Official from Sampson on the Merrimac Sinking.

TO BLOCK CHANNEL.

Landing American Troops on the Coast Near Santiago.

INSURGENTS WILL HELP.

No Confirmation of the Report of the Vizcaya Destroyed. Move- ment of Troops to Help Dewey, Maryland Re- serves on the Dixie.

WASHINGTON, June 4.—Admiral Sampson has made an official report to the Navy Department concerning the sinking of the big iron vessel Merrimac in the harbor entrance of Santiago de Cuba.

The plan was to sink the vessel directly in the channel and thus form an effectual blockade to the escape of Admiral Cervera from the harbor.

The Merrimac had been used as a collier to supply the American fleet. She was bought in New York and being big and heavy was selected for the purpose.

Admiral Sampson opened fire on the Santiago forts in the latter part of the night about 3 o'clock to cover the contemplated attempt.

Volunteers were called for to man the Merrimac and sink the ship in the mouth of the channel.

Naval constructor Hobson and six men were chosen from the volunteers. While under heavy fire they passed into the channel entrance. At the selected point a torpedo was exploded in the interior of the vessel and she went down at once.

The gallant crew took to the boats. Two of the men were wounded but only slightly. Knowing that they could not escape back to the American fleet, they rowed to the Spanish flagship where they surrendered.

Admiral Cervera, under a flag of truce, offers to exchange the captives for Spanish prisoners in possession of the United States at Manila. The gallant Cervera applauded the bravery of the men who performed the perilous adventure.

He Has Them.

Admiral Sampson in his report to the government adds that six Spanish vessels of Admiral Cervera's squadron are surely in Santiago harbor, and that they cannot escape. Their capture or their destruction is certain.

The Spaniards have been erecting some new batteries by taking the guns from the ships in the harbor. They are very short of coal, and it is this fact which caused them to be sparing of sending their ships to sea.

Santiago Will Fall.

A despatch tonight from Cape Haitien says that it is reported from Santiago that American troops have departed from the vessels at Punta Gabienas. They were joined there by the insurgents and are ready to co-operate with Admiral Sampson in a land and sea attack upon the Spanish forces.

The first detachment for Santiago de

Cuba consists of a brigade of engineers, heavy and light artillery and a regiment of regular infantry, in all probability the Twenty-fifth. This army is to be immediately followed by the second detachment of troops, consisting of about eight thousand men, taking infantry and cavalry of the Fifth army corps. Major-General Shafter is to command the Santiago expedition.

Vizcaya.

There was a report that the Spanish fleet had attempted to force their way out of Santiago harbor and that the cruiser Vizcaya was captured and the Spanish fleet destroyed in the effort.

Up to a late hour tonight nothing has been received confirming this report.

For Manila.

General Merritt has notified the Navy Department that all his troops are ready for embarkation on the transports. They will leave for Manila not later than Wednesday next.

Two big Spanish steamship companies whose boats have touched at Havana, are planning to place their vessels under the protection of the Mexican flag.

Trouble in San Domingo.

Cape Haitien, June 4.—(Special)—A rebellion has broken out in San Domingo and it is reported to have resulted in the assassination of President Henreaux.

The gunboat Marietta has arrived and joined Sampson's fleet. The Marietta parted from the Oregon at Rio Janiero, after their long journey from San Francisco, around Cape Horn.

Admiral Cervera.

Washington, June 3.—Admiral Cervera is sixty-five years of age. His father was a nobleman, possessing large estates and was one of the richest wine merchants in Spain. His mother was remotely connected with the royal family.

He graduated from the Naval Academy at San Fernando in 1854. In 1859 he participated in the expedition against Morocco, next he served in Chinese and Peruvian waters, and was sent to Cuba when the ten-years war began.

The Pelayo, the first and only first-class battleship in the Spanish navy, was constructed under his supervision and he assumed command of her as admiral. He has 15 medals of honor and is accounted the foremost naval officer of Spain. His ability is unquestioned, but he is insolent and overbearing, hard and cruel to his men and much disliked by them.

NAVAL RESERVES AT SEA.

The Dixie Chases a Cruiser. Found to be American With New York Reserves Aboard.

BALTIMORE, June 4.—A letter received from one of the men aboard the cruiser Dixie gives an account of some experiences of the Maryland naval militiamen during the first cruise at sea this week. The Dixie left Hampton Roads Monday morning and returned there again Tuesday afternoon.

On Monday afternoon, about two hours after the Dixie had passed Cape Henry, it reached Cape Charles lightship and sent off several officers in a whaleboat to take a position for target practice.

While waiting for the whaleboat to return a steamship was sighted on the horizon bearing down on the Dixie's bow. The Dixie immediately started at full speed for the stranger, leaving the whaleboat. Upon coming closer it could be seen that the stranger was fitted out as a cruiser, and after she was signalled and did not reply suspicious arose that she might be a Spaniard. A call to general quarters was made, the ship cleared for action, all guns loaded with full charges and the Dixie headed for her.

There was the greatest excitement aboard and every man had his gun trained for the signal. But upon getting still closer it was found that the stranger was the auxiliary cruiser Resolute, formerly the steamer Yorktown, which had left New York the day before with a crew of New York naval militiamen. The disappointment to the Dixie boys, according to the letter, was a cruel one, for they were counting on taking a prize and using the Spaniards to holystone the decks of their cruiser, a kind of work for which the amateur sailors have no use.

ADJUTANT COWLES INJURED.

Railroad Commission Meets Wednesday. Negroes Dislike Soldiering. Populists Are Adrift. Poor Flour For Soldiers.

RALEIGH, N. C., June 4.

Adjutant General Cowles had the misfortune last night at 10.30 to have his left leg fractured just above the ankle. His horse shied against an electric car, and fell backwards on General Cowles. The accident is not a very serious one but it will keep him in bed for fully a month.

The Ladies Relief Association is doing a splendid work for the comfort of the 2nd Regiment, as well as providing clothing for both regiments. Contributions of cash, cloth, thread, clothing etc. came in freely to the committee.

Capt. Wagner's company of Asheville has been made the color company of the Second Regiment.

The Railroad Commission meets on the 8th, and the passenger rate question will come up.

The pass question will also be handled, and also the two thousand mile ticket reduction.

Major Dixon of the Second Regiment left today for the west for recruits, as all the companies are to be recruited up to 108 men.

Capt. Cooper of the Murphy company

and Capt. Jones of the Caldwell company expect their recruits Monday or Tuesday.

It is said the 1st Regiment will send recruiting officers here in a day or so to get men to fill out the companies to the same number 100.

Of the 80 negroes who left here for Fort Macon, only 40 stuck out to get to the end of the journey. Some that came back said they fared badly enough at home, but the hard tack furnished them was too much.

Capt. Lee, U. S. A., the recruiting officer for the negro "immunes" from Virginia and North Carolina, after being told he could not mobilize his "immunes" in Raleigh, applied to the Mayor of Greensboro as to the plan of having them there. He received a flat No.

Democracy all over the State has taken heart after the action of the State Convention in rebuffing the fusion proposition.

The Republican convention which will meet about the last of the month may consider Populist-Republican fusion but it is by no means certain.
