OUR MEN TO PORTO RICO.

Two North Carolina Regiments to Go to The Island

NEARING THE END.

Almost Certain That Spain is Accepting Terms. Small Details Remain. Fever in Cuba. General Miles Nearing San Juan to Begin Siege.

Special to Journal, Washington, August 3.—The First North Carolina Regiment is ordered into the 2nd Brigade.

The North Carolina officers of the 2nd Regiment are to report by telegraph to General Wade at Washington for instructions.

Both the three North Carolina Regiments are to go to Porto Rico.

The army corps of General Fitzhugh Lee is to go to Cuba within a week.

Porto Rico. Nine more towns in Porto Rico have surrendered and two thousand Spanish soldiers have laid down their arms to General Miles.

By Saturday the American army will be close upon San Juan and the siege of the town will have commenced.

Fever at Santiago. The total number of yellow fever cases at Santiago is 4,170. Of these the new cases are 828. The number of cases reported as recovered is 629.

The men among the troops in the army in Cuba, including the President and the War Department, include general severity. During a conference at the White House at which Secretary Alger, Admiral General Godth and Surgeon General Sternberg were present, the repeated neglect of the wounded and sick upon the transports Nevena and Concho was thoroughly discussed.

Progress of Peace. Spain has submitted an answer to President McKinley through Ambassador Cambon and it is considered as accepting the terms but as quibbling over small details. Further instructions were a keel for.

The answer through Ambassador Cambon was received in a long dispatch which was Spain's reply to the President's note setting forth the terms on which the United States is willing to begin peace negotiations.

From Madrid it is announced that Spain had accepted the terms proposed by the United States. These reports were generally credited by the administration officials, who are now eagerly awaiting for the confirmation.

Beginning to Reduce. Washington, Aug. 2.—A reduction of the fleets of regular warships and auxiliaries impressed from the merchant service has been decided upon by the naval officials and will be put partly into effect at once. This will be followed immediately after the surrender of San Juan and the capture of Porto Rico by the detachment of many of the powerful fighters from service in the South, with orders to proceed home for repairs.

The four big American liners will be the first ships affected, two, probably the St. Paul and St. Louis, being turned over to the army for use as transports, and the other two, the Yale and Harvard, sent to navy yards and put in condition for trans-Atlantic commerce.

The expense of maintaining these ships is enormous, and the Navy Department is determined that none of the more expensive auxiliaries shall be retained a day longer in service than seems necessary.

In point of speed and fighting efficiency the four Morgan liners, Paris, Yankee, Dixie and Yosemite, come next, but these ships are government property and will, therefore, not be out of commission until peace has been actually declared and the work of unburdening the navy begins.

The bombardment of San Juan may be a part of the campaign for the capture of San Juan, in which event the monitors and battleships will be employed owing to their high projection and the power of their guns. After this there will be little necessity of retaining the great fleet that so effectively blockades every Cuban port and circles Porto Rico. The naval patrol, however, will be maintained off Havana and other eastern Cuban ports until Spain finally agrees to withdraw her forces.

Troops for Manila.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 2.—It is possible that while two weeks every available soldier now in camp at San Francisco will be on the way to Manila.

General Merritt has called for 30,000 troops in addition to the quota of 20,000 already assigned him. Up to date there have been forwarded from San Francisco 10,000 troops for the Philippines. The remainder of the quota is 4,000, which, with 20,000 additional men now called for, will make 34,000 troops yet to be transported.

There are immediately available here six full regiments of expeditionary forces aggregating 7,000 men. This will leave about 24,000 more to follow, and they will come principally from Eastern and Southern States.

The first transports which reached Manila are expected back about the middle of this month. There will, nevertheless, be a shortage of transportation facilities, and it may be necessary to send a special force via the Atlantic coast to San Francisco. Several such steamer lines are now available.
