DEMOCRACY WANTS YOUNG MEN

The Democratic party of North Carolina for a number of years has not given due consideration, nor placed any value upon the services of the young men of its party, or those who entering upon the rights of citizenship might be brought within the party, as workers and voters.

Thus young Democratic voter has only been considered in the light of utility, of what he could do in way of work and securing votes.

The thought that the average young Democratic voter should be in the line of political preferment, that he was entitled to just recognition for services given and rendered, has not shown itself in Democratic primaries or conventions, nor been a matter of concern in Democratic councils.

Very different has been the spirit displayed by Republican managers, in fact many times have overtures been made before political campaigns were begun, to desirable young white men, seeking to secure their services and adherence to Republicanism.

And these overtures in many instances have been of a most tempting character, and to resist them has required courage and strong conviction of principles, that Republicanism in North Carolina was not the right political faith for them to embrace.

The question does the Democratic party of North Carolina want the young man, will of course be answered at once in the affirmative.

But the question will the young man enter the Democratic party's ranks, is one which demands the best thought and endeavor of the party, in order that it may be successfully accomplished.

The really successful political party of today must deal in practical matters. It will not do to be sentimental, and think that by calling up '68, '72 or '76, and the scenes enacted in those stirring times will gain young voters today.

Every young man of North Carolina is much more concerned about his individual prospects, how shall it be with him today and tomorrow, than he is about the State's political past, which he regards as dead and buried, so far as it affects him.

The young man of today is ambitious, and the proper way, and only way to secure him is to open the lists for him, make the way attractive, and let him feel that individual merit will have its just reward.

This is most assuredly true in the political field, and no greater obstacle will the Democracy of North Carolina have to face, than these same young men, unless it opens its ranks freely and fully to them, and sincerely welcomes them, at the same time according them preferment in proportion to the merit displayed by them, individually.

The Democratic party of North Carolina wants young men in its ranks, not only for war, but also as councillors, young men who can fight in the ranks and who after the contest will be acknowledged as sharers in the victory.

It is the young and enthusiastic Democratic worker who is needed by the Democracy of North Carolina, and every effort should be made to secure him in this year's campaign.
