GARCIA'S FATE.

Cuban General Reported shot on His Way to Gomez.

TORAL IN TROUBLE.

Will Suffer Court Martial for Surrendering Spanish Troops.

Six Spanish Gunboats Are Sunk. Transporting Spaniards is Expensive. Talk of Disfavor to Southern Troops. Yellow Fever on Vessels.

Sinking Ships.

WASHINGTON, July 20.—Another victory over Spanish ships is the news to day. The gunboat Hornet and Wampanoag attacked and sunk six Spanish gunboats near the Isle of Pines. The American vessels also cut the new cable near Cape Cruz south of Manzanillo.

Blame Toral.
General Blanco lays the blame for surrendering Santiago on General Toral. He will be tried by court martial upon his return to Spain for surrendering the Spanish troops outside of Santiago.

General Garcia.
A private telegram has been received from Kingston, Jamaica, saying that the Cuban General Garcia was shot dead. No particulars of his death have been received.

A cable from Santiago says that General Garcia started in anger westward from the city to confer with General Gomez about the strained feeling between the Cubans and General Shafter.

Cubans Dissatisfied.
The Cubans are angry because they were not put in possession of the city and are not allowed to enter it. Though still eating American rations, Garcia and his men kept aloof from the American troops. It is stated that the Cubans have shown themselves incapable of governing and anarchy and violence might follow if they were not kept in strict bounds.

Our troops have been moved back into new camps in the hills of Santiago and General Shafter is waiting for the coming of the Immune regiments which are to garrison the city. The Spanish troops are also camped outside of the city. It is stated that many of them are ignorant that they have been surrendered and are under the impression that the United States has bought Cuba.

Shipping Them Home.
Several bidders have appeared for transporting the Spanish prisoners at Santiago home to Spain.

The contract will probably be awarded at thirty dollars each for the men and sixty dollars each for the officers. The total would amount to eight hundred thousand dollars.

Not Out Yet.
General Miles cables from Guantanamo Bay today that he is awaiting for orders and a naval convoy to Porto Rico.

He has ten transports loaded with troops and two additional ships loaded with artillery intended for the siege of Santiago have arrived from Tampa.

It is now asserted that General Miles will wait, off Guantanamo, the coming of the 6,800 regulars, with artillery, who are said to have sailed from Tampa. It is urged that Guantanamo is practically a point in the line of the voyage from Tampa and that no time will, therefore, be lost.

Although the number of troops to go, namely 30,000 is practically agreed upon the regiments were not specially designated. Secretary Alger left the designation to be determined upon by General Brooke except as to such troops as may be designated by the Secretary of War.

Southern Troops.
A good deal of feeling is manifested by southern Congressmen who are daily asked that southern troops be allowed to go to the front.

One Senator asserts that an organized effort seems to be used to prevent these troops from going forward.

They also declared they did not expect that Gen. Pittsough Lee would receive attention until public opinion should call for him in the Havana campaign.

It is stated by friends of the administration that no unjust discrimination has been practiced against the Southern troops, and that it is hoped some of them

Yellow Fever.
The presence of yellow fever at Tampa is confirmed by the government sending immune doctors and nurses there.

The steamer Seneca arrived at New York today with wounded troops. The vessel was quarantined with ten cases of suspected yellow fever on board.

Not Capable of Governing.

WASHINGTON, July 19.—No surprise is expressed here over the information from Santiago of friction between the American and the Cuban soldiers. By those in a position to judge, this has been anticipated from the very beginning. As a matter of fact, which cannot be disputed, the material of which the so-called patriot forces of Cuba is composed is very far from being first-class.

While not authoritatively so stated, for reasons of policy, it is well known that the Cubans have been a hindrance rather than an advantage in our movements. It is not human nature for our brave men to fraternize with those who loaf around in idleness while they are building roads and digging trenches, who gorge themselves on the government rations, who, if not prevented, will assault the sick and wounded, and whose greatest conception of the result of success is the opportunity it may afford to loot and plunder. It is no wonder the friction is excessive and plainly apparent.

KILGO-CLARK MATTER.

Question of Republican Endorsements a Problem.

To Practice Camp. Curious Burial Service. Senator Pritchard Not at Republican Convention. North Carolina's Quota of Soldiers.

JOURNAL BUREAU, Raleigh, N. C., July 20.

The Kilgo-Clark controversy was discussed by the board of trustees of Trinity College but action was postponed until another meeting which is to be held August 30th. There was a full meeting, and much evidence heard regarding the charges made by Judge Clark against President Kilgo, both of whom were present.

Early this morning the tap of the drum and the loud blowing of bugles with the heavy tramp of troops along the street told the line of march the six companies of the Second Regiment had taken to go out on a practice march of six miles to the river where they will go in camp for two days.

The death of private Godley yesterday was a sad one although his condition from typhoid fever had been so critical for several days that it was not unexpected. There is some criticism upon the ways in which he was hurriedly buried. No services, only a few prayers at his grave in the Federal Cemetery, not a volley was fired over him and only the low muffled roll of the drums told that a soldier had been laid to rest to await the resurrection morn. Surely no matter what he died of he was entitled to a military funeral so far as it was possible to give it to him. His company was from Tarboro and on Sunday had been sent to the South.

It is well that when Col. Burgwyn returns here with his soldiers from their outing, that they should change their camp for typhoid fever has developed at their present camp to quite an extent, though it has not been pronounced epidemic.

The two deserters Robert Carver from Company H, and William Miller from Company M, were sentenced to 3 years in prison, but on account of their youth and inexperience the sentence was reduced to 1 year. They will be carried to Ft. McPherson.

The Regiment is still not completely equipped. The canteen straps came a month ago, and yet no canteens have come, nor are there any cartridge belts. The War Department has ordered the complete equipment of the six companies that were ordered south before these here are equipped.

Senator Pritchard did not attend the Republican convention which met at 13 o'clock today. As stated yesterday the attendance was small. The real fight before the convention was the endorsement question. All the delegates wanted to endorse McKinley and Pritchard, but few wanted any endorsement whatever of their Governor. Some leading Republicans admitted they were in a bad fix, for if they endorsed Russell the Democrats would use it against them in the campaign and would use the fact of their not endorsing him also. The real object of the convention was to endorse the nominations of Judges. Those so far made are D. W. Caldwell, 2nd District, C. P. Locky, 6th; H. F. Seawell, 7th, and Henry Hayes, 7th. No nominations have been made in the 1st, 3rd and 13th, James E. Boyd is permanent chairman of the convention, but Holton will be re-elected State chairman.

The statement from Washington yesterday that in the second call for volunteers North Carolina's quota was 754, but that only 55 had been furnished, has caused quite a stir in the State. According to statements and figures shown

here it is only about 70 men short of the required number.

Neither of the North Carolina Regiments have been furnished with the State or National colors. There is something very negligent particularly on the part of the State.
