## DARING AMERICANS.

**Destroy Aqueduct Which Supplies Santiago With Water.**

## CISTERN WATER ONLY.

**American Artillery Frowns Upon Santiago From Hill Tops.**

## LIEUTENANT BLUE'S EXPLOIT

**Troops Going Forward and Being Landed on Cuba. General Shafter's "All's Well" From Front Lines at Santiago.**

### Around Santiago.

Special to Journal.

WASHINGTON, June 28.—Advises from Jaragua say that the American forces are now facing the Spanish army four miles from Santiago.

General Shafter is at the front, directing operations and giving his personal attention to everything.

From all indications, a battle is thought probable for tomorrow.

The Spaniards are entrenched and are not likely to yield without a struggle.

### Bringing Forward the Guns.

The work of bringing forward the guns is a slow one. The progress is up hill and through a thick undergrowth which has to be cut away.

The necessity for the artillery is recognized, as it will prove an important factor in forcing an entrance into Santiago.

Four batteries of American artillery and a Gatling gun battery, have already secured positions on a hill a mile and a half from Santiago.

### Again Lieut. Blue.

Lieut. Blue, whose recent trip about the approaches to Santiago and the forts, is now so well known, has just returned from another daring trip, in which he skirted about Santiago and returns with much valuable information.

### Water Supply Cut Off.

A most important piece of work has just been completed under the direction of General Wheeler, who sent an Engineer Brigade to destroy the aqueduct which supplies the city of Santiago with water.

The aqueduct has been cut and the city must now depend upon cisterns for its water supply.

### More Troops Landed.

The Yale and Harvard today landed Duffield's Michigan brigade at Baiquiri.

General Miles to Take Command.

Preparations are now said to be completed and General Miles will leave here tonight for Tampa, where six transports will be ready to sail for Cuba by Thursday.

Ten thousand men are now on the transports.

General Miles will go to Santiago to take command.

### From Chickamauga.

Thirty thousand troops are ordered from Chickamauga to go to Florida.

### From San Francisco.

Advices from San Francisco, say that General Merritt sails from there tomorrow on the Newport, for Manila.

### Four Spanish Ships.

New York advices say that the New York Yacht Club will postpone its annual cruise this year, as there is fear of Spanish warships.

### Sighted the Warships.

The steamer Adirondack, which has arrived at New York, reports having sighted on her voyage the American warships Yale, Columbia and Prairie, sailing towards Santiago.

### Cuba's Assistance.

The Cuban Junta in this country report having received a dispatch from General Perez, who says he is investing Guantanamo with his men, in order to prevent the Spaniards from going to Santiago to the assistance of their troops at that city.

### O'Higgins Not Bought.

The Chilean Minister at London denies the report that his government has sold the armored cruiser O'Higgins to Spain.

### All Progressing Well.

General Shafter cables the war department from Siboney that all is progressing well, that the army now occupies a position three miles from Santiago.

### Cervera Held in Check.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, June 28.—It is believed that Admiral Cervera contemplated making a dash out of the harbor Saturday night.

Four columns of smoke were seen at sun down, advancing toward the mouth of the harbor, and two small boats, believed to be torpedo boat destroyers, were observed in the neighborhood of the sunken collier Merrimac.

Admiral Sampson ordered extra precautions to be taken. The torpedo boats Ericsson and Porter stood very close into the harbor all night, but no ships came out.

A short time after midnight the dynamite cruiser Vesuvius fired three gun cotton shells in the direction of Morro Castle. They exploded on the ridge and behind the eastern hill. The damage done is not known.

A Cuban spy, who was recently in Santiago, says a reign of terror exists among all classes there, owing to the attacks of the Vesuvius, with the terrible explosions of her shells. A week ago one of her shells striking Cayo Smith demolished several warehouses and a fort there, besides dismounting several guns. Windows were broken in the city, and the general effect was similar to that of an earthquake.

### THE STATE CAPITAL.

Flag Presentation. Army News, Railroad Commission Issues. A New Session Promised. Weekly Crop Bulletin.

JOURNAL BUREAU, Raleigh, N. C., June 28.

The officers of the Raleigh National Bank on yesterday went out to camp and tendered checks with stamped envelopes for the soldiers to send their money home. In this way \$2,285 was sent away.

The ladies represented by chaplain Osborne presented the Red Cross flag to the Hospital Corps at Second Regiment camp. It was received by Col. Burgwyne.

It is said that C. A. Cook of Warren will without doubt get the appointment of Brigadier General.

At the meeting of the Democratic State Executive committee held today it goes without saying that Hon. F. M. Simmons will be elected State chairman.

The first cotton bloom of the season was brought in yesterday by Mr. J. P. Whitley of Johnson county.

Rev. Mr. Osborne, chaplain of the Second Regiment on Sunday invited Father Prendergast to hold service. There are about 60 Roman Catholics in the regiment. The chaplain will ask other ministers to hold service as there are many Baptists and Methodists.

The brown canvass that it was said would be issued to the troops for the war has not materialized except one suit of officers clothing. The weather is hot any way and in these heavy uniforms it is terrible. On drill it is not unusual for a man to drop in ranks.

General Cowles is able to walk across his room on crutches. His rapid recovery from his broken leg gratifies his friends.

Paymaster General Stanton writes to Senator Pritchard that the neglect to pay off the soldiers of the First and Second Regiments, and the payment of negro troops earlier, was unintentional.

Recruiting for the Second Regiment is not rapid by any means, and is even slower for the First Regiment. In spite of the fact that the papers asserted that there were hundreds who were ready to go to the front, and yet when the call comes it is hard to get the two regiments recruited up to their required strength.

Last night the Young Woman's Missionary Society presented to Miss Mary Pseud a handsome gold watch, and a handsome Portuguese Bible. Miss Pseud leaves tomorrow for Brazil where she goes for seven years as a missionary.

The trouble between Dr. Kilgo and Judge Clark has not yet been settled. It seems that it will do neither of them any good though the Methodists generally uphold Dr. Kilgo.

While the First regiment was in camp here, the city bathing pool was tendered them free. The same has been done the Second regiment. Col. Armfield made bathing compulsory, but Col. Burgwyne has not done so, consequently it is not indulged in so freely.

Some harsh criticism is made that the last term of Federal Court failed to commit moonshiners and other offenders, which caused a fight between two officials. The trouble has by no means quieted, and may grow bigger.

All the chief officials of the Seaboard Air Line, Southern and Atlantic Coast Lines were here today at the meeting of the Railroad Commission. This is for the consideration of reduction of passenger rates as ordered by the Governor.

A new sensation promises to come to the front in a few days.

The weekly crop bulletin for week ending Monday, June 27, 1898, says the weather during the week ending Monday June 27th, 1898, was generally favorable for agricultural interests, especially for

farm work. The rainy period of the preceding week continued until Tuesday 21st, in some counties, chiefly along the coast, Onslow, Hyde and New Hanover, where some local heavy rains occurred. Otherwise, excepting light showers in the central-west portion on Sunday, 26, the week was dry, and farmers were able to make excellent progress in killing weeds and in cultivating crops. Towards the end of the week the ground began to get dry and hard in some counties. The temperature after the rains continued below normal until Friday, followed by a gradual rise to above normal the last of the week. On the 26th temperatures as high as 98 degrees occurred. There was an abundance of sunshine.

Excepting the unfavorable effects of cool nights on cotton, crops generally made excellent growth and are looking clean and healthy. The cool weather retarded the growth of cotton, which is still small and backward, but it is looking fairly well and growing nicely where not troubled by lice, as in most of the western section. Reports of damage by lice are very numerous from the central and eastern districts, and in a few instances badly infested fields have been plowed up and other crops planted. Blooms continue to appear plentifully along the southern tier of counties, but elsewhere the plants are forming squares slowly. Corn is doing well everywhere, it has grown fast, is clean and well cultivated. The crop is being laid by rapidly. It is silking and tasseling earlier than usual, and hence rather low, but the crop in general is in a prosperous condition. Sorghum cane is also doing very well. Tobacco plants look healthy and are growing nicely, they are small for the time of the year in the west portion, where transplanting was done late on account of lack of seasons.

The harvest is nearly over in the east and is rapidly approaching completion in the west portion of the State. Wet shocks of wheat were scattered, dried and stacked in good condition; some damage by sprouting was observed, but not to a serious extent. In fact, the yield of both wheat and oats has been very satisfactory in most sections. Spring oats have improved; rye is also very good. Most farmers have safely housed small grain crops. Thrashing wheat is proceeding more rapidly. The minor crops, especially rice, peanuts and field peas, are doing well. Melons are fruiting nicely. Peaches and apples are coming into market, and are only fair in quality. Blackberries are abundant.

### Has Spain the O'Higgins?

New York, June 27.—A Washington dispatch to the Herald says: Whether or not Spain has acquired the armored cruiser O'Higgins, which sailed from England a few days ago ostensibly for Chile, is a question which has caused the authorities no little perturbation.

On Saturday they received an unauthenticated report from their agents in London stating that the O'Higgins had been bought by Spain and is now under the control of the Madrid government.

The American minister at Santiago de Chile has been instructed to ask the Chilean government regarding the matter, and his report is expected hourly.

A report received at the Navy Department today indicates that Spain is also trying to purchase three Chinese protected cruisers which are under construction at Stettin, Germany.
