THE PRICE OF PEACE.

The President Expected to Reply to Spain's Message Today.

MANILA REPORTED TAKEN

Great Battle Fought There According to Madrid Dispatch. General Miles Moving on Ponce. Will March Next on San Juan.

 WASHINGTON, July 27.—President McKinley will probably answer the French Ambassador, M. Jules Cambon, tomorrow in the negotiations begun by the Spanish government looking towards peace.
 The Administration will agree to an armistice only on the provision that a treaty of peace follows on our terms.
 Ex-Senator Edmunds has been called by the President into the consultation on the question of the peace proposition.
 The proposition of the United States to Spain for ceasing hostilities is thought likely to be as follows:
 The independence of Cuba under the protectorate of the United States.
 The cession to the United States of the island of Porto Rico.
 The retention by this government of a coaling station in the Philippine Islands, the future control of the archipelago to be amicably arranged, probably under a protectorate of the United States and all the powers holding interests in the Pacific Ocean.
 The retention of the island of Guahan, in the Ladroneas.
 No payment of war indemnity.
 Honor of Battle.
 A rumor is in circulation in Madrid that a great battle has taken place at Manila. The report has not yet been confirmed.
 Twelve thousand Americans and thirty thousand Philippine insurgents attacked Manila, after Admiral Dewey had bombarded the city with his fleet. The combined attack was successful and the city surrendered.

Porto Rico Campaign.
 The news from Porto Rico by a cable dispatch from St. Thomas, says that General Miles is marching from Guanica towards Ponce. As soon as Ponce is taken the line of march will be taken up across the island towards San Juan.
 Guanica, the point of debarkation is a small town of 1,000 inhabitants on the southern coast of the island. It is less than twenty miles distant from Ponce by air line, and sixty-five miles from San Juan, against which the assault is to be directed. Guanica is about six miles south of Yauco, of which city it forms the port, and with which it is connected by a good road. The town is situated on a bay of the same name, which forms one of the best ports in the whole island.

The Chance for Peace.
 Washington, July 26.—The general opinion in official circles is that the Spaniards have finally decided to make all necessary concessions to the United States, and that the end of the war is probably in sight. It may require a month or two to bring negotiations to a satisfactory conclusion, but, in the interim, it is probable that little fighting will be done.
 In effect it is said that the message from Spain practically amounts to a request for an armistice until some basis of agreement may be decided upon. It is not regarded as probable that the President will accept this proposition, but as a forerunner of more definite proposals it is looked upon with considerable satisfaction.
 It is understood that the new developments in the situation will not for the present affect any of the plans formed for the prosecution of the campaign against Porto Rico. The transportation of troops to the island will be hurried forward and the operations which had been determined upon for the next two weeks will be carried on.
 It is intended that Porto Rico shall be in the hands of an American army before an armistice is declared, and that when such a declaration is made, that

the forces of the United States may be in position to accomplish in short order all the objects of the war, in case the Spaniards show any disposition to evade by diplomatic artifices the direct demands of the United States government.
 If the Spaniards have made overtures with a view merely to cause delay so as to improve, if possible, their own position, they will be disappointed. The President is not inclined to impose harsh or unreasonable terms, but he will insist firmly either that negotiations be conducted in a manner to bring about a speedy and satisfactory ending of the war, or he will end it by force along the lines now being pursued.

THE STATE CAPITAL.
Troops to Move. A Serious Runaway Accident. The Bankrupt Law.
 JOURNAL BUREAU, Raleigh, N. C., July 27.
 Thomas D. Turner, well known as a commercial traveler and a son of Hon. Joseph Turner, of Hillsboro, died in a hospital here today of malarial fever. He was brought here last Sunday.
 The positive statement is made that the First North Carolina Regiment now at Jacksonville, will go to Porto Rico, and the Second Regiment six Companies now at Raleigh will be sent to various parts in the South, just as its other six companies were scattered.
 Late yesterday afternoon two horses which were drawing a wagon on a road near here and which had no driver ran away and dashed into the rear of a carriage in which were Mrs. W. H. Rogers of Raleigh and Miss Wilkie of New Jersey. Both ladies were severely hurt, the carriage wrecked and a log of one the carriage horses was broken, the county will have to pay heavy damages for the carelessness.
 State Auditor Ayer is now a full-fledged candidate for populist nomination for Congress from this district and it is said in this county the populists are for him. There is no prospect of the nomination of Congressman Stroud.
 Senator Butler was here today. He is understood to be looking after various little details of Populist-Republican fusion.
 Though the bankruptcy law goes into effect next Monday, it does not appear that any of the officials necessary to carry it out in this district have been appointed. The Judge will take his time. The law is generally popular.
 Dr. H. H. Lewis, Secretary to the State Board of Health, urges the people of North Carolina to be vaccinated. The percentage of vaccinated people is astonishingly small in this State.
 The First Regiment now lacks only 30 men of having its war strength, now the Third Regiment lacks only 29.
