped out and then a united Democracy will triumph.

I respectfully suggest that the county conventions should be held as soon as convenient for the election of delegates. The nomination of executive officers and members of the General Assembly may be postponed until later as each county convention may think advisable.
