Admiral Cervera's Fleet Forever Destroyed.

PRESENT TO AMERICAN NATION FROM AD- MIRAL SAMPSON.

Congratulations to Admiral, Officers and Crews From a Grateful People.

BEYOND BRAVE TO LAST.

"Would Go Down Fighting on Open Sea Than Die Like a Rat in a Trap."

Thirteen Hundred Spaniards Captured. Santiago Must Surrender. Today Decides. Dewey Hears the Good News.

A Glorious Present.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 4.—Secretary Long of the Navy received the following: "Playa del Este, via Haiti, July 3rd. The fleet offers the American Nation a Fourth of July present, in the destruction of the whole of Admiral Cervera's fleet attempted to escape this morning at nine o'clock and at two p. m. the Cristobal Colon was run ashore sixty miles west of Santiago and let down her colors.

"The Maria Teresa, Admirante Oquendo and Vizcaya were forced ashore, burned and blown up twenty miles off Santiago.

"The torpedo boat destroyers, the Pluton and Furor were destroyed four miles off the port.

"One loss is one man killed, two wounded. The man killed was Geo. Ellis, seaman on the cruiser Brooklyn.

"The Spanish loss is several hundred killed and wounded, and thirteen hundred prisoners, including Admiral Cervera. Signed, SAMPSON."

The Nation to Sampson.

Secretary Long sent the following in reply to Admiral Sampson:

"The Secretary of the Navy sends you and every officer and man of your fleet, remembering equally your comrades in the field, the grateful acknowledgments of your heroism and success.

"All honor to the brave. You have maintained the honor of the American Navy. Signed, LONG."

The President to Sampson.

The following message was also sent to Admiral Sampson:

"You have the gratitude and congratulations of the whole American people. Convey to your noble officers and crews, through whose valor new honors have been added to the American arms, the grateful thanks and appreciation of the Nation." WILLIAM MCKINLEY.

Admiral Dewey Hears News.

The Department wired Admiral Dewey at Manila, today, the glorious news of Admiral Sampson's victory at Santiago.

Shafter's Sunday Report.

General Shafter's report, which came here Sunday, and which was of so discouragingly a tone, was no doubt largely the result of his physical condition, the General being severely affected by the heat.

Celebrating the Fourth. Army Notes. Kilgo-Clark Controversy. Sorrowful News from Santiago.

RALEIGH, N. C., July 4.

The bang of the cannon cracker, and the snap of the fire cracker as usual opened the morning. The Second Regiment marched through the principal streets, and had inspection drill, and dress parade facing the Executive Mansion at 6 o'clock this afternoon. At night the city celebrated the glorious 4th with beautiful fire works at Pullen Park.

Tomorrow night the military ball given by the officers of the Second Regiment, complimentary to the ladies of Raleigh, and the members of the Capital Club will be held at the Agricultural and Mechanical College. The place at the Fair grounds where it was first intended to hold the ball had to be abandoned because it was too near the hospital. Three hundred invitations have been issued.

The regiment now drills five hours daily. Adjutant General Cowles has paid a second visit to the camp.

The men in camp here are very anxious to go to the front. They hope very much that the news that they will be ordered south this week is true. Four new recruits yesterday made the number necessary for full rank come down to 40.

A soldier from Bertie county was on Saturday arrested for murder of his wife. His name was Bazemore, but he had enlisted under the name of Moore. He was recognized by parties visiting here. He was taken to Windsor today.

The mortuary report for June shows that the number of deaths for Raleigh were 31 and births 25. There are several cases of typhoid fever here, but the health officer says no official reports of this is negligence on the part of the physicians. It should not be allowed for the people should know whatever danger lurks in their midst. The continual digging up of the streets and side walks will cause more sickness it is feared.

President Kilgo yesterday reviewed the controversy between Judge Clark and himself as regards his management of Trinity college, and his accepting the gifts for the college from Mr. Duke. He says Judge Clark was rather late in protesting against these gifts after he had voted with the board on the resolutions of thanks. Dr. Kilgo does not handle Judge Clark very gently, and many think and say he does not handle him unjustly.

The news that reached here today from the battle at Santiago again casts a gloom over our city. Lt. W. G. Shipp of the 10th Cavalry was killed and Lt. Frank Cameron wounded. While Lt. Shipp was not a native of Raleigh, his mother and sister now live here, and his wife is a Raleigh girl, being the daughter of Mr. Fab H. Busbee of this city. Lt. Cameron is the eldest son of General Francis H. Cameron, who was Adjutant General of the State under Governor Carr.

Major Dixon of the Second Regiment here preached at the Presbyterian church yesterday. Dr. Dixon is a Methodist minister, though not connected with any conference.

Germany's Intentions.

Although there is still considerable outside speculation as to Germany's intentions in the Philippines, President McKinley and Secretary Day stated at a Cabinet meeting that they had received official assurances direct from the government of Germany that no interference with American plans in the Philippines had been even thought of. The revivals of the old European story that Germany, France and Russia had formed a combination to head off the United States and Great Britain in the Philippines, is not attracting any special attention in Washington, for the very simple reason that nobody believes it.

Commander Admirable.

Shafter's men fought under great difficulties. The country around Santiago would be a difficult one for military operations under the most favorable circumstances, but when those operations were successfully conducted, with the thermometer ranging from 105 to 125 in the shade and against an enemy about equal in numbers and strongly entrenched, they command the unbounded admiration of, not only Americans, but of all men who admire bravery, endurance and determination. Shafter's short campaign against Santiago has made an enviable place in history for him self and his men. The casualties were large, but it seems wonderful that they were not larger.

LADRONES CAPTURED.

Relief Expedition For Dewey's Wounded Men.

HONO KONO, July 3.—The United States cruiser Charleston arrived at Manila today with the first expedition of American troops for the relief of Dewey. All are well on board. On her way the Charleston seized La Guzman, capital of the Ladrones Islands, which is to be held as a base of supplies.
