DIOCESAN COUNCIL.

Its Fifteenth Annual Session Begun Yesterday.

Meetings Full of Interest and Largely Attended. Meetings in Christ Church. Proceedings of Yesterday. Today's Program.

The Fifteenth Annual Council of the Protestant Episcopal church in the Diocese of East Carolina, met in Christ Church, yesterday.

There was a large attendance at the several sessions held yesterday.

The Council was called to order by the Rt. Rev. Bishop of the Diocese.

The roll of clergy and lay delegates was called and a quorum found to be present.

Rev. Dr. Carmichael was elected president and Rev. F. N. Skinner, secretary of the Council.

Rev. N. Harding announced the presence of the Rt. Rev. James B. Cheshire, Jr., Bishop of the Diocese of North Carolina, and on motion, he was invited to a seat by the side of the presiding Bishop.

The hour of 11 o'clock having been set for divine service a recess was taken.

A procession of the clergy was formed at the Rectory, and in their vestments they moved into the church while the choir sang.

The sermon was preached by Rev. Dr. Jas. Carmichael from—Ephesians, "As unto the Lord" The holy communion was then celebrated by Rt. Rev. Bishop Watson, assisted by Rt. Rev. Bishop Cheshire, and some of the clergy.

The Council convened immediately afterwards and the Rules of Order were adopted.

The hours of the business sessions were decided to be from 9.30 a. m. until 6 p. m., daily, with a recess from 1.30 to 4 o'clock each afternoon. A recess was then taken until 4 p. m.

At the afternoon session, Bishop Cheshire addressed the Council on behalf of St. Mary's School, Raleigh.

After Bishop Cheshire's address the following resolution was offered by Rev. Dr. Rolt. Strange: "That the Trustees of the Diocese be authorized and directed to turn over to the Trustees of St. Mary's school, the sum of \$3,000, of the fund for the Education of Children of Deceased clergymen, school trustees to obligate one annual scholarship, scholar to be designated by Bishop of East Carolina."

The resolution referred to committee to report Friday.

Reports were made by Finance, Students Aid, and Commissioners of American Church Building committees.

The following were appointed a Finance committee: Rev. L. L. Williams, Rev. I. W. Hughes, Mr. Wm. Calder, Mr. Geo. H. Roberts, Mr. H. G. Smallbones.

At night, Rev. L. L. Williams and Rev. W. L. Lovelless, read the services.

Addresses were made by Rev. F. B. Ticknor, Rev. Edward Wooten, Rev. Francis Joyner, Rev. N. C. Hughes and Bishop Watson.

Today's services will be, early service at 7.30 a. m.

Annual meeting Women's Auxiliary of the Diocese, in All Saints Chapel.

At Christ Church, in the morning, Bishop Watson's address, the annual elections, and reports during the day sessions.

Services at 8.15 p. m. tonight.
