The interests of my people ere as mored to me as the interests of your people are to you.

Spain did not surprise anybody, when t cabled to the French Ambassador, who is representing it in Washington during the peace preliminaries, to aspertain whether it could attach a string to its acceptance of the terms of peace offered by President McKinley-it was so thoroughly Spanish, The French Ambassador knew that the terms offered were in the nature of an ultimatum and so informed Spain There is no room for any trickery, consequently nothing but plain sailing is now looked for, as soon as the government of Spain formally accepts the terms of peace.

Will Take Time.

A cessation of hostilities will be ordered. While, of course, no one can do nore than guess how long it will take to negotiate that treaty, it is the general expectation in official circles that it will equire several months, owing to the difficulty likely to be experienced in reaching a satisfactory agreement as to the Philippiae Islands, Should the treaty not be signed before November, the Senate will not be called in extra session to ratify the treaty, as no harm would be done by waiting for the regular session in December.

Support of the Press.

President McKinley has taken occasion o express his gratitude for the cordial support given him in the conduct of the lrawing rations, but still surly in their war by the press, regardless of politics, and he thinks it will be of incalculable benefit to the country by showing to the world that however much we may differ among ourselves as to domestic policies, we are all Americans when it comes to onfronting a foreign foc.

Madrid, August 4 .- The most vigorous censorship has set in here upon everything concerning the peace negotiations The ministers observe a mysterious at titude and a sphinx-like silence. You can, therefore, easily imagine the feel-ings excited in officials circles by a telegram from Washington to the effect that President McKinley has taken the entire American people into his confidence regarding the terms of peace. The ill-effect here is little concealed.

The ministerial organ, Et Liberal, in an article evidently inspired, says, under the heading "American Indiscretion;

"The Governors of North America inderstand and conduct in plebian manner the art of politics and resources of diplomacy. For them the professional reserve and absolute silence upon which depend the salvation of a nation are ridiculous and are admissable only for the people of Europe. In our opinion, it is much better to give no information or note of any kind to the vulgar."
