### THE STATE CAPITAL.

The Ninth Cavalry, The Bagley Monument, Academy of Music. At the Colleges. The Democratic Campaign Parley on.

RALEIGH, N. C., August 10.  
The officers of the 9th Cavalry here yesterday had some trouble with some of their men. Several got drunk, and one was left in jail here to work out a fine for fighting an officer on the police force, his Chaplain refusing to pay it.

In spite of the fact that it was said there were no sick men with the regiment one case of malignant typhoid fever was left here at the City Hospital.

The fact that the Board of Agriculture did not make an appropriation for the State Fair will not affect the holding of the Fair, and the paying of premiums as formerly. Col. Cunningham, the Fair President, is using every effort so that the Fair of 1898 may be a success in every particular. Let the people come and see what a good president he makes.

The "Worth Bagley Monument Association" was formed yesterday. President Hon. W. M. Russ; Secretary, T. B. Eldridge; Treasurer, D. E. Everitt. There is on hand over \$2,400 for the memorial. It was decided by the gentlemen present to erect in Capital Square—a bronze statue of a naval ensign on a handsome base.

Captain Crawford of the Raleigh Company, of the 1st. regiment is here on a 10 days furlough to see his wife who is sick. He came thinking his stay might be shortened by orders for Porto Rico, but now that possibility is over as the troops will not be ordered there for some time any how.

The new manager of the Academy of Music, Mr. S. A. Schloss of Wilmington is here having the Academy, stage and scenery put in perfect order for the coming season. He has billed some splendid attractions. The season opens Aug. 26th.

One of the officers of the 9th Cavalry while here yesterday spoke of Lieutenant Smith, who was at West Point with him. His name is Captain Guilfoyle, and the tribute he paid the two comrades who went through college and army life together, to finally fall side by side at Santiago was truly a beautiful one.

The Auditorium at the Institute here for the white blind will be finished by September 15th and the dormitory at the colored institute by November 1st. The two industrial buildings being put up for both institutions will be ready for use October 1st.

Prof. Kilgore, State Chemist of Mississippi and Miss Bettle Dinwiddie were quietly married at Peace Institute this afternoon. Miss Dinwiddie is a daughter of Rev. Dr. Dinwiddie, principal of Peace Institute.

A new chair has been created for the Agricultural and Mechanical college here. The chair of Biology and Veterinary, and Dr. Cooper Currier of New York elected to fill it at a \$1,500 salary. Nothing was done to displace Mr. Skinner, farm manager and steward.

The hall occupied by the Grand Lodge of Masons has been handsomely re carpeted and refitted. The walls are covered with portraits of grand officers.

Lieut. Col. Cowles will leave here on Monday to join his regiment, or the part of it that is at St. Simons Island, Col. Burgoyne who is there writes that it is delightful.

"White Government Unions" are being formed in many counties. The Democratic campaign is fully on, and many Populists and also Republicans are joining the Democrats, thoroughly disgusted with Russell and negroism.

### Hawaii Government.

WASHINGTON, August 9.—President Sanford B. Dole, of Hawaii, is to continue to exercise the functions of chief executive of Hawaii until such time as Congress shall receive the report of the commission appointed to devise a form of government for the island and shall have enacted a statute for its government. There is to be no governor of Hawaii appointed by the President for an indefinite time, if at all.

## THE FINAL

## WORD.

### Demand Made on Spain to Agree Within 24 Hours.

### SPAIN ATTEMPTS DELAY.

#### Called to Time by an Ultimatum Which is Cabled by Cambon, Severe Fighting at Manila. Many Spaniards Were Killed.

WASHINGTON, August 10.—The reply of Spain to the American peace terms not being satisfactory, a protocol has been drawn up and agreed to by Secretary Day and Ambassador Cambon. It is signed by both parties.

The protocol provides for peace. But the Spanish government must approve of it before tomorrow night.

It is an ultimatum on the part of the United States and the time for its acceptance is limited to twenty-four hours.

Unless agreed to by that time the American fleet already prepared for that purpose will sail against the Spanish coast and will be prepared to attack the seaboard cities of Spain.

The French Ambassador has been instructed to inform the Madrid government on whose behalf he is acting that the terms of the protocol must be accepted or rejected in their entirety and at once.

Ambassador Cambon has cabled the full protocol to the Spanish government. The terms sent to Spain today are practically those of the first peace proposition submitted by President McKinley, but they are now couched in firm and more imperative language.

Spain must leave all the islands touching on the Caribbean Sea at once, and in the far east must give up Guam and Manila and then when that has been done the United States will enter upon a final treaty of peace. It is evacuation first and then the peace treaty second. Spain must also shoulder the Cuban debt. The Philippine question is to be left to a commission of ten members to meet in Paris, the United States to retain Manila and the neighborhood pending the final settlement of the question.

It is thought very improbable that Spain will now back out of the treaty. It is evident that the Spanish government will be taken by surprise inasmuch as it was evidently expected to provoke a continuance of the correspondence and not to be brought to time with such a round turn as this ultimatum will do.

### A Midnight Battle.

CAMP DEWEY, Near Manila, August 1.—Nine dead, forty-seven wounded. That tells the story of the baptism of fire the American army has undergone before Manila.

The American trenches before Malate were thrown forward some days ago to displace the insurgents, extending half a mile toward Pasay. Between the American extreme left and the insurgent barracks at Pasay is about half a mile of bamboo swamp, interspersed with mango trees, which the insurgents were supposed to cover and had covered heretofore.

After some desultory firing from the insurgent guns on the night of July 31 to which Spaniards replied at intervals, a heavy rain fell and the insurgents retired to Pasay, leaving the American right uncovered.

The Spaniards front opened fire at 11:30 p. m. on the American right, drawing the fire of the Pennsylvanians, who were outside the trenches, thus getting their position. Then from a dense bamboo thicket 250 yards to the American right there blazed the fire of 2,000 Spaniards, while the Malate batteries vent shrapnel shrieking in upon the American works and from the front came a galling fire from the Neuzenfeldts.

For three hours the Spaniards were maintaining a galling fire, but they shot high, making a veritable horde of the second line of entrenchments, held by the Second California Battalion, then the Spanish fire gradually slackened to ward morning and they retreated.

The Spanish loss must have been heavy, as the ground over which they charged was covered with clotted blood. Besides Mauser bullets the Spaniards shot brass-coated balls.

The lights of the city are extinguished. All meats are exhausted. The defenses are a corollary of trenches and two batteries of nine-inch guns each, the latter on the Cavite side.

### The Gold Country.

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., August 9.—The steamer Rosalie arrived here last night from Skagway, Alaska, with 100 passengers from Dawson City. They bring advices from Dawson up to July 27th and gold dust estimated at \$100,000. Mining operations in the Klondike are at a standstill and will continue so until cold weather sets in. It is estimated that there are about 2,000 idle men in Dawson waiting for something to turn up. This number is being swelled every day by new arrivals from both up and down the river. There are now more persons there than the country can support.

SEATTLE, Wash., August 9.—A special from Vancouver, B. C., says the steamer Farrallon is in port here from Skagway. The purser and captain say that a million dollars is in the safe in gold dust. The purser says that when she left Skagway the town was in flames and that the ice was fast approaching the dynamite stores, with no prospect of checking it.
