STILL IN TRENCHES.

Shafter Using His Guns But No Assault Made.

NEWS AT ANY HOUR.

Expected of the Fall of Santiago de Cuba.

Some Talk of Peace at Washington Spanish Ships Were Full of Holes. Prisoners to Go to Annapolis. Cincinnati Leaves Norfolk.

WASHINGTON, July 11.—The President held conferences with Secretary Long, Admiral Sigsbee, Captains Mahan and Crowninshield at the White House.

Secretary Long says that nothing has been received indicating a decisive engagement at Santiago today.

All the afternoon the President and the cabinet have been awaiting news of the expected attack of General Shafter upon Santiago, aided by the guns from Sampson's fleet.

A late dispatch from General Shafter states that he is using his artillery today and firing upon the Spanish intrenchments and the forts. General Shafter has nearly fifty siege guns and a larger number of seven-inch mortars, besides lighter artillery.

The authorities at Washington are hourly expecting news of the fall of the city. General Shafter for his part is confident of getting possession within three days.

General Shafter states that his lines are well thrown out, covering a frontage of five miles, and in an impregnable condition. The American forces do not completely surround the city and many of the Spanish troops may escape from the city through the passes to the westward. Many of them may retreat during the night and get back toward the troops now approaching from Manzanillo.

The cruiser Cincinnati sailed from Norfolk today to join Commodore Watson's fleet preparing to attack the Spanish coast cities.

Two batteries left Fort Meyer, Va., for Tampa en route to Cuba. The men have canvas uniforms and will leave on the expedition from Key West with munitions and supplies for Gen. Gomez and his Cuban army. Colonel Boza is in command.

One hundred and twenty shell holes were found in the steel armor of the four Spanish warships wrecked off Santiago. The destruction of the Vizcaya resulted from the blowing up of their own torpedoes. The Maria Teresa and the Colon can be saved.

Admiral Cervera and the commissioned officers captured at Santiago, now on the St. Louis at Norfolk, will be taken to Annapolis, Md.

From Madrid it is announced that peace negotiations will be left to General Blanco in regard to Cuban affairs. The French Ambassador who is acting as a sort of peace agent between Spain and the United States held an interview with President McKinley today.

Superintendent Terrel of Atlanta sails from Key West to establish mail service for Cuba.

With The Army.

NEAR SANTIAGO, July 9.—Positive statements are now made that General Pando abandoned his attempt to get into Santiago with his troops, and that he halted his men at a point twenty miles from Santiago.

Pando was unwilling to try to force his way through the mountains, largely because of the fact that even if he had succeeded in getting into Santiago, he could do nothing but share with General Linares the responsibility of the fall of the city.

It is recognized on all sides, by Spaniards as well as Americans, that Santiago must surrender or suffer destruction. General Shafter's position is being strengthened every hour, and Admiral Sampson is perfecting plans for the co-operation of the fleet with the American land forces.

Colonel Roosevelt's Rough Riders, who have taken such a conspicuous part in the hard fighting all along the way toward Santiago, will have another opportunity to distinguish themselves when the final assault on the beleaguered city is made. The Rough Riders now are the only volunteers in the first line.

In addition to occupying an important position in the line, the Rough Riders hope to win glory with their dynamite gun, which is in charge of Sergeant Hallet Also Borrows. This deadly machine of war has been mounted in a commanding position, and the men handling it are confident of doing effective work. The Rough Riders are in splendid

physical condition, the health of all of the men at the front now being excellent. There is no sickness of any kind in this regiment as yet.

It has been decided to remove the American hospital from the coast into the mountains. An isolated point has been selected, and the hospital corps there will be able to make all the sick and wounded much more comfortable.

There now are 2,000 men in the hospital, nearly half of the patients suffering from mountain fever. An uneasy feeling pervades the medical department as there is need of supplies of all kinds.

TWO MORE CONVICTS ESCAPE.

Walked Away in Day Light. Rides For Recruits. Two Deaths in Camp. Twelve Inch Shell For Museum. Judge Bryan Opens Court.

JOURNAL BUREAU, Raleigh, N. C., July 11.

Out at Camp Russell on Saturday company inspection and regimental review was held in place of dress parade. All the rifles necessary for the recruits were received. There were 360 of them. They are a more improved pattern than the others, being of the pattern of 1884 while the others were made in 1878.

There are about 40 cases of measles at the camp, though of a mild type. There is one very sick man in the hospital. Mr. Abell of Haywood county who has meningitis.

There were several minor cases tried today by the court martial court.

George H. Glass, ex-manager telephone exchange here was tried before a magistrate on Saturday for forgery and embezzlement. The case was continued until the 18th.

On Saturday in broad open day light, two more convicts walked out of the penitentiary. One of them is a Federal prisoner named Matthews, serving an 18 months sentence, and the other was named Dunlap, from Asheville serving a 5 years sentence. Neither they or the burglar Gettings and his companion Cox have been heard of.

A local telephone exchange will in the near future be started here. It will have a capital stock of \$12,500.

The directors of the Raleigh Cotton mills have declared a five per cent dividend for the six months ending July 1st. This dividend is payable July 15th.

Two more soldiers at Camp Russell have answered the last "roll call." Private Abell of Company L, from Haywood county, died on Sunday morning from meningitis after having been sick several weeks and Private Roper of Henderson county of Company H died in the afternoon after only a few days sickness. In his delirium he wandered out of the hospital, and could not be found for many hours. All this casts a gloom over the camp. There are several very sick soldiers in the hospital with fever. In all there are 51 hospital patients, most of them with measles.

Tonight the new commissioned officers of the Second Regiment gave a ball at the Agricultural and Mechanical College.

It is said that the Second Regiment is now complete, but it is rather hard to get news one day that is not contradicted the next.

The Penn Lumber Company of Aberdeen, Moore county, has been chartered. The incorporators are Pennsylvania men.

Nothing has been heard from the 4 "penitentiary birds" that escaped a few days ago. The authorities put all on the guards. The government will no doubt be heard from on the subject as two of the escaped men were federal prisoners.

Through the efforts of Senator Pritchard the war department has sent to the State Museum here a 12 inch armor piercing shell which had been fired

through a plate of nicked steel 1 1/2 inches thick

The criminal court for Wake began here today. Judge Bryan presides. There is only one murder case, that of Browning who killed his father-in-law, Strickland, as he claims in self defense.

The report from the crops is particularly good, tobacco leading.
