SCHLEY IS FIGHTING AT SANTIAGO!

He Forces the Harbor Entrance and Attacks the Spanish Fleet

A DESPERATE STRUGGLE.

According to Advices From Several Points Schley Won.

Spanish Succeeded in Capturing a Prominent Cuban. Cadiz Fleet May Threaten Coast. Spain Willing to Delay Fighting. Tiring of the Struggle.

First News.

WASHINGTON, May 31.—Meagre advices first began to reach here from Cape Hatten that the American fleet was forcing an entrance into Santiago harbor.

Further advices from Cape Hatten then came that information was received through Havana that the American fleet began cannonading the forts at Santiago at 3 o'clock this afternoon. The batteries at Morro Castle, Laizcaya and Punta Garza were bombarded.

At the same time the American vessels began an engagement with the Spanish warships.

The report of the engagement as received from Kingston, Jamaica, was that Commodore Schley lured out the Spanish fleet by means of a decoy vessel. The result of the ruse on the part of Schley was that the Spanish began by an attempted attack on the American vessels with their torpedo boats.

The attack by Schley on the batteries then followed. The firing on the fortifications after a time seemed to gradually slacken but was more accentuated in the locality where the fleets were engaged. The heavy cannonading between the fleets was taking place at 8.35 in the afternoon.

The report now is from Cape Hatten that Schley razed the Santiago forts and sailed onward smashed the Spanish ships and that many Spaniards were killed.

How many Spanish ships were lost is not known but that Schley forced the entrance to the harbor is admitted.

The last advices are that the cable from Santiago to Cape Hatten was still working late in the day and at that hour the advantage appeared to be with the Americans. The advices then were that the combat was still in progress.

A Spanish Capture. Circumstances point strongly that the Spanish have captured Vice President Capote of the Cuban Republic.

Capote was on board the Belvidere owned in Boston. The Belvidere was lured ashore off Cape Mayal at the eastern end of Cuba, by false signals. The steamer Ethelred was supposed to have rescued the passengers, but arrived at Kingston reported that on boarding the wreck all on board had left.

Key West, Fla., May 30.—Officers of the blockading fleet express their positive belief that now is the time for an invasion of Cuba, and give as reasons the fact that the Spanish fleet is no longer a menace, that the weather is now suitable for landing troops, and what is equally important, that it is favorable for the monitors. It is these vessels that are relied upon for efficient work when it comes to an attack on the Havana batteries.

The ships are kept in battle trim, but in their dingy and discolored garbs of fighting gray no one would ever recognize the spick-and-span structures with which Americans are familiar.

The flagship New York, which had left for some undiscovered reason, rejoined the fleet this morning. Commodore Watson paid a visit to the ship and there was a long consultation between the commander-in-chief and his ranking subordinates.

Policy to Wait. VALENCIA, May 30.—The "death or victory" policy hitherto advocated in the conduct of the war no longer finds support here. The watchword is to wait. "Let us weary out the enemy and Europe by prolonging the struggle," say these tacticians. "What we have lost is already lost, and every day that passes without seeing effective occupation of Cuba by an American army brings us nearer a reaction in American opinion against the jingoism that provoked the war and increases the impatience of com-

mercial Europe at its continuance." War subscriptions are visibly flagging. The principal recent contributions have been drawn from patriotic bull fights and theatrical performances, which a large section of the community condemns as an unworthy and even disgraceful means of stimulating patriotism in times of national peril.

The Cadiz Fleet. NEW YORK, May 30.—Is Spain's Cadiz squadron on its way to western waters? "This is the question which naval officers are asking each other, and they have taken means to secure a solution by dispatching the auxiliary cruiser St. Louis to ascertain its whereabouts and cable the result of her search to Washington.

While Capt. C. F. Goodrich, commanding the St. Louis, was in Washington Saturday he carefully went over the situation with the naval war board. Confident of the hemming in of the Spanish fleet at Santiago de Cuba, the chief concern of the authorities is to prevent Spain from dispatching a relief naval force to western waters. It was pointed out today that this government would be in a sorry plight if the second Spanish squadron were to make an attack along the coast, as Commodore Schley, with his armor clads, is practically anchored at Santiago de Cuba, and will remain there until he has disposed of the Spanish fleet, while Admiral Sampson, with the vessels of his command, are necessary to provide the blockading squadron with protection.

FEARS RACE WAR. Excuse of Governor Russell For Refusing to Mobilize Negro Battalion in this State.

SPECIAL TO JOURNAL. RALEIGH, May 31.—Captain J. M. Lee, United States army, telegraphed Governor Russell from Washington, and the telegram was referred to Adjutant General Cowles for reply.

Captain Lee said that under the Immune Act he was desirous to raise a regiment of immune negroes in North Carolina and Virginia, and desired to know what were the facilities at Raleigh for a rendezvous of such troops.

The Adjutant General replied that the Second Regiment is here and that facilities are limited, and that the Governor refuses to mobilize his own negro battalion at Raleigh, for fear of a race conflict.

The Adjutant General has advised that the immune be mobilized at Fort Macon with the negro contingent now there.

GREEDY RUSSELL. Wants to Control All Army Appointments.

Decoration Day Elaborately Observed. Good Work by Ladies Relief Society. May Crop Report Very Favorable. Disgraceful Fight.

JOURNAL BUREAU, Raleigh, N. C., May 31.

The ceremonies of National Decoration Day were more elaborate yesterday than they have ever seen here before. President Meserve of Shaw University, (colored) delivered the address. Rev. Dr. Pottinger was the Chaplain. The services were held in the "Mary Reade Memorial" chapel at the "Soldiers Home" then the procession went to the National Cemetery which was near by. From there they went to the beautiful "Oakwood" and decorated the grave of Ensign Bagley. The New York World had ordered that the grave be decorated and before the procession reached there it was one lovely bank of flowers. There were other tributes, in the form of beautiful designs from the Meale G. A. R. Post of Philadelphia. The Loyal Legion of Women of Washington, and other parties. A detachment from the 2nd Regiment was in the procession.

The Ladies Relief Society, formed for the purpose of caring for the sick out at the two camps here, has extended its work and now proposes to supply the North Carolina troops with shirts and underwear. Mr. Hildebrand, the lessee of the penitentiary shirt factory, has generously offered to make free of cost, 500 shirts. The Society will supply the cloth.

The Worth Bagley Monument Fund has reached \$1,158.06.

The funeral of Mr. Frank Hearty who died here so suddenly Sunday night from rheumatism of the heart was held this afternoon.

The Adjutant General says that the Governor will not designate officers to recruit the First and Second Regiments. He says it is impossible to recruit the companies already in service, and yet some of the Captains in the Second Regiment say they can do so.

Governor Russell says if the government wants recruiting officers it must appoint them. This will no doubt be done. Of course Governor Russell wants to appoint all the officers possible so as to put him in good standing with as many as possible, and if these companies are recruited up to the full quota of men called for from this State it will knock the Governor out of about 100 appointments.

News comes from all over the State that there is general satisfaction at the action of the Democratic convention last week in determining to fight the battle by itself and not with Populist help.

The crop report for May has been issued. It gives a good increase in the acreage of corn which is important. The general condition of farm work as compared with last year is 92. The outlook is very favorable.

Eighty-one convicts have been sent from the penitentiary to the Roanoke farms.

W. H. J. Horn of Georgia delivered the annual address before the graduating class at the A. & M. college this evening. Assistant U. S. District Attorney Oscar J. Spears and one of the deputy clerks to the federal court had a fight in the government building last night.
