WHAT FLEET IS THAT?

Consul at Rio Reports Spanish

Ships Bound for Manila.

THE SANTIAGO MYSTERY

Schley to Endeavor to End the Uncertainty.

Austria Acting Ugly. Insurgents at Manila Are Active. Vessels Preparing at Navy Yards. Attempt to Storm Santiago Will be Made.

Special to Journal. WASHINGTON, May 28.—The U. S. States Consul at Rio Janeiro, Brazil, has cabled to the State Department at Washington to watch the Spanish fleet, that reports will show that the fleet is bound for Manila.

Whether the fleet is the one that has been lying at Cadiz, or Cervera's fleet supposed to be shut up in Santiago harbor is not known.

Commodore Schley is authorized to call for volunteers to serve as spies to go upon the hazardous service of finding out by observation whether the Spanish warships of Admiral Cervera are actually within the harbor of Santiago de Cuba. The fact that Captain-General Blanco has cabled to Madrid that Admiral Cervera's squadron is still at Santiago de Cuba, and that the bulk of Admiral Sampson's fleet is blockading that port, should cause suspicion Commodore Schley's fleet, he states, is watching the Yucatan channel, at the Western end of Cuba. The position of the two American commanders is the reverse of that given.

Long Thinks It There. The opinion of Secretary Long is that Cervera's position is unchanged. Among the subordinate officials of the department doubt is beginning to creep in as to the correctness of the department's information concerning the Spanish fleet. It is admitted by the department and by the officers with whom the department has been in telegraphic communication, that not an American eye has rested upon the Spanish fleet, the information received being given to the accounts by insurgents operating in the vicinity of Santiago.

From information obtained today there is reason to believe that while Commodore Schley with his squadron is now before the harbor of Santiago, he has not been there the length of time which the department has believed.

To Attack Santiago. A movement on the town where Admiral Cervera is supposed to be lying is decided upon by the government. Ten thousand United States troops will be landed on the coast near there and will be joined by an equal force of insurgents under General Garcia. The combined forces will move for the seizure of the place.

A dispatch from Colon, Isthmus of Panama, says that heavy cannonading was heard last night south-east of Dominica.

Manila. A dispatch from Hong Kong says that General Aguinaldo, chief of the insurgent forces in the Philippines, has thirty thousand troops ready to make an attack on Manila.

Trouble with Austria. Charges are made that the Austrian minister at Washington, von Hengerous, has been operating a spy system for the benefit of Spain, communicating information to the Madrid Government. It is feared that this action on the part of the minister may embroil this country with Austria.

Naval Reserve. The Naval Reserve of Charleston, S. C., boarded the collier Celtic today and took charge of the vessel.

The cruisers Atlanta, Chicago and Toledo at the navy yard will be ready to sail in two weeks. Eight transports are also nearly ready to go to sea for the transferring of troops to Cuba.

M. C. Butler of South Carolina was today embraced by the President as Major General of volunteers. It is announced that the President will

next Tuesday pardon Capt. Jno. D. Hart who is now in jail for Cuban filibustering.

How The Oregon Was Heard From. Key West, Fla., May 27.—As an illustration of the alertness of the United States consular agents in the West Indies to aid the government in every way possible, some details of the battle ship Oregon's arrival in the Barbadoes are apropos.

It was just daylight on the morning of May 18 that the Oregon arrived at Bridgetown, Barbadoes, and was put under strict quarantine. Police boats surrounded the ship and Captain Clark was not allowed to send any messages to his government on account of the neutrality declaration.

But the American consul there had stolen a march. As soon as he saw the Oregon entering the harbor and before the Governor had issued a prohibition as to messages, the consul had cabled the State Department and the Washington authorities knew that the battle ship was safe.

In spite of the neutrality laws, the British at Barbadoes showed great enthusiasm toward the Oregon.

France Changing. Paris, May 27.—Nothing could better indicate the change in the French press with regard to America than a leader on foreign topics in the Gaulois this morning.

While not among the rabid opponents of the United States, the Gaulois has certainly not been among America's warmest admirers since the war broke out. It bases its leader on a dispatch from New York published in yesterday's Matin.

The truth is, the French press is wild at seeing the current of sympathy between England and the United States becoming more decided every day. One cannot too often repeat that the French have only themselves to blame for a great deal of this current, and although the press may declare that the rumors of France's hostility to America are created in England, it is worth noting that a great many of them seem to date from Madrid.

Reported Spanish Vessels. PANAMA, May 27.—Passengers arriving here yesterday on an Italian steamer from Cartagena report that they saw three warships, supposed to belong to the Spanish fleet. One passenger, who had a powerful marine glass, said he discerned four others. The ships were apparently heading for Port Limon, Costa Rica.

A correspondent at Port Limon cables that about 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon eight ships were sighted about 10 miles from that port. Owing to a heavy fog, it was impossible to distinguish the flags of the fleet, but from the size and form of the vessels, it is believed that they were war vessels. They were going northerly and about half past 6 o'clock disappeared from view.

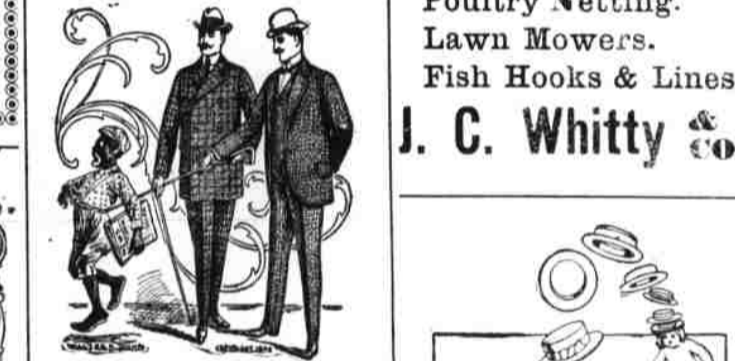
