**FOR CONGRESS.**

**Charles R. Thomas Craven County's Candidate For the Fifty Sixth Congress.**  
ED. JOURNAL.—It is gratifying to the many friends of Hon. Charles R. Thomas of New Berne, Craven's candidate for the nomination for Representative in Congress before the Democratic Convention at Clinton, June 30th, to see that he has not only received the endorsement of his own county, and neighboring county of Jones, but that he has strong support from other counties and from the press. One of the leading papers of the district says of him editorially:  
"Mr. Thomas is widely known throughout the State as a gentleman of character and ability, and should be chosen as a candidate, the Democrats of the District will find that they have placed their standard in good hands. A good speaker and able debater, our people remember the splendid speeches he made in this district two years ago as a Bryan Elector."  
His friends in Craven, Jones and elsewhere would like to see him nominated.  
It is a crisis, when men of recognized ability, eloquence and loyalty to the people and the Democratic party should be nominated.  
Craven's candidate has served the public in many ways, and is well known in the State, but for the benefit of those who may not be acquainted with his record a brief statement may not be amiss.  
In private life a man of integrity, he is well equipped for public life.  
Graduating at the State University in 1881, and from the Greensboro Law School in 1882, since that time he has steadily and successfully practiced his profession.  
In 1882, he was elected as a Democrat to the State Legislature from Carteret county, and served in that body with one of the ablest men of the State.  
He was a member of the Judiciary committee, and voted for and advocated upon the floor of the Legislature the bill to establish the College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts so much desired by the farmers.  
He carried Carteret county by a majority of over 500, the largest majority given any Democrat since the war. Returning to New Berne he served with fidelity the Democratic board of commissioners, as attorney for Craven county, for six years, and during that time was engaged in many important litigation for the county.  
In 1893 he was elected a Trustee of the University by the Legislature.  
In 1894 he was nominated and elected as Democratic Presidential Elector for the Third Congressional District, making a thorough canvass of the district.  
When the Electoral College met at Raleigh, in January, 1897, in the Senate chamber, he was chosen by his colleagues to make, and made the opening speech, nominating William J. Bryan for President of the United States. His speech on that occasion fully sustained his reputation as an able, eloquent and aggressive advocate of the Democratic cause, and was listened to by a large assemblage of people from all parts of the State.  
It is well known that at the University he received every oratorical honor to be bestowed.  
His speeches before the North Carolina Press Association, and in memory of Vance, before the Teachers' Assembly of the State, and upon other occasions, have long since established his reputation in this line.  
His argument before the committee on elections in the U. S. House of Representatives in the contest over the seat of the Hon. John G. Shaw, was highly commended.  
Mr. Thomas has taken an active part in politics ever since his admission to the bar.  
In 1884 he was a member of the Committee on Platform at the State Convention, and afterwards was elected a member of the Democratic State Executive committee, and has been a member of the County, Judicial and Congressional committees.  
These are but the plain facts of the record of the candidate Craven county will present for the Congressional nomination, showing his personal standing, as well as in the councils of the party.  
Always true to his friends, and magnanimous to those who differ with him, he is one of the most industrious and accurate men in public life, and would be an ideal candidate and excellent Representative.  
Moreover he is in close touch with the people, easily the peer of any candidate, and if nominated will be elected, because he has a clean and invulnerable record. The people have confidence in his patriotism and ability, and his personal popularity among all classes and conditions of men is such as to place him pre-eminently above all competitors as the most available candidate for the nomination.

**City Council Proceedings.**  
June 7, 1898.  
The board met after recess in regular monthly session, Mayor Dennison in the chair—present Councilmen Draney, Daniels, Harrison, Hays, Johnson, Pope, Seymour, Shepard, Watson and Wolfenden. Minutes previous meeting read and adopted.  
The following ordinance was adopted: Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Council of the city of New Berne, that it shall be unlawful and a criminal nuisance punishable as hereinafter mentioned for any person or persons having a fixed place of business in the city of New Berne, his, her, or their agents, clerks, or employees, to solicit trade or customers on the side walks of the streets of the city, or on the streets of the city, whether immediately in front of their respective places of business, or elsewhere on the side walks or streets of said city, by means of misrepresentations pulling away customers, from or the decoying of customers from the agents, clerks or employees of other persons and merchants in said city. Any person violating this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of ten dollars for each offense.  
Petition for a pump near the corner of New, on Craven street referred to streets and pump committee to investigate and report.  
Application for an oil light at the end of Attmore street referred to lights committee to report next meeting.  
Proposition of Mr. Sam K. Eaton to connect by wire his clock with the fire alarm system and give exact Washington time at City Hall daily at 12 M, free of cost except expense of putting in wire and button was referred to lights committee.  
F. J. Hardison tendered his resignation as policeman and same was accepted.  
John A. Boon offered to sell the city sufficient space in Pavie town to open up four streets for the sum of fifty dollars and take the amount in personal taxes. On motion the proposition was accepted.  
Matter of electing a policeman was postponed until recess meeting.  
The Clerk was instructed to issue vouchers to John Hargett and Thomas Allen for poll tax paid by them, they being active members of the Fire Department.  
Motion to buy the Latham building was lost. On motion the City Attorney was requested to invite Mr. A. D. Ward to come before the Board Thursday night with reference to adjusting a claim held by him against the city.  
On motion the Tax Collector will collect the regular monthly license tax on river steamers without any deduction for lost time.  
Bill of Jno. B. Seymour, treasurer, for commissions paid R. S. Primrose trustee of R. R. fund was referred to finance committee for investigation.  
The Clerk was instructed to issue a voucher for the electric light bill for April, '98.  
Bill of Blades Lumber Co. amounting to \$38.71, contracted by a former Board was referred to streets and pump committee for investigation.

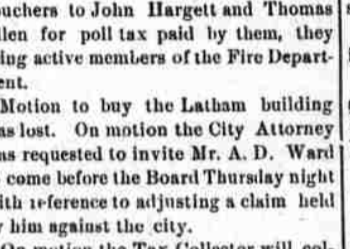
