## NOT FAR APART.

News of Spanish Fleet at Santiago de Cuba Confirmed.

## PROBABLY NOW FIGHTING

Much Damage Done at the San Juan Bombardment.

Several Spanish Vessels Arrive at Porto Rico. Estimates of the Cost of War are Large. Cervera May Get Into Cienfuegos and Hide.

At Santiago de Cuba

Special to Journal. WASHINGTON, May 20.—Information confirming the dispatches from Madrid announcing the arrival of the Spanish fleet at Santiago de Cuba, has been received today at Washington.

In proceeding to Santiago de Cuba the authorities say that Spain has made a decidedly good move and that her agents have been keeping Admiral Cervera well advised of the position of Admiral Sampson's squadron.

The Spanish squadron is making a feint at Santiago, Cuba, in an endeavor to draw Admiral Sampson and Commodore Schley in that direction, that Cervera may get the faster American vessels into a running fight with the idea of separating the New York or other cruisers from the more formidable and slow-going battleships, at the same time maintaining a position in which he could reach San Juan de Porto Rico without danger of being intercepted.

The Porto Rico Fight.

Accounts of the attack by Admiral Sampson on San Juan, Porto Rico, have been received from the steamer Arcadia, which sailed from that port on May 14th.

Captain Lloyd of the Arcadia says that twenty Spaniards were killed during the bombardment of the forts by the American vessels, and that sixty were wounded, and that many houses were damaged. One of the guns at the fort was destroyed and two others were dismounted.

The Arcadia brings the report that on May 14th, the fleet of the Spanish war vessels arrived at Aquia Bay, San Domingo.

Another Report.

Forty residents of Porto Rico arrived at New York today on the steamship Pratia. They left San Juan after Sampson's bombardment, the vessel sailing from St. Thomas on May 15th.

J. Van Sickle, agent of the Standard Oil Company, says that the American fleet caused great damage to the forts and towns. To keep out Sampson's vessels the Spaniards had sunk two old hulks in the harbor, thus forming a new channel necessary to be entered by.

The Spanish warships Alfonso XIII, Isabel II, Concho and Creole have arrived at San Juan, Porto Rico.

Movement of Ships. The monitor Wyandotte has arrived in harbor at Boston. The steamer Yucatan sailed from New York today to be used to convey troops from Tampa to the coast of Cuba.

The auxiliary cruiser Yankee which sailed yesterday from Delaware Breakwater, was sighted at Block Island. She was then signalled by a torpedo boat and both left in the direction of Newport, Rhode Island.

The United States auxiliary cruiser Harvard, sailed from St. Pierre, Martinique. Her departure may be quickly followed by that of the Spanish torpedo boat destroyer Terror, which has completed the repairs that detained her at Port de France.

The Terror is expected to leave Port de France within a few hours, and may follow and attempt to destroy the Harvard.

Army Matters.

General Fitzhugh Lee today made his staff appointments. The entry of General Lee on active duty will be as follows:

Secretary Alger estimates the expenses necessary to be incurred under the plans laid out for the army at \$38,000,000. The total of all the appropriations already made and the estimates made in by the Departments for the war reaches to date the sum of \$203,000,000.

The Bankers and Brokers' regiment of New York City offered to the government has been refused acceptance.

Governor Bushnell of Ohio has offered to the government 125,000 troops for the Cuban invasion.

Oregon Approaching.

Unless intercepted by the Spanish fleet, which is now considered improbable, the battleship Oregon will beat Key West by Monday next.

It developed today that the Oregon did not stop at the Barbados, as was reported yesterday, but was sighted by the

American consul passing that place at full speed. The phenomenal run made by the Oregon has been a matter of great satisfaction in naval circles. She covered the 3,578 miles between Bahai, Brazil, and the Barbados within eight days, or at the rate of thirteen and four-tenths knots an hour.

Insurgents Waking Up.

KINROSS, Jamaica, May 19.—Refugees who arrived here today from Santiago de Cuba on the steamer Adula say the insurgent district commanders in Eastern Cuba are moving nearer and nearer Santiago.

Brigadier General Mialez, by order of Gen. Calixto Garcia, has brought insurgent forces from the extreme east of Cuba to the neighborhood of Caluanero, on the south coast, and Brigadier General Castillo, of the insurgent army, shifts his command to within twenty-five miles of Santiago.

May Try Cienfuegos.

Washington, May 19.—If Admiral Cervera once gets into Cienfuegos harbor he would be comparatively safe at an anchorage over ten miles beyond its narrow entrance and wholly out of range of American naval rifles. The operation of eventually extricating himself from this refuge would be dangerous to a desperate degree, but strategists whose admiration has been repeatedly forced in the past week by Cervera's consummate skill do not believe this would deter him, and do not question that he would accept the meagre hazard of slipping out some stormy night, especially as the rainy season is practically beginning now in Cuba.

In Cienfuegos, as long as he chose to remain there, and his supplies lasted, Cervera would enjoy security, for no American warship could attempt to penetrate its long, narrow, tortuous entrance with any hope of success. Its lack of invulnerable land batteries is more than compensated by the comparative ease of its defense with torpedoes and with the destroyers attached to Cervera's force.

RALEIGH, N. C., May 20.

The ladies of Raleigh yesterday presented a handsome silk, North Carolina flag to the Governor's Guard, the Raleigh company.

Mr. John W. Hardin one of the most popular young men here has been appointed acting Adjutant General, during General Cowles absence.

It is said that when the Second Regiment is completed it will be ordered to Tybee, Ga.

The negroes have not as yet been ordered to Fort Macon. This will be done some time next week it is thought.

Governor and Mrs. Russell last night tendered a reception at the mansion to the commissioned officers of the two regiments.

There are many soldiers sick in the Hospital out at Camp Bryan Grimes.

The Ladies Relief Association yesterday passed resolutions of condolence for the death of the young man, Boltz of Carteret county who lost his life in cutting the cable down in Cuban waters.

Dr. Stockard, the first surgeon of the 2nd Regiment has arrived and he will today begin his duties.

It will cost the government \$15.34 a man to carry the 1st Regiment to Tampa—or very nearly \$5,000. Of all the regiments that have been transported the expense so far has been about \$1,000,000.

Governor Russell was very indignant last night when shown a telegram stating that it was reported he had said that the North Carolina volunteers were panic stricken and that drafting would have to be resorted to get up the required number.

After the sorrows of bidding the soldiers good bye yesterday, thinking they would leave today for Tampa, at 9 o'clock this morning orders for movement of troops were revoked. It is said that the reason for this is because there are too many troops at Tampa already. They may be sent to Miami, Florida.

The News and Observer of this city will send a correspondent along with the North Carolina boys to write them up.

The troops yesterday expressed their sincere thanks to the Ladies Relief Association for their thoughtfulness in looking after them while in camp here.

Mr. W. E. Christian who is so well known as a writer is now connected with the New York Herald Bureau at Washington, D. C.

The Supreme Court will adjourn for this term the end of next week.

The North Carolina Press Association will this year meet in Waynesville. The exact date will be given in a few days, but it will be about June 22nd.

Miss Mildred Barbee, daughter of Mr. Ed H. Barbee of this city, died at the home of her Aunt Mrs. C. G. Latta, this morning. She was taken sick on Monday with appendicitis and peritonitis. Dr. McGuire of Richmond reached here last night—but too late to do any good.

Mildred was a pupil at Peace Institute and was there when taken sick. She was about 16 years old and a general favorite with all who knew her.

The University commencement will be on May 29th. The programme is a very elaborate one. There are 35 graduates.
