THE STATE CAPITAL.

Army Matters and Things at Raleigh.
Naval Reserves Still Unsettled.

JOURNAL HURRAH.
RALEIGH, N. C., June 25.
Adjutant General Cowles wants three additional telegraph operators for signal corps service at Manila.

Paymaster Mecklenburg is here and it is said the soldiers will be paid off today. They thought they would get their money yesterday. The company and line officers will be paid for one month beginning April 27th; the field and staff officers from the time they reported for duty. It will require from sixteen to twenty thousand dollars to pay the Second Regiment.

Orders have been received to increase the force of corporals from six, to twelve.

Drilling has been suspended until next week on account of so many sore arms.

Two more deserters have been arrested at Salisbury.

Major General Brooke has requested Colonel Burgwyn to name a suitable Lieutenant for detail for Judge Advocate for General Court Martial. He has not as yet named the man.

Major Charles L. Davis, of Charlotte has been detailed to fill the vacancy caused by Major E. M. Hayes', promotion. Major Davis will report to the Governor, and be assigned to duty at once as military instructor for the State Guard.

General Cowles has been notified that only one Major would be allowed to the colored regiment now being organized at Fort Macon. He will make every effort though to have two, for otherwise there will be a row between the aspirants. There will also be only one adjutant if the above order is carried out. With fewer officers there will be less enthusiasm.

The Second Regiment wishes to return thanks to the ladies of Raleigh, and will probably give a ball in their honor on July 4th. The regiment on that day will march through the city so that the citizens one and all can see them. The ball will be given at the Fair ground, and the regimental band will furnish the music.

It is just learned that on Sunday, W. P. Sawyer of Hertford, an inmate of the insane asylum here fell while walking, and struck his head on a bench and fractured his skull. He only lived a few hours.

The Bagley Monument fund has reached \$1,829.88. Contributions come in slowly now. General Cowles has requested Col. Burgwyn to see if the Second Regiment will not as a regiment make a contribution, each private as well as officer to make a small contribution. General Cowles subscribes \$2, to start the list.

At the State Museum is a banded rattlesnake of the "erolatus horridus" kind. It is 5 feet in length, and 8 inches in circumference. He was sent here from Chowan county. Curator Brimley will chloroform it and stuff the skin.

President Alderman of the State University is here. It is his first visit since his return from abroad. He says the summer school began with 125, but feels sure it will reach the 200 mark in a few days.

The first regiment will receive pay from April as will also the 3 negro companies at Fort Macon.

The Naval Reserves are restless about being mustered into service and Adjutant General Cowles has telegraphed the officer in charge of the reserves, Admiral Erbon, to know if they are not to man patrol boats.

One company had 700 lbs. of provisions sent them a few days ago, and they ate it all up for one meal. It was thought it would last a day or two.

The war department declines to pay for the preliminary examination of volunteers before they leave home to join the different companies. They have to be examined at their destination and often returned. This was tried to be prevented.

To Take No Chances.

New York, June 24.—The Herald publishes the following from Washington: General Shafter is to be reinforced by an army of 18,000 men. Orders have been sent from the War Department to him to return to Tampa as soon as possible, a sufficient number of transports to carry a force of this size.

Although the War Department officials are not expecting that General Shafter's army will meet with any serious reverse, it is considered advisable to have the American army at Santiago overwhelmed in strength. The President considers that much depends upon the outcome of the fight there, and hence does not intend to have the United States army run chance of defeat.

It will probably be ten days before the additional army can be embarked and sent. General Shafter in the meanwhile will proceed in his operations against Santiago, and it may be that by the time the second army has reached that place the campaign will have ended. In this event a large part of Shafter's forces will be sent to Porto Rico.

POINTS TO BATTLE.

Greatest Fight of War at Santiago:

Administration Confident of the Result.

Reconcentrados Starved to Death at Havana.

Spanish Government at Home in a Desperate Condition. Queen Regent Prepared For Flight.

Great Battle Pending.

WASHINGTON, D. C. June 25.—Reports to the War Department give the number of Spanish troops in Santiago de Cuba, as twenty thousand men.

A great battle is expected to take place at any hour at Sevilla, a small village near Santiago.

General Miles and Secretary Long now say that they believe that the greatest battle of the war is now being fought, of which particulars will reach here tomorrow or Monday.

Torpedo Boats En Route.
The torpedo boats Gwyn and Talbot have taken coal and left the Brooklyn Navy Yard for Key West.

More Troops For Shafter.
The Cruiser Harvard with two regiments of troops has left Newport News to reinforce General Shafter at Santiago.

These regiments are the Ninth Massachusetts and Thirty-fourth Michigan, which just arrived.

Again the Spanish Fleet.
The steamer Woodville which has just put in at Gibraltar, reports having sighted the Spanish off Vocari Rocks, and it is believed the fleet will reach Port Said, by Sunday.

Reconcentrados Dead.
The captain of the steamer Anapola, which was captured by the cruiser Vicksburg and brought to Key West, says that nine tenths of the reconcentrados who were left in Havana by General Lee, have died of starvation since he left the island.

The Jagua Fight.
Later returns in regard to the fight at Jagua, near Santiago, show that the Spaniards had placed light batteries of six guns in the way Roosevelt's Rough Riders who were advancing, and that they were led in to an ambush yesterday. The attack was a gallant one, although now regarded as a blunder.

Will Not Believe It.
Nicholas Fish, of New York, refuses to believe in the report of the death of his son, Hamilton Fish, whose name was given among those killed at Jaragu, until this report is confirmed by word from Colonel Roosevelt.

Forces Concentrating.
At Playa del Este, there is now concentrated a force of Americans and Cubans, of twenty-six thousand who will attack Santiago on Sunday.

More Censorship.
Grant Squires has been appointed Military Censor, and will have two sworn in assistants at each cable office.

The Madrid Reports.
As usual the reports from the home situation at Madrid are conflicting, at the same time they are unquestionably serious.

From Brussels comes the report that the Carlists are showing more activity, while in Madrid the situation is said to be becoming more alarming and threatening, and the report is that the Queen Regent is continuing her preparations for flight.

The latest is that the Madrid Correspondent publishes peace conditions, which it claims were offered Spain by America.

Contrary to War Usage.

New York, June 24.—The Herald's Washington correspondent says: An interesting letter was received today by First Sergeant George B. Warren, in charge of the marines at the navy yard, from Quartermaster-Sergeant Limerick, who participated in the recent fight at Guantanamo, Cuba.

Col. Chas. Heywood, commandant of the marine barracks, was very proud of his boys when he read this letter, and denounced the using of brass cartridges by the Spaniards, reference to which is made in the letter. Limerick writes in part:

"Our forces up to this hour have killed or wounded, or captured, more than six hundred Spaniards. Our total loss has been six killed and fourteen wounded. Among the arms captured from the

Spaniards were one Remington rifle and two styles of Mauser; also a lot of pure brass cartridges, which, as you know, are forbidden in civilized warfare.

"We were 73 consecutive hours without a particle of sleep and for two days had nothing but coffee and hard tack. We went out about 200 men each day to scour the woods and have destroyed the blockhouses and wells within a radius of four miles.

"The nature of the wooded hills makes it hard for us to see the enemy until we get right on to them. Our pieces do excellent work. Everybody is a fighter in the battalion.

"No clerical work of any kind, no morning reports or anything of that sort has been done since we landed, and it is not likely we can do anything of that nature until we are reinforced.

"Captain Cauley is a genuine fighter; he is in the midst of everything. We have a fine lot of officers, all the way through, and they are regular 'fire-eaters' and set a brilliant example to the men."
