## PEACE THE TALK.

**Spain will have the Chance to Secure Terms at once.**

**THEY WILL BE LIBERAL**

**Sickness Great Among the Troops at Santiago. Ordered to be Moved, General Miles advancing on Ponce. Starving in Havana.**

Special to JOURNAL. WASHINGTON, July 28th.—"Our terms will meet the approval of the whole world."

Thus said a cabinet member in regard to the terms of peace to be offered to Spain by the administration as a result of the communication through the French Ambassador.

Secretary Day says that the draft of the reply of the United States to Spain will be submitted to a meeting of the Cabinet tomorrow.

The answer to Spain will not only set forth the general terms upon which the United States will agree to end the war this time, but will be in the nature of an ultimatum. There is to be no parleying over the question of opening peace negotiations. Spain, by her action in seeking peace, through the French Ambassador, practically asked America's price for peace.

It will be so worded as to require either immediate acceptance of the United States' terms or put an end to peace negotiations at once. Delay on the part of Spain will mean more extreme terms, when the subject of peace is again submitted.

**In Porto Rico.**

The Americans under General Miles are gradually making their way toward Ponce from Guanica.

Ponce, the second in the island in size and importance and the point at which the railway ends and the highway across the island to San Juan begins. This is a fine military road and seventy five miles in length. Its direction for the first forty five miles is almost northeast, and thence for the remainder of the distance generally due north to San Juan. The road is twenty feet in width throughout its length.

**Going Forward.**

General Brooks sailed from Newport News today for Porto Rico with five thousand troops. General Lee will certainly go to Porto Rico. A strike of two hundred loaders of transports occurred at Jacksonville today.

The Spanish forces are being withdrawn from all parts of Porto Rico and are concentrating for the defense of San Juan which is being put in a state of defense.

**Sickness or Hunger.**

Nearly four thousand cases of sickness are among the troops at Santiago. There are mostly fever cases and many of them are yellow fever.

General Shafter has been ordered to move his men from Santiago to the United States as fast as possible.

Reports from Havana say that hundreds are dying from starvation, the food supplies being exhausted.

**Cubans Feeling Better.**

SANTIAGO, July 27.—General Shafter has taken a step toward soothing the wounded feelings of the Cubans, who resent the fact that they were not permitted to enter the city of Santiago.

Songo, a small town eighteen miles from this place and on the railway line, has been surrendered to the American forces and the Cubans under General Castillo have been permitted to occupy it. It was held by a garrison of 350 Spanish soldiers. Captain Carvalhal, the Spanish commander, gave up the town as soon as officially advised of the capitulation of General Toral's army.

American soldiers are fretting under the monotony of garrison duty. Colonel Howard, of the Eighth Ohio, has called to President McKinley asking that his regiment either be dispatched to Porto Rico for active service or sent home.

Bakers will be permitted to charge only 30 cents in money for a pound. On account of the large quantity of flour which has been shipped into the city this

civil governor has ruled that excessive prices for bread are unwarranted. Spanish silver is at a discount of fifty per cent, and storekeepers refused to take it.

**Philippines and Indemnity.**

Washington, July 27.—The disposition of the Philippines is a subject that promises to outweigh all others, not so much from the importance of the islands to either Spain or the United States, as the possibilities of entanglement which this country may encounter if it takes any part of the islands or attempts to exert any protectorate over them.

The fate of Cuba and Porto Rico being settled, that of the Philippines and the Ladrone, and a money indemnity are the questions calling for the deliberations of the administration, and over which there is every probability of wide difference of opinion among members of the cabinet and other influential persons who will be consulted.

The question of indemnity will call for serious thought. Spain's well known inability to meet her own war expenses, and the depleted condition of her finances with no promise of her fiscal affairs improving after the war, hold out practically no promise that an indemnity could be met. At least \$100,000,000 and, perhaps, twice that amount would be the sum asked, if any money payment were demanded, and at the present rate of collection from her revenues, Spain could not meet it in fifty years. With the loss of her richest colonies, from which she has drawn annually large amounts for her public treasury, the position of her finances would be still more weakened.

**THE STATE CAPITAL.**

**Destination of the Companies. Chairman Simmons's Reply. Butler on Fusion.**

Raleigh, N. C., July 28.

The sixth death occurred at Camp Russell yesterday, the result of a malignant case of measles. The comrades of the dead soldier laid him to rest in the Federal cemetery here. It was private Hagler of Greensboro.

The heavy rain prevented dress parade but Colonel Burgyn's later read the order to designate one company to go to Lands End, near Port Royal S. C., one to go to Tybee Island and four to go to St. Simon's Island, Ga. Company G, of Gastonia, goes to Lands End; Company E, from Greenville to Tybee Island; Company B from Rutherfordton, H. from Asheville, L. of Nantahela, and K, of Wilmington, go to St. Simon's Island. Major Dixon will go to Lands End; Major Wilder is already at Tybee Island and Colonel Burgyn, field and staff officers, surgeons and hospital corps go to St. Simon's. Colonel Burgyn thinks that orders to move with transportation will come by Saturday or Sunday.

The death here at Rex Hospital Tuesday night, of Mr. T. D. Turner, of Hillsboro, was sad news wherever he was known. Mr. Turner had for many years been a travelling salesman; for a long time representing a Richmond house and was a favorite everywhere. He had typhoid fever.

The demand of Hon. F. M. Simmons for a report of the management of the penitentiary under John H. Smith has stirred up a regular hornet's nest. Superintendent Newborne has made a most vicious attack on Mr. Simmons for asking for certain statements and figures. The reply of Mr. Simmons was just as cutting and straight from the shoulder as Superintendent Newborne deserved. It is said the report will this week be given to two men here in Raleigh to be put in shape and then given to the public. Russell wrote the letter for Newborne.

The fact that our North Carolina soldiers stationed at Fort McPherson have to do guard duty and share other duties with negro troops there, is not relished by them nor their friends here either, but such is the present state of affairs.

Senator Butler was here a few days this week. His paper today editorially intimates that no fusion of Populists and Republicans in this State has been arranged. Fusion is to be left to the various counties to be settled there.

Many dogs have died here during the last three days, having found poisoned meat in Capitol square. It is very loudly intimated that the poisoning is done by one of the State officials.

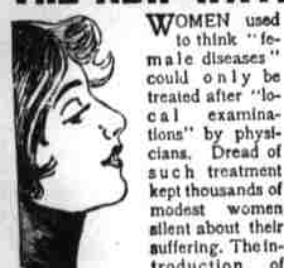
