THE TRUCK MOVEMENT.

Potatoes and Beans Rapidly Going North. Barrel Factory Wanted Here.

The steamer Newberne left here yesterday with all the potatoes and beans she could carry. This was not a full cargo, for the steamer had to stop at points below to take on more.

The A. & N. C. railroad also carried large train loads of potatoes and beans.

There is urgent need for a barrel factory here, as the demand far exceeds the supply on hand, and delays are necessary which are often both vexatious and costly to the shipper.

The barge load which arrived at Meadows's a few days ago was unloaded and sold right at the boat, the demand being so urgent that the barge could not be unloaded before buyers appeared for the barrels.

There were a number of farmers in the city, yesterday, all of them with potatoes and beans.

The quality of the potatoes arriving is fine.

Reports from the farmers who were in town, all agree that the potato and bean crops are good ones, in quantity, quality and price.

Fifty to seventy-five barrels per acre, which sell in this market at \$1.75 per barrel gives most satisfactory returns to the farmer.

Pamlico Institute.

The commencement exercises of Pamlico Male and Female Institute will be held June 23-24, which will mark the closing of the school for the summer months.

Quite an interesting program is being prepared by the faculty, and the intended participants are practicing daily for the occasion.

The closing exercises of this school last year are remembered as a splendid success, and no doubt the rendition of the program for '08 will surpass all previous efforts.

Teaching Certificate Revoked.

YESTERDAY, Prof. F. G. Tooten of Arapahoe was summoned to appear before the Board of Education of Pamlico county and Prof. W. W. Cole, County Examiner, on the charge of being drunk during school hours.

Mr. Tooten was represented by counsel H. L. Gibbs, and W. T. Cahoon appeared for the prosecution.

The trial took place here at noon. After the evidence was given on both sides, Lawyer Gibbs made a strong speech in favor of Mr. Tooten, and he was followed by an equally powerful a speech by Mr. Cahoon.

Prof. Cole and Board then retired and in a short time returned with a verdict of guilty, and that under the present school law Prof. Tooten should have his teacher's certificate and credentials, revoked.

CAPT. HENRY RETURNS.

Goes Through a Series of Adventures Like Those of a Hero.

Capt. Charles Henry is a colored man some where around sixty years of age and lives at Beaufort N. C. and is a native of that place. What ever adventures Capt. Henry had in his early days, fate reserved for his later years an experience that would have tried the endurance and pluck of a much younger man.

On the 25th of last April, he went fishing off the shoals that make down below Beaufort harbor. While twelve miles off Cape Look Out a violent storm swept down upon his frail boat. It became unmanageable, the fury of the wind and the quickly raised seas dashed his craft about. It soon became a wreck and left the Captain clinging to the portions that the fury of the storm had spared.

Captain Henry drifted about in the ocean and was carried in a southerly direction. No help reached him until the second day of May. By that time he had reached the South Carolina coast and was about thirty five miles off Georgetown.

Here the steamer J. H. Miller bound from New York to Tampa, Florida, to be used to transport troops to Cuba here in sight and picked up the cast-away. He was taken on board and carried to Tampa. There he obtained passage on a vessel bound to Baltimore, and thence came by boat to New Berne where he arrived yesterday morning.

His friends all thought Capt. Henry was dead. They will welcome him home and he will be glad to get home after his hardships, for he is as one "cast up by the sea."

WE ARE REPRESENTED.

New Berne Boy With Sampson's Fleet Writes a Brisk Letter Home.

A letter received by Mr. Wm. E. Clarke from Hayward Howerton, a New Berne boy now with the fleet of Cuba, is of interest at this time.

The young man is on the gun boat Manning. He writes from Key West where his vessel has made a visit, under date of June 1st. The portion of the letter not personal is as follows:

"I received your letters the other day while off Havana, and we came into this port yesterday from the Cuban coast.

"We were near the Cuban shore the other day, near Bahia Honda, when the Spaniards opened fire on us from a small masked fort, and also from some field pieces they had on a hill. We answered them from our guns and in a little while there was no masked battery left. We were not injured to any extent although it was quite hot for a few minutes.

The Manning is a new ship, has only been finished about one year and was built for a gunboat, but has been stationed at Boston as a revenue cutter. She mounts three 4-inch rapid rifled guns, four 6-pounders, two Maxim machine guns that fire about ninety shells a minute. She also carries one torpedo tube. Her speed is good, as she can make 18 to 20 knots an hour and is 235 feet in length.

We have been having beautiful weather down here. The harbor at Key West is full of shipping, men-of-war, newspaper boats, prizes, supply vessels and every kind of boat."

The Colored Troops, Fort Macon.

EDITOR JOURNAL—I have noticed repeated accounts of misconduct on the part of the colored troops now stationed at Fort Macon, as published in various Democratic papers in this State. The same papers have printed reports of mistreatment and dissatisfaction among these soldiers.

I had occasion to visit Fort Macon on the 6th instant in the interest of the wives and mothers of the New Berne troops, with a view to furnishing them with money and provisions while waiting on the government for their pay.

It gave me a most gratifying surprise to find the colored soldiers comfortably situated in their lodging apartments, and amply supplied with all the necessities of life. Major Young has given particular attention to the comfort of his battalion, while Lieut. J. T. York has won the affection and esteem of all the officers and soldiers by his courtesy and pleasant manners, and the keen eye he keeps for the welfare of the New Berne boys.

There was not a single man dissatisfied or desiring to return. A visit to the Fort will quickly disprove all reports detrimental to the battalion, and leave the visitor impressed with the high degree of excellence these men have attained in soldierly during their short army service.
