AT NOON TO-DAY.

Sampson and Shafter Are To Bombard Santiago:

ARMY BEING REINFORCED.

Miles Sails From Charleston With Many Men.

Will Push Things at Santiago. Roosevelt Made Colonel. To Recover Spanish Ships. Prisoners to be Sent Home. Congress Has Adjourned.

Special to Journal. WASHINGTON, July 8.—Admiral Sampson with his fleet and General Shafter with his siege guns will bombard Santiago Saturday at noon, unless General Linares surrenders the city before that time.

The blockade of the ports all about Cuba will be strengthened at once in order to starve out General Blanco at Havana.

Eighteen hundred troops with General Miles embarked on the cruisers Columbia and Yale today at Charleston, S. C., for Santiago. General Miles goes with the approval of the President, who is fearful that the debilitated condition of General Shafter may not permit of his continuing in active charge of the troops.

General Miles takes with him his full staff and a beautiful assortment of uniforms. But, with all his appreciation of fine uniforms and imposing staffs, he has the confidence of the army and the President to a greater extent, probably, than any other officer. His career as an Indian fighter is said to have marked him as a strategist of rare ability, and when he assumes charge of the troops off Santiago there is expected to be some decisive action that will not keep the army long outside the city.

Roosevelt Honored. The nominating of Theodore Roosevelt as Colonel of the Rough Riders was confirmed by the Senate today. Colonel Wood, the former head of this Regiment was made a Brigadier-General.

Spanish Gold. Four thousand dollars in the safe of the sunken Cristobal Colon will be recovered by the wrecking company.

The contracts of the government with the Merritt Wrecking Company for raising the Colon, it is said, is to be by the day, so that it may be canceled at any time if it is found impracticable to save the vessel. The hull of the Colon is said to be in good condition.

It is reported that Admiral Camara will return to Spain with his fleet. The fleet is still in the north end of the Red Sea its only movement being one of about three miles to a new anchorage. The destroyers which left him at Port Said reached Cadix yesterday.

The monitors Monterey and Mowdock are both expected to be with Dewey by September 1.

Return Prisoners. The President will send to Spain all the Spanish prisoners, except the officers taken from Cervera's ships.

The Spanish government is making inquiries as to terms of peace with the United States.

Advices that have been coming to show that some of the European powers brought pressure upon Spain to yield to the inevitable.

For Honolulu. The cruiser Philadelphia sails soon from San Francisco for Hawaii. On board will be Senators Callum and Morgan and Representative Pitt who are appointed commissioners on the island.

The Philadelphia will carry the flag of the United States to the islands and include them within the Union. Admiral Miller, commanding the Pacific station, who is now at Mare Island, will be charged with this function of hoisting the flag that was hoisted down by Commissioner Blount. She should make the trip in a week.

No More Fear. It is reported that the mines in New York harbor will be exploded tonight as they are no longer regarded necessary, no more danger being feared from Spanish warships.

An armed Spanish privateer is said to

be lying off the coast of British Columbia watching for American ships returning from the Klondyke loaded with gold.

Congress Adjourns. Congress adjourned this afternoon amid wild singing of "Dixie." The session ended at 2 o'clock and the adjournment is until the regular session in December.

May Attack Today. New York, July 7.—The Herald tomorrow will publish the following from Washington: Dispatches came from General Shafter today stating that the army and navy will make a joint attack on Santiago next Saturday at noon.

General Shafter, after many days of rest, will attack Santiago the second time, much refreshed, and reinforced to the extent of at least 3,500 troops. These, added to the 19,000 troops already under him and the 8,000 under General Garcia, will bring General Shafter's fighting force up to about 30,000. From these must be deducted about 1,700 killed and wounded officers and men.

The total regular force under General Linares in the city of Santiago was recently 11,450. To these must be added the reinforcements, computed at about 6,000 men. These troops cut their way through Garcia's men, about 3,000 coming from Guantanamo and about 3,000 from Holguin. Putting together all these figures, General Linares may within the next forty-eight hours, it is said, count upon about 22,000 men. There are other Spanish regular troops in the province, including the light division under General Bernal, to the number of about 4,000.

My Captain. WEDNESDAY WITH THE ARMY NEAR SANTIAGO.—Though General Linares has said he will not consider the surrender of the city, it may capitulate before the Americans try to take it by assault. In any case a long siege is out of the question.

It is thought today there will be no firing until tomorrow, when the plan of joint attack decided upon by Admiral Sampson and General Shafter may be put in operation. I have been unable to get a definite statement as to whether or not the attack will be delayed longer. The Spanish in Santiago have only ammunition for three days.

Our hospitals are in great need of surgeons, nurses and supplies. The sanitary conditions are worse since the battle, on account of the decomposing bodies. Many bodies are floating in the wrecks of Admiral Cervera's ships. The Venezuelan consul says he has positive information that General Linares and General Toral are at odds. General Toral wants to surrender. In this he has the support of the Archbishop of Santiago, who has lost some of his recent warlike spirit. Gen. Linares positively refuses to yield. Spanish officers, speaking to some of our men during the armistice, said he could not surrender without the consent of Madrid, and hinted that the Americans should demand the surrender of Santiago from Sagasta instead of Linares.

All the foreign attaches wonder how our ships were so little damaged by Admiral Cervera's fleet. The official reports of killed and wounded in the land fighting are not yet in, but estimates in the hospital here placed the number at 1,700. Lieutenant-Colonel Roosevelt has been recommended for a medal for bravery under fire. Captain O'Neill was similarly recommended, but he was afterward killed.

Manila Holds Out. MANILA BAY, July 1, (via Hong Kong and Paris, July 7).—General Aguinaldo today issued a proclamation in Spanish and in Tagal, the native language, announcing the birth of the Philippine Republic, of which he assumes to be president.

General Aguinaldo claims that he will take Manila tomorrow or next day. This is not probable, however. Reports of the coming of the Spanish fleet through the Suez canal, coupled with the encouragement given the Spaniards by the Germans, has greatly stiffened Spanish courage and it is expected the city will not surrender without a hard fight.

The water supply of the city is nearly exhausted. The pumps have not been working for three days.

They Discuss Plans. JULY 6, WITH THE FLEET NEAR SANTIAGO.—Captain Chadwick, of the flagship New York, representing Admiral Sampson, visited General Shafter at his headquarters before Santiago today. They discussed plans for a joint attack on Santiago by the land and naval forces.

The truce between the armies has been continued until tomorrow, but fighting must soon be resumed, as the American and Spanish forces are only two hundred yards apart on San Juan Hill. Captain Chadwick explained to General Shafter that Admiral Sampson could not send boats into the harbor at present to remove the mines, because there are 5,000 Spanish riflemen stationed behind the hills near the beach. He also reminded the American General that the enemy, with the guns of Morro, would be able to get the range of any boat that might be used in the work of freeing the outer harbor of mines.

Admiral Cervera, Captain Estale and

the other surviving officers of the destroyed ships were sent north today on the St. Louis. Before leaving the officers on Cervera's staff admitted that the Spanish admiral had been forced by orders from Madrid to leave Santiago harbor.

One thousand of the prisoners from Cervera's fleet will be sent north tomorrow on the Harvard under a strong guard. Admiral Sampson is determined to keep the prisoners in subjection, and has taken extra precautions to prevent a repetition of the mutiny that took place aboard the Harvard Monday night. I learn that fifteen Spaniards were wounded in that riot. Half of the guns on Cervera's vessels are found to be in good condition, and some of them are being removed to the American fleet.

The German Ships. HONO KONO, July 7.—The British steamer Endie, which left Manila July 3, has arrived here. Her officers state that the German warships are landing stores at Marivales, near the mouth of Manila bay, under cover of night.
