## PEACEFUL TERMS

Arranged With Insurgent Aguinaldo.

The Belligerent Insurgent Conquered by General Merritt.

Troops Returning Home. Naval Reserves to be Discharged From Service. War Scare in England Over Russia.

Returning to America.

Special to Journal. WASHINGTON, August 5.—Dispatches to the War Department from Santiago say that six transports will sail from there on next Sunday, with four thousand and cavalry, bound for American shores. Other troops will follow very soon.

One third of the men in all the regiments are on the sick list. There are on an average twelve deaths daily from yellow fever in the camp of the Spanish prisoners.

Left for Guard Duty. Two regiments of the regular army troops and one regiment of immunes will remain at Santiago to do guard service in the province.

Garcia and his Cubans are at El Paso drawing rations, but still surly in their behavior.

Naval Reserves. Orders are now being prepared to discharge from service the Naval Reserves on the Yukon, Dixie, and Prairie.

No Fighting Condition. Reports say that most of the Spanish volunteers stationed at San Juan are in poor condition and are abandoning their arms.

Aguinaldo's Letter. The following letter was sent to Consul Wildman at Hong Kong:

"GAVITE—I have read in the newspapers that I am getting the big-head, and am not behaving as I promised. In reply I ask, why should the Americans expect to outline my policy for the present or future and I fight blindly for her interests, when America will not be frank with me? Tell me I am fighting for annexation, protection or independence? It is for America to say and not me. I can take Manila as I have defeated the Spanish elsewhere, but what would be the use. If America takes Manila I can save my men and arms for what the future has in store. Now, good friend, believe me, I am not both fool and rogue. The interests of my people are as sacred to me as the interests of your people are to you.

(Signed) AGUINALDO. But the President and Cabinet have taken no notice of it, believing that Gen. Merritt and Admiral Dewey could arrange everything.

Agreement With Aguinaldo. A late dispatch from Hong Kong says that Gen. Merritt has brought the insurgent Gen. Aguinaldo to terms and a settlement.

Still Discussing Terms. The conference at Madrid on the peace terms, still continues among the political leaders. Castelar still opposes the peace settlement.

Capt. Clark Ordered Home. Captain Clark of the battleship Oregon is on the sick list, and has been ordered home.

A War Alarm. A cable from London says that England is greatly excited over Russia's attempt to secure a port on the Persian Gulf.

The war scare from this report is increasing.

To Hold Manila. One of the most peculiar features of the present situation is that with peace with Spain in sight the administration should be preparing to send heavy reinforcements to Gen. Merritt. The Spanish at Manila, as elsewhere, are already sufficiently whipped, but those reinforcements are necessary to enable Gen. Merritt to successfully cope with Aguinaldo, whose successes at Manila have made him a dangerous leader for the semi-barbarous Philippine insurgents as the latest information makes it almost certain that he will dispute American possession of Manila and the island of Luzon with force.

The terms of peace provide that we shall hold Manila and Manila Bay until a peace commission decides upon the future government of the Philippine Islands. In order to hold Manila we must also hold enough of the country back of it to protect the source of its water supply, and it is now regarded as too much of a task to impose upon the present force under Gen. Merritt—he will only have 20,000 men when all the troops now on the way reach him. Members of the administration admit that they are much perplexed over the problem of what to do with Aguinaldo, but they say that the solution must be found by this government alone.

Porto Rico Also. More troops are being sent to Porto Rico, to share in the enjoyment of being welcomed by the Porto Ricans, with those already with Gen. Miles. There is little probability of any real fighting there.

Spain did not surprise anybody, when it cabled to the French Ambassador, who is representing it in Washington during the peace preliminaries, to ascertain whether it could attach a string to its acceptance of the terms of peace offered by President McKinley—it was so thoroughly Spanish. The French Ambassador knew that the terms offered were in the nature of an ultimatum and so informed Spain. There is no room for any trickery, consequently nothing but plain sailing is now looked for, as soon as the government of Spain formally accepts the terms of peace.

Will Take Time. A cessation of hostilities will be ordered. While, of course, no one can do more than guess how long it will take to negotiate that treaty, it is the general expectation in official circles that it will require several months, owing to the difficulty likely to be experienced in reaching a satisfactory agreement as to the Philippine Islands. Should the treaty not be signed before November, the Senate will not be called in extra session to ratify the treaty, as no harm would be done by waiting for the regular session in December.

Support of the Press. President McKinley has taken occasion to express his gratitude for the cordial support given him in the conduct of the war by the press, regardless of politics, and he thinks it will be of incalculable benefit to the country by showing to the world that however much we may differ among ourselves as to domestic policies, we are all Americans when it comes to confronting a foreign foe.
