## END IN SIGHT.

Spain Accepts the Conditions  
Offered by the President.

FIGHTING MAY CLOSE AT  
ONCE.

Formal Reply is on the Way. Shaf-  
ter's Army Coming North. Cer-  
vera Has Great Liberty.  
Spanish Cruiser Teresa  
Coming to Norfolk.

WASHINGTON, August 6.—The condi-  
tions, presented to Spain by the United  
States for the establishment of peace are  
agreed to by the Spanish cabinet and  
have been approved by the Queen Regent.  
A summary of the reply of Spain has  
been cabled to M. Gambon the French  
Ambassador at Washington. The formal  
reply is now on the way.  
M. Thibault, the secretary of the  
French embassy called at the State De-  
partment this afternoon and had an in-  
terview with Assistant Secretary Moore.  
It is believed that Thibault made ar-  
rangements for the meeting of President  
McKinley and M. Gambon at which the  
French Ambassador will present Spain's  
formal reply and final acceptance to the  
peace proposition.

**End of War.**  
If the answer of Spain is presented in  
the form expected, it is probable that an  
armistice will be declared in Porto Rico  
and Cuba at once.

The acceptance of the American terms  
involves great sacrifices, which Spain  
could not make hastily. Acceptance of  
the terms means her reduction from a  
colonial power to little more than a  
peninsular nation.

**The Hard Reply.**  
Before approving of the reply to the  
American conditions of peace, the Queen  
Regent held a consultation with General  
Martinez Campos, former Captain Gen-  
eral of Cuba, and also with Primo de  
Rivera, Duke of Setun and with Senor  
Salveta, Romero, Robledo and Premier  
Sagasta.

Senor Robledo told her majesty that  
the acceptance of peace by Spain under  
the terms of the American treaty was  
dangerous to the perpetuity of the Span-  
ish monarchy.

The Spanish authorities have given  
orders that Captain-General Macias  
should not force resistance in Porto  
Rico to the utmost. This is at the in-  
stigation of Sagasta, who deprecates unces-  
sary loss of life, knowing that Porto  
Rico will inevitably fall into the hands  
of the Americans.

Macias has been instructed to obtain  
terms like those obtained by Toral or  
better, so as to save Spanish honor as  
much as possible.

**Coming North.**  
The transport Louisiana arrived this  
evening at New York with troops from  
Santiago. The soldiers will be sent to  
Montauk Point.

The hospital station will be located at  
Montauk Point, where a field hospital for  
500 patients is being prepared in addi-  
tion to the hospital equipment which  
General Shafter's forces will bring along  
with them.

**The Maria Teresa.**

NORFOLK, Va., August 5.—The Merritt  
wrecking company have received advices  
from Santiago that the cruiser Infanta  
Maria Teresa is found to be in fairly  
good condition as to her machinery and  
boilers and will shortly start for Norfolk  
under her own steam. Another expedi-  
tion on the wrecking Chapman will be  
sent south next Monday or Tuesday,  
carrying four immense pontoons, es-  
pecially intended for raising the Cristobal  
Colon.

**Capt. Clark Breaks Down.**

Washington, August 5.—Capt. Charles  
E. Clark, the commander of the battle-  
ship Oregon during her famous run from  
San Francisco, to join Admiral Sampson's  
fleet, and whose management of  
his ship during the fight with Cervera's  
squadron won him special praise, has  
broken down as a result of the terrific  
strain he has been under, and will be  
detached and ordered home on the recom-  
mendations of a medical board. A cable-  
gram was received today from the  
Admiral saying a medical survey had  
found Captain Clark unfitted for further  
duty on account of serious physical dis-  
ability and that he would be sent home  
immediately for treatment.

Captain Clark joined the Oregon just  
before she sailed from San Francisco on  
her long run to this side of the contin-  
ent. He was under severe pressure for  
several weeks during the vessel's voyage  
and since his arrival the ship has been  
actively on duty with the fleet off San-  
togo. It will be necessary for him to  
rest before being assigned to other duty.

## THE STATE CAPITAL.

Butler Gives It to Skinner. Criticism  
of our Men Odd Fellows. J. W.  
Bailey Not Such a High Minded Man.

Raleigh, N. C., August 6.  
Senator Butler in an editorial in the  
Caucasian says that Congressman Skin-  
ner is anything but a Republican and  
that he is a traitor and a monopoly tool.  
He says that in Washington Skinner is  
not allowed to attend a caucus of Popu-  
list, Senators and Congressmen. The  
editorial goes on to say it would be a  
disgrace to the party, as well as a calam-  
ity, for such a man as Skinner to be re-  
nominated. This is possibly another  
case of "pot and kettle," anyhow lets  
wait to have the "kettle" reply to the  
article.  
The tobacco market opened here yes-

The report that the North Carolina  
soldiers at Fort McPherson were so un-  
trained and undisciplined that they were  
relieved from duty and sent to St. Si-  
mons Islands is relished here but little.  
It is said that they allowed the men to  
go in and out at will from the fort, and  
that they allowed some Spanish soldiers  
to escape. While the men may have  
fallen far short of that perfection found  
in the regular army they surely had some  
training here that would have learned  
them a few things.

The Sovereign Grand Lodge of Old  
Fellows is preparing for the annual  
meeting which will be held in Boston in  
September. The grand representatives  
are Messrs. Bruton of Wilson, Williams  
of Elizabeth City; Sawyer of Asheville;  
Past Grand C. M. Busbee of Raleigh  
will also attend, as will Past Grand  
Representative Lumsden.

The resignation of J. W. Bailey editor  
of the Biblical Recorder, from the Agri-  
cultural Board of trustees, giving such  
reasons as that he would no longer serve  
where Governor Russell kept such a  
corrupt man (John L. Smith) in power  
brought about questions that have not  
yet been fully answered. It has come to  
light that Mr. Bailey very favorably be-  
fore the public. It has come to light that  
Mr. Bailey not only drew his per diem for  
his valuable services on the board (that  
was all right), but he pocketed the allow-  
ance made the members for board while  
here in discharge of their duties. Now  
Mr. Bailey lives here in Raleigh so that  
money was a clear gain to him.

## Cervera in Norfolk.

NORFOLK, Va., Aug. 5.—Admiral Cer-  
vera arrived in Norfolk this morning on  
the Bay Line steamer. He was accom-  
panied by his son, Lieut. Angel Cer-  
vera.

The purpose of the Admiral's visit  
was to call at the Naval Hospital to see  
Captain Concas and the other wounded  
officers and men of his fleet, who are  
there for treatment. He was met at the  
Bay Line wharf by a United States naval  
officer and left in a launch for the hos-  
pital. The Admiral breakfasted there and  
spent several hours with his wounded  
countrymen, of whom there are six of-  
ficers forty-seven men.

The Admiral was much interested in  
the condition of his men and was grati-  
fied at the improvement they are mak-  
ing.  
After his visit to the hospital the Ad-  
miral was taken by Dr. Cleboree to a  
cottage in the navy yard, where he took  
lunch with Commodore Farquhar. He  
went to Virginia Beach in the afternoon  
and returned to Annapolis at night.

## England and Russia.

growing out of friction in the east as a  
result of England standing behind China  
in that country resisting Russian en-

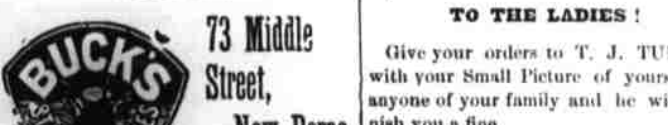
