LANDING HIS MEN.

General Miles Beginning the Porto Rico Campaign.

WILL RECEIVE SUPPORT.

Departure of Spanish Troops From Santiago to Begin at Once. Blockade of San Juan Complete. Havana to be Attacked in October.

Special to Journal. WASHINGTON, July 25.—The administration does not expect to hear from General Miles for some days owing to the distance he has to send to reach a cable station.

Washington officials believe however that General Miles has landed troops at Fagerlo and that General Brooke will land at Granica and Generals Wilson and Barcelona.

The armies will unite and move together to attack San Juan. The points of landing are so far from San Juan that it will be almost impossible for the Spanish commander to concentrate enough troops to make much resistance, and before troops could be sent from San Juan General Miles will be reinforced by the troops which the War Department is sending after him as rapidly as possible.

General Miles has less than 5,000 effective men with him. The officials of the War Department are confident that he will be able to accomplish all that he expects to do before the arrival of reinforcements. He will establish his landing base under the protection of the guns of the naval convoy.

The transports sailed from New Orleans today with two immune regiments. The transport Morgan sailed from Tampa for Porto Rico and the steamer Panama sailed from Santiago with supplies for General Miles, consisting of tools, pile drivers and other appliances.

Admiral Sampson's warships stopped a merchantman off San Juan making for one of the ports. It is believed that the blockade of Porto Rico is complete.

The Spanish steamer Alcantara sails from Martinique for Santiago to take the Spanish prisoners to Spain under the contract with the company.

The Spanish civil officials at Santiago are resigning and Cubans are being appointed to the vacancies.

Spaniards at Havana declare that the only way to lift the blockade of the port is to concentrate privateers in Cuban waters, issuing letters of marque to many vessels now idle.

The Assault on Havana. WASHINGTON, July 24.—Notwithstanding the Havana campaign is perhaps ten weeks in the future, diligent preparations are going on, and when the time comes to move it is confidently anticipated the expedition will be complete in all its parts.

As outlined just now, the decisive movement against the chief city of Cuba, will not begin much, if any, before the middle of October, when the weather will be all that can be desired, and all fears of the yellow fever may be dismissed.

From seventy-five to one hundred thousand troops will probably compose the invading army, for it is intended to make the demonstration so overwhelming in point of strength as to give no hope or excuse for protracted resistance.

The army will be supported by a fleet for which the reduction of the forts which encircle Havana will be an easy task. Army and navy will go in a condition to give their blows with telling and fatal effect.

While the contingency of a desperate stand by the garrison has been provided for, it is not, as above intimated, thought this will occur. Weakened by hunger, dispirited by continued reverses, the Spanish troops, it is believed, will be only too glad to surrender to superior force, and Blanco, the blindest, should he still be in command, will not hesitate to offer his sword to Fitzhugh Lee, who, it is understood, is to have that honor.

News to Arrive. New York, July 24.—Dr. J. Julio Henna, president of the Porto Rican revolutionary junta, today said:

"In a few days the junta will issue a manifesto to the Porto Ricans, pointing out that the great North American people are coming not to impose a new yoke on the Porto Ricans, but to liberate them and incorporate them as a part of the American nation and its own free institutions."

THE STATE CAPITAL.

Army Matters. Ex-Governor Jarvis For Congress. Farmers Institute. Restraining Order on Telegraph Company.

JOURNAL BUREAU, Raleigh, N. C., July 25. More equipments for the Second Regiment have been received. Among other things are 10,000 ball cartridges to be used in target practice. It is said now that with the leggings, 1,000 pairs, the campaign hats, shoes, etc., which came yesterday the regiment is fully equipped except a few minor things.

Another practice march will be had this week. Saturday afternoon your correspondent went with Colonel Burgwynne on a lovely drive through heavy pine forests along the banks of a broad stream seeking a suitable place to which he could take his men for another outing, where tennis could be pitched, where they could have bathing facilities and a good supply of drinking water.

There is a hot war of words, on paper going on pro and con over the cleanliness of Camp Russell. Any how the camp will not be removed at present.

There was one case of desertion before the court martial today.

There was no dress parade Saturday, but instead there was quarters inspection, and a skirmish drill by Captain Wagner's company from Asheville which was very creditable.

Ex-Governor Jarvis will probably be pushed as Congressman from the 1st District by the Democrats of that part of the State.

A letter from Battalion Adjutant Wootton at Fort Frances Barracks, Fla., gives glowing accounts of their quarters and surroundings there. Two of the six companies of the Second Regiment that left here last week are stationed there under command of Major Cotton, whose adjutant is B. J. Wootton.

Farmers institutes will begin to be held tomorrow. Commissioner of Agriculture John R. Smith, President Holaday of the A. & M. College, President Massey and Dr. Reid Parker have gone to Boone, Watauga county, to begin this work.

The Western Union Telegraph Company has gotten Judge Purnell to issue an order restraining the Railroad Commission from enforcing the order of 1897 making the rate in a 10 word message, from one point in the State to another point in the State, is only 15c, and also restraining the order to charge only 24c for a message if the sender has to put on the 1c tax stamp. The restraining order was on Commissioner Abbott, and will be heard here before Judge Purnell on the first Monday in September.

Revenue Collector Duncan, Republican, declares that some Democrats are leaving the party, some coming into the Republican party, and some into the Populist party. He declares that he believes this and that the Democrats will be beaten in November.
