WAR AT AN END.

Cessation of Hostilities Expected To Take Place at Once.

SECRETARY DAY AND M. CAMBON SIGN THE PROTOCOL.

Provisions of the Protocol Preliminary to a Treaty of Peace.

Rough Riders Bad Luck. Sampson and Schley.

WASHINGTON, August 12.—The Protocol, preliminary to a treaty of peace between the United States and Spain was signed this afternoon at the White House at 4:23 o'clock.

Secretary of State Day acted in behalf of the United States, and M. Cambon, the French Ambassador, for Spain.

The Protocol provides:

First—That Spain will relinquish all claims of sovereignty over, and title to Cuba.

Second—That Porto Rico and the other Spanish Islands in the West Indies, and a island in the Ladrones, this island to be selected by the United States, shall be ceded to the United States.

Third—That the United States will occupy and hold the City, Bay and Harbor of Manila, pending the conclusion of the treaty of peace, which shall determine the control, disposition and government of the Philippine Islands.

Fourth—That Cuba, Porto Rico and other Spanish Islands in the West Indies shall be immediately evacuated, and that commissioners are to be appointed within ten days, who shall within thirty days after the Protocol is signed, meet at Havana and San Juan, respectively, to arrange and execute the details of the evacuation.

Fifth—That the United States and Spain will each appoint not more than five commissioners, to negotiate and conclude a treaty of peace; and the commissioners are to meet at Paris not later than October 1, 1898.

Sixth—Upon the Protocol being signed, hostilities will be suspended, and notice to that effect will be given as soon as possible by each government to the commanders of its military and naval forces.

Accepted Finally.

Spain could not even accept the very liberal terms of peace offered by this government without resorting to its customary skulduggery, by attempting to attach conditions that would have complicated the work of negotiating the treaty of peace. It is needless to say that the attempt was a failure; the terms of peace were not hurriedly made, and were not made to be changed. Spain accepted them, without conditions, fast enough when informed that they would be withdrawn if not accepted at once. It is only fair to say that M. Cambon, the French Ambassador, who has acted as Spain's representative in Washington through all the negotiations, tried unsuccessfully to persuade the Spanish ministry not to delay.

Rough Riders Bad Luck.

About the most disgusted men who have been in Washington since it was known that the fighting was all over are several members of the companies of Rough Riders which were left at Tampa when their companions went to Santiago. The Tampa contingent has gone to Montauk to unite with the companies that have returned from Santiago. How these men feel about it may be judged by these remarks made by one of them who stopped stopped over in Washington a day: "All we have to regret is our inability to get to the front. To my dying day the recollection of that disappointment will rankle, and there are hundreds who feel the same way. We do not blame anybody in particular. It was just our hard luck. We have been told that we can go down to Cuba with the army of occupation, but there is no solace in that. Some of us have given up positions paying as high as \$3,000 a year, and we went from motives of patriotism. We went to fight, but fate was against us, and now we will go back as quick as we can to our private business. Excuse us from the army of occupation,"

Talk of Wheeler.

Nothing is more indicative of the weakness of political partisanship in Washington, just now, than the serious discussion of the probability of Secretary Alger being succeeded, should he carry out his expressed intention to retire soon on account of his health, by Maj. General Joseph Wheeler. "Fighting Joe" of Alabama, a life long Democrat. There may not be anything in the talk—prob-

ly is not—but it is all the same significant that it should be indulged in.

Sampson First.

In deciding to make both Sampson and Schley Rear Admirals, the President has not ended the controversy between the friends of the two officers. On the contrary, he has added to it, by making Sampson the ranking Rear Admiral, an honor which Schley's friends think should have been his.

Claims Against Turkey.

WASHINGTON, August 12.—The public has been so busy discussing the arrangements for the end of the war with Spain that it has not given the attention its importance deserved to the action of the Sultan of Turkey in declaring that his government was not responsible for the destruction of the property of American missionaries, at Harpoot, Armenia, in 1895, by a Turkish mob, and that he would not pay the \$100,000 which this country has been demanding for the missionaries with more or less persistence for more than two years, the claim was filed by Secretary Olney during the last months of the Cleveland administration.

Those who are urging that a fleet of warships, which could start at an hour's notice, having been prepared for the expected trip to Spain, be sent to Turkish waters to collect this money, by force, if necessary, are met with the statement that one of the difficulties in the way is that in disclaiming responsibility for the acts of a mob Turkey has taken precisely the same position that this government has taken in the past. No information on this subject can be had at the Department of State.

Garcia More Humble.

Santiago de Cuba August 11.—General Garcia, who got angry because this city after its surrender was not turned over to the Cubans, severed all relations with the United States Army and withdrew his troops, indicates a desire to reconsider his action in a letter that was received today by General Shafter.

The letter is dated at Giliara, August 5. It is in response to a request made by General Miles, July 19, when he was planning his expedition to Porto Rico, that General Garcia detailed fifty Cubans to accompany the expedition as guides and scouts.

General Garcia said that as he understood General Miles had already sailed, he supposed it would be too late to comply with the request. He stated, however, that he was willing to furnish the fifty men if they were still wanted, and included an order for them.

A Cuban courier who arrived today from Manzanillo states that General Rabi with 5,000 Cubans, is now before that town.

THE STATE CAPITAL.

Bankruptcy Re-cess Appointed. Report on Sale of Tobacco, Army and N. S. Items.

JOURNAL BUREAU. RALEIGH, N. C., August 12. Judge Purnell has issued appointments in three of the bankruptcy districts. For the fifth district in which Wake county is included, ex-United States Marshal Joshua B. Hill is the referee. The referee in the first district is Charles Guirkin of Elizabeth city; for the second district it is C. C. Fagan, of Williamston. The 3rd and 4th District referees have not as yet been appointed.

The National Manufacturing Company of Greensboro was yesterday incorporated for the manufacture of woodenware, brassware, etc.

The report of the Labor Commissioner shows a very great falling off in the sale of cigarettes. In the eastern district under the Revenue Department the manufacture of cigarettes has decreased about sixty millions. There are some who think the new tax has caused this decrease in the manufacture and sales, while others think it is due to the anti-cigarette laws in the west, and the hard fight made in other States against it. The sale of cigars and snuff has increased. The following figures for the year, as it would end November 1, 1897, and the next year which ended June 14, 1898, are given:

It is stated that Logan D. Howell has resigned as Quartermaster Sergeant of the 1st Regiment. The reasons for this change are not given.

Moving on Albionto.

COASO, Porto Rico, August 10.—General Miles troops are resting today, all save the engineers, who are repairing the bridges on the roads between this place and Albionto, which is the next point to be attacked and where the Spaniards are waiting in strong force to check the advance on San Juan.

Scouts have been sent out far from the main body to find the roads and paths leading to Albionto and to learn if any of the enemy's soldiers are between General Miles and the city.
