### THE STATE CAPITAL.

Duke's Gift to Trinity. Known For His Charity. Naval Reserves to be Mobilized. Republican Populist Fusion.

Before the railroad commission today the Governor filed his complaint against railroads in North Carolina. This meeting will be an important one.

The Press Association meeting to be held in Waynesville June 22-23 will be a pleasant one. Quite an attractive programme will be carried out. There promises to be a good attendance.

The last gift of Mr. Washington Duke of Durham of \$100,000 to Trinity College places his gifts at different times to this college at nearly half a million. He makes no conditions with this gift.

The Republican Executive Committee met here today. There is to be a great fight as to whether there will be held a State convention or not.

Col. W. H. S. Burgwynne has received orders from Washington to send out recruiting officers to recruit the companies in his regiment up to 100 men.

Services are held every night at the camp by Mr. John T. Pullen who is known all over the State by his charity and work for Christ. When any one here wants to do a charitable deed Mr. Pullen is always appealed to know where it is most needed, and never has he failed to direct wisely.

The Ladies Memorial Association this afternoon gave the Fayetteville company a lunch. This company has on many occasions extended many courtesies to the Memorial Association.

The North Carolina Naval Reserves not now in service will in a few days be mobilized at Wilmington. The officers will be mustered in with the same rank as they hold in the State service.

There will be no trouble so Adjutant General Cowles says of recruiting the 1st and 2nd regiments up to the required number 1,350 each.

The Adjutant General is able to move the toes on the foot that the leg was broken and he is cheerful and pleased with his improvement.

Auditor Ayer says he does not know whether the Populists and Republicans would fuse or not, but he does know that the Democrats will be beaten.

Governor Russell has his complaint well prepared for the R. R. commissioners. Hon. Charles M. Steadman of Greensboro is one of his attorneys.

Populist State Chairman Cobb declares that fusion with Republicans is sure.

The commencement exercises of St. Mary's school are in progress here.

### Weekly Crop Bulletin.

RALEIGH, N. C. June 8.—The weekly crop bulletin for the week ending Monday, June 6, 1898, is as follows:

The weather for the week ending Monday, June 6th, was normal in temperature, though there were several rather cool nights; and it was rather dry. Bright days were the rule, and the conditions on the whole were favorable for farm work and for growth of crops, though the drought is becoming rather serious in the south and west portions of the State. Damage by hail occurred on May 30th and a few other days in 23 counties. Farmers made good headway in cleaning and cultivating crops. Harvesting wheat and oats is under way and results will be better than expected. Light showers and warmer weather are needed now.

Eastern District.—The week was rather cool, but dry and sunny, and very favorable for farm work. Showers occurred on two days. Farmers have worked hard to get crops clean and nice again. Reports as to the condition and progress of crops are generally favorable, but very much damaged to various crops was done over scattered areas by severe hail storms, occurring chiefly on May 30th. The counties which suffered most were Washington, Pasquotank, Nash, Jones, Northampton, Pitt, Halifax, Bertie and Hertford. Cotton is grassy and needs chopping in north portion; is growing fairly well, but needs warmer nights. Corn made good progress and farmers have commenced hilling it in south portion; stand of lowlands poor. Planting peas and setting sweet potato slips continue. Rice is doing well; also tobacco. A heavy crop of Irish potatoes is being shipped somewhat earlier than last year. Harvesting continues; yield of small grains will be good.

## SAMPSON AT WORK.

### Shelling a Point to Land the American Troops.

### SPANISH DRIVEN OFF.

#### Firing From the Fleet Continues All Day. No Losses Except to Spaniards Reported. Situation at Manila Against the Spanish.

WANTONOS, June 8.—Five vessels of Captain Sampson's fleet bombarded Caimanera from 5:30 this morning until 2:30 in the afternoon.

The firing by the ships was very heavy and did great damage to the Spanish fortifications.

Gaimanera is thirty miles east of Santiago and is a point where the Spaniards are preparing defenses to prevent the debarking of the American troops.

The bombardment of the Spanish works was very furious. A perfect hail of shells fell upon the Spaniards, who nevertheless replied vigorously, but were forced to abandon their works and including their artillery retreat to the town.

The orders given by the Spanish commander were to burn Caimanera before surrendering the town.

The cable that runs to this point is believed to be cut.

From Madrid it is admitted that the Spanish suffered severely during the bombardment of the Santiago forts which resulted in their destruction. On the Reina Mercedes one officer and thirty four men were lost by the fire from the American fleet.

A government despatch boat arrived at Key West today and brings the news of two auxiliary gunboats shelling a squad of Spanish cavalry at Carlenas by which twenty five Spaniards were killed and many were wounded.

The situation at Manila is regarded as very critical for the Spanish forces. Many desertions are reported from the Spanish army according to the report from the Captain General of the Philippines. The insurgents occupy the whole of the province of Cavite.

Tampa will be abandoned as a point of concentration of the volunteer troops. New points on the Atlantic coast are selected.

Examinations will be held at Charleston, S. C., for the North and South Carolina Naval Reserves preparatory to mustering them into the United States service. The examinations will be conducted by Lieut. Commander Arnold and Surgeon Smith.

A detached submarine mine was found off Fort Hamilton, New York harbor, and taken in charge by the navy yard authorities.

The hospital ship Solace for the care of the wounded men has sailed from New York for Santiago, Cuba.

Two soldiers of the English army who have served in Afghanistan and the Indian campaigns enlisted in the American army today.

### Moving Forward.

New York, June 7.—At last the invading army is to move. The first general expedition to Cuba, that to Santiago, will be confidently expected, begin from Tampa tomorrow morning. The expedition to Porto Rico will go later, probably from Fernandina.

Some of the engineers troops with siege guns and appliances for fortifications, are understood to be now at Santiago. It was probably these, with marines, who took part in the landing on Monday.

The troops will be embarked as rapidly as possible. There are in the gulf fleet thirty five transports on which they may embark, but it is not likely that the last regiment will have been put ashore on Cuban soil before a week shall have passed. It is expected that the 28,000 troops, under protection of Sampson's guns, will move towards the interior, of course occupying Santiago and reducing Cervera's fleet during their progress, and will thereafter, by keeping in constant touch with the insurgents of the Provinces of Santiago and Puerto Principe, move toward Havana, with this large insurgent territory as a base of supplies.

It may be safely concluded that this will be the main expedition of the United States troops to Cuba.

There are now about 49,000 troops at Tampa. Of these there are of regulars sixteen regiments of infantry and seven regiments of cavalry. It is not likely that much cavalry will be taken, by reason of the comparative impossibility of the Cuban country at present, but the nineteen regiments of infantry will certainly be taken. The larger part of the remainder of the expedition will be made up of volunteers.
