NOT DIRECT FROM DEWEY

But Advices From Singapore Say We Hold Manila.

INVASION AT ONCE.

Advance on Cuba to be Put in Immediate Execution.

INSURGENT LEADER KILLED.

Spain Calls Out the Reserves. Three Thousand Men to be Sent to Hold the Philippines. Admiral Sampson's Movements. Spain has Trouble at Home.

All is Well.

Special to Journal. NEW YORK, May 5.—Although Commodore Dewey has not been able to send to the government any official information from Manila, the Administration is not alarmed at his silence. It is believed that the connecting end of the cable running to Hong Kong may be still in the hands of the Spaniards.

The Journal publishes a dispatch from Singapore, through British sources, which says that the Americans hold Manila and are exercising the powers of government. The dispatch says that the forts have been reduced, and the Spanish fleet destroyed, and that the leader of the insurgents has been supplied by Commodore Dewey with arms for the rebels.

Private telegraphic advices received here this evening from Singapore confirm news that the American victory at Manila is complete.

England Watching.

At Halifax, Nova Scotia, the troop ship has been delayed in sailing and it is believed that it is due in a measure to the threatened interference in the Philippines on account of German interests. Orders were received at Halifax for the authorities to keep the newly arrived battery of the Leinster regiment in readiness in case it be necessary to order the men from Halifax to Manila. The troop ship was ordered into the stream.

Affairs in Spain.

In the Senate at Madrid Lieut. General Corrales, the Minister of War today submitted a bill authorizing him to mobilize the second army reserves for service in the Canaries.

While attempting to carry on war against the United States, Spain has her hands full in quelling domestic troubles, and rioting was resumed today in many towns with great vigor. At Murcia a mob of eight thousand was fired on by the troops and many people were killed and wounded. The price of bread has become high and is one of the chief causes of the disturbances.

The Invasion.

WASHINGTON, May 5.—(Special)—The activity in war preparations reported in Spain, has hurried the administration's plans for the operations in Cuba. The plans which were laid for the future will now be put in immediate operation.

That the invasion of Cuba is near at hand is evidenced by the arrival at Tampa of three more transports late this afternoon and the preparations for embarkation which are being rushed with all possible haste.

General Shafter arrived at Port Tampa for the first time. It is probable that the ships of the expedition will sail as soon as they can be loaded with men and arms. The near approach of the hour of sailing has created intense excitement at Tampa and Key West, at which latter place the mobilization of the troops will be begun tomorrow in earnest. Eight hundred Cubans under command of General Lacerate and Sanquilly will leave at once to join the forces of General Gomez, by order of Admiral Sampson.

The Spanish Prisoners.

The Spanish officers and men from the prize ships that have been held at Key West as prisoners of war will be confined in Fort McPherson at Atlanta, Georgia. Some of them left for Atlanta this morning. The Spanish prisoners taken on board the steamer Argonauta were turned over to C. J. Morrill of the Key West garrison by Naval Commandant Forsyth today.

Blanco Talks.

Captain General Blanco at a meeting of the Cuban Congress at Havana delivered a rapid speech threatening the United States with annihilation, and deploring the reports of the victory which he said was alleged to have been gained at Manila by the Americans. Blanco is

preparing to meet the coming invasion of the United States Army by concentrating all the Spanish forces around Havana.

The Alleged Spy

The Spanish spy Yglesias, who was caught near the twelve inch magazine on the Monitor Puritan, has been sent to Fort McPherson at Atlanta. The evidence against him was not direct enough to convict him.

The Navy Department feels anxiety regarding the whereabouts of the torpedo boat Erricon and an attempt will be made to locate her if she does not return to the fleet at Key West by tomorrow.

May Bombard Noon.

If the department hears definitely that the Spanish fleet is now at the Canaries the silencing of the guns at Merro may shortly begin, and a division of the fleet be sent to Porto Rico to seize that island. Admiral Sampson's orders have been to confine his operations to blockade duty and not provoke attack from the Cuban forts at Havana. But now that the Spanish fleet is two weeks sail from the gulf, he may be permitted to begin the work of demolishing the fortifications, while the army is held in readiness to be conveyed to Cuba. The safety of the Oregon will no longer be questioned if the fleet is at the Canaries, and her arrival at Key West would antedate the Spanish fleet by several days.

The Pacific Coast.

Preparations are being rushed at the Mare Island Navy yard, San Francisco, for the transportation of troops to the Philippines to reinforce Commodore Dewey in his possession of Manila, which is believed to be assured.

Outfits are completing for three thousand men, who are to leave for four months service in the East. Already six hundred Californians are in barracks, awaiting orders to leave.

The cruiser Charleston is ordered to leave the Pacific coast for Manila not later than May 15th. The leaving of the Pacific coast of Charleston and other vessels is considered safe as Spain has no fleet in the Pacific since the destruction of their fleet at Manila.

Insurgent Loss.

Word has reached Key West that in a fight between Spaniards and Cubans, the insurgent leader Colonel Joan Delgado was killed. In this skirmish there were twenty one Spaniards and Cubans killed. The fight took place in Havana Province.

The Alfonso XIII.

The big transport ship the Alfonso XIII is officially announced at Madrid to have arrived at Porto Rico.

The vessel left Spain for Havana carrying 1,100 soldiers, supplies and half a million dollars. The Navy Department hoped to make a prize of this vessel and instructions were given to Captain Sampson to look out for her. A special service of some of the best American ships were detailed to effect the capture before a port was reached.

ALL A CAMP.

Raleigh All Interested in Military Affairs. C. F. & T. V. to be Sold as An Entirety, State Items.

JOURNAL BUREAU.

Raleigh, N. C., May 5. Governor Russell yesterday appointed Calvin D. Cowles of Wilkes, Lt. Colonel of the 1st Regiment, and Andrew D. Lt. Colonel of the 2nd. The Colonel for the 2nd has not yet been appointed. Col. W. H. S. Burgwyn, Capt. B. F. Dixon, and ex-Judge Spier Whitaker are the names discussed for the place. The State Guard numbers 30 companies. Of these 15 companies have volunteered.

All the companies in the 1st Regiment have been mustered into the service of the government.

The pay of the officers per year is as follows: Colonels, \$3,500; Lt. Colonels, \$3,000; Majors, \$2,500; Captains, \$2,000; 1st Lieutenants, \$1,800; 2nd Lieutenants, \$1,500; Chaplains, \$1,500; Surgeons, \$1,500; Privates, \$1,350.

The Governor now has the appointment of a Colonel for the 2nd Regiment, three Majors, four Adjutants and a Chaplain for the second. One Major and two Adjutants for the 1st regiment and some minor officers. Each company of course has 1 Captain and 2 Lieutenants.

The United States Quartermaster General has telegraphed that all rejected men must pay their way back home.

The health officer reports for April 30 deaths, and 30 births. Both about evenly divided between the two races.

The Mayor of the city has tendered to Bryan Grimes Camp the free use of the bath houses, and bathing pool at Pullen Park. There are no facilities for bathing right at the camp.

Nearly every store in the city will be closed during the Memorial ceremonies on Tuesday May 10th.

The Cape Fear & Yadkin Valley R. R. case has been decided by the U. S. Court of Appeals, and the road will be sold as an entirety. The opinion is written by Judge Goff, Judge Farnell dissenting.

There is very harsh criticism of the management of the Commissary department of the camp here. Some of the men who for "patriotism" volunteered to fight for the flag, any and every where, have actually suffered here, in our midst for food. It is a disgrace to the men at the head of this camp.

In the Superior Court yesterday in the case of State Treasurer Worth vs. Stewart Bros ex-publio printers, S. F. Mordecai Esq. was made referee to report to the court.

The Leazar Literary Society of the Agricultural and Mechanical college will give their 6th annual oratorical contest May 6th.

The second company being raised here

has disbanded for lack of a sufficient number to volunteer.

The W. C. T. U. petition Governor Russell to prohibit the sale of liquors at the camp.

The Academy of Music has been leased by Mr. R. C. Rives for the coming season. He has now gone north to book good attractions.

Dr. J. J. Mott who is at the head of the silver Republicans in this State has issued a call for them to organize for the coming campaign.

The volunteers in camp here are entitled to pay from April 27th, so says the Adjutant General.

Capt. Gresham who was appointed as mustering officer for the camp, will as soon as his duties are completed next week, apply for active duty with his regiment.

This afternoon the 1st Regiment was paraded on the drill ground of the camp for inspection. The strength of the regiment is 1036.

The Adjutant General has been notified that in Salem a man named Eugene Fouché has displayed in front of his office a U. S. recruiting poster, and on a black board by it are these words: "No one who ever fought against Uncle Sam need apply." Governor Russell authorized the Adjutant General to telegraph Fouché to remove the placard and inscription at once.

At Guilford Battle Ground tomorrow there will be a monument to "Light Horse Harry," Lee's boy bugler, unveiled. It is raised by Oak Ridge Institute.

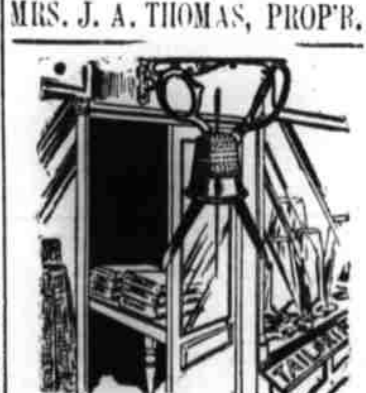
