AS SEEN IN PARIS.

Admiral Cervera Did Well in Getting His Fleet Shut up in Santiago.

PARIS, May 26.—Now that the presence of Admiral Cervera's squadron in the Bay of Santiago seems to be established, naval experts here are studying the problem what will be the probable result if he is attacked. In general Cervera is believed to have scored a point and to have acted both prudently and rationally in shutting himself up in the bay.

Spain's only policy is to prolong the war without giving a chance for a decisive battle until the odds for victory are all in her favor. By taking refuge in the bay of Santiago, out of reach of the enemy's cannon, Admiral Cervera has carried out a policy that circumstances have rendered it imperative for his country to follow, seeing that by gaining time he enables a juncture to be effected with him by the reserve squadron now being fitted out at Cadiz.

By entering the bay Cervera holds part of the American squadron. He is completely sheltered in a magnificent harbor, where he can leisurely re-provision his ships, rest his crews and put his engines in good order. He compels his adversary to maintain a strict blockade, that is to say to be continually on the alert in all weather, to use up coal, weary the crews and wear out engines and boilers.

WILL HE FIGHT?

Question of what Admiral Cervera will do. Schley May Have a Chance to Engage.

WASHINGTON, May 26.—Seventy-seven men-of-war now inclose Cuba in a circle of high-powered guns. These vessels are all under the command of Admiral Sampson and form the strongest fleet ever assembled by the United States government.

Schley and not Sampson will fight any naval battle that may occur in the next few days. Admiral Sampson's fleet, which was sent early this week supposedly toward the eastern end of Cuba to cut off any attempt which the Spanish admiral might make to escape through the Windward Passage north, is now understood to have returned to Havana waters by orders of the department, and Commodore Schley's ships have been left to take care of the entire situation near Santiago.

Naval men are of the opinion that Cervera recognized he was closely pressed and sought Santiago as the nearest harbor of refuge. Securing but a limited supply of coal at Cacao and estimating the number of miles he had to steam to the Cuban coast, it has been reckoned that Cervera had none too much fuel on hand and decided that it would be risky to expend that in what would probably be a futile effort to get into Havana.

Closed tight in a harbor whose narrow entrance forbids the exit of but one ship at a time, he has so placed himself that it would not be a hard task, some officers say, for a single American battleship to lay outside and finish each Spanish vessel before others could get near enough to use effectively their main batteries.

A leading problem with which the war board is confronted is, how long will it be before Cervera is compelled to make a desperate effort to get out, for it is not considered assured that he can be forced to surrender through starvation. When his resources reach their lowest ebb he will probably make a break, if every vessel is lost in the effort. That there will be a sea fight is still expected, but the time when it may occur seems to the experts as vague now as two weeks ago, when the Spanish fleet appeared at Martinique.

BUT STILL SOME DOUBT!

The Two Correspondents Are Exchanged for Spanish Prisoners.

ON THEIR WAY TO KEY WEST.

Regiments Under Second Call Ordered Filled. President Waiting Before Ordering Invasion Until Spanish Fleet Located. Crisis at Madrid. Troops in Spain.

WASHINGTON, May 27—All movements of the United States troops to Cuba and Porto Rico await the decision of President McKinley.

The President opposes the beginning of the transportation of troops from Key West and Tampa until the location of a Spanish fleet is absolutely determined.

The belief that Schley had the Spanish vessels cooped up in Santiago harbor has been very strong. Yet the uncertainty still remaining keeps the government officials guessing.

It is announced that General Miles will certainly leave for Tampa Saturday night to prepare for the invasion of Porto Rico, but the President may not order the sailing of the transports yet.

A ministerial crisis is imminent at Madrid. The necessity for raising money for war purposes is very urgent. Trouble is likely to arise over the proposed impost tax.

It is also believed that the defeat of the Spanish fleet, which the best informed people regard as only a question of a few days, is bound to precipitate an outbreak.

Latest From Schley.

A private cable received tonight from Port au Prince, Haiti, says that Cervera was in Santiago harbor last Wednesday before that day and has kept close guard ever since.

Spanish Spies.

The arrest of Spanish spies at Tampa will likely lead to important results, as information gained from them is of great importance.

These spies are believed to have been in close communication with Madrid by means of agents in Washington and Paris through whom news of the movement of American vessels was transmitted.

The Second Call.

The Secretary of War telegraphed the Governors of the States today to fill the regiments required under the second call for 75,000 volunteers.

Twelve States are behind in the response to the first call for volunteers. It was said at the War Department that hopes were entertained these States would soon return a full quota. New England and the Middle State have all their men mustered in, as have the Pacific States. In the central southwest Iowa and Michigan are the only States which had not filled their complement. The Southern States which have not completed their muster are Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, North Carolina, Virginia and Tennessee.

For Manila.

Five thousand more troops will leave San Francisco Sunday to reinforce Admiral Dewey at Manila. They will be carried on the steamships China 1900 men, Colon 750 men, Centennial 750 men, Zealandia 1000 men, and Ohio 1000 men. So far only 2000 men have left for the Philippines. Seven thousand men are waiting in camp at San Francisco, while the government is making every effort to secure vessels to transport the troops.

Exchange of Prisoners.

The State Department has been notified by the British Consul General at Havana that Tarral and Jones, the New York World newspaper correspondents were exchanged for two Spaniards who have been held by the United States as prisoners of war.

to retreat because of the insurgents failing to co-operate in the landing of supplies and ammunition for them.

The correspondents were transferred to the United States dispatch boat Maple and sailed from Havana for Key West.

All Quiet at Manila.

The situation at Manila remains unchanged according to advices received to day by Admiral Dewey. The United States auxiliary gunboat Scairo arrived at Hong Kong, having on board Capt. Gridley of the cruiser Olympia, flagship of Admiral Dewey. With him were two officers from vessels of the fleet who are leaving on account of sickness.

Vessel Movements.

Ten thousand Spanish troops are massed at Valencia and other forces are arriving. They are supposed to be designed for the threatened expedition against Dewey.

The steamer India from Philadelphia, now at Seattle, Washington, will be impressed by the government for use as a transport for troops to the Philippines.

The cruiser Lancaster sailed from Charleston for Key West today and will be flagship for Commodore Remy.

PLENTY OF MEN.

Third Regiment Already Provided For. The Negro Regiment.

RALEIGH, N. C., May 26.—The adjutant-general says he has tenders now in hand for the twelve companies necessary to make up the Third Regiment, which will be of white troops, and which will be re-invoiced here at Camp Grimes. He expects to mobilize the regiment in a week and certainly within ten days.

The negro battalion will be increased to a regiment and will be termed the Fourth Regiment. James H. Young, colored, will be colonel. He says that besides three companies which have already been inspected by the surgeons, there are twelve others from which to make up a regiment, and that they will be ready in a few hours after orders to rendezvous are received. The rendezvous will be at Morehead City.

The muster of the second Regiment is verified. It has only about 200 rifles and about 300 uniforms. There is, as yet, no intimation as to when arms and equipments for it will arrive.
