THE ROCK QUARRY.

How Belgian Blocks Are Turned Out. Political Items of Yesterday. The Crop Bulletin. Too Much Rain.

RALPHIGH, N. C., August 16.
Senator Butler registered at the Yagboro House yesterday. He and Governor Russell came in on the same train. Of course that was a mere accident. The Senator is here on time for the meeting tomorrow of the Populist State committee.

The First and Second Regiments when mustered in and mobilized here made many debts. The amounts due the merchants were filed with those due the State, and were received and signed by Capt. Gresham U. S. A., who mustered in the two regiments. Mr. J. C. L. Harris has a copy of all these claims which amount to something like \$30,000.

Recruiting officer Christian is notified that only 20 more men are needed for putting the First Regiment up to the required quota.

Out at the rock quarry near the eastern city limits, there is an immense amount of work going on. There are 20 miles of side walks to be curbed. There are many men at work there. Some are paid by the city while some are sent there by the Mayor to work out fines. The men are not paid for time, but according to the amount of work done.

They are paid 45 cents a hundred for Belgian blocks chiseled and shaped ready for use. Last week 21,000 blocks were made ready, and of this number, one man who has become an expert shaped 3,800. Thus this man for his week's work received \$17.00. To pave a block on either of the principle streets requires 5 times the number turned out last week, that is 105,000. These blocks though are for curbing streets that are to be macadamized, and the 21,000 blocks will curb five blocks. The chips from the chisel of the workmen goes to the crusher for material for macadamizing.

The Weekly Crop Bulletin for week ending Monday, August 15, 1898, is as follows: With the exception of one or two days at the beginning, the week ending Monday, August 15th, was characterized by continued cloudy, showery weather, with a high average humidity.

From the 10th to the 15th light rains occurred every day. In a few counties the rain was needed, but over the larger portion of the State dry weather and more abundant sunshine are now essential for maturing crops; this is especially true over the entire section west of the Blue Ridge, where the rains have been continuous and heavy. Freshets occurred on all lower bottoms of the French Broad and other streams, injuring corn considerably. The temperature has continued above the normal and favorable; the excess did not exceed more than from one to two degrees, and the extremes were moderate in range. A week of fair, sunny weather would now be very beneficial.

A few correspondents state that there was some improvement in cotton, but the majority of reports indicate increased shedding and the continued formation of too much weed. Cotton has attained such a heavy growth, especially in the south, that more sunshine is needed to prevent mildew and rotting of lower bolls. Some bolls are open; plants continue to bloom freely, indicating a good top crop. Here and there are sections where cotton is very promising.

Early corn will be a very heavy yield and the late crop is practically assured. There was again some injury by too much rain and flooding of bottoms in the west, but generally throughout the State corn continues to be very satisfactory. Much fodder is ripe and saving it is becoming general, though the weather was not favorable for the work and there was some damage and loss. Tobacco has nearly all been cured in the southeast; curing continues active in the central but has not begun in the west portion of the State. Some unfavorable reports come from the north-central counties (Person, Vance) and reports of damage by insects from Person, Chatham and Nash.

The damp, rainy weather has interfered with drying fruit and has caused much rotting of fruit, melons, tomatoes, late cabbage and some potatoes. Fall plowing is progressing as rapidly as circumstances will permit. Many turnips have been planted and are coming up well. Rice is very fine. Minor crops, especially peanuts, field peas and sweet potatoes are excellent. Frequent rains during July and August have caused an improved and more abundant supply of in springs and wells.

CAPTURE CONFIRMED.

General Merritt Cables That Manila is in Possession.

FEVER ON TRANSPORT.

Cases Reported at Montauk Point. Peace Commissioners Appointed For Cuba and Porto Rico. Cubans Accept Peace. Madrid Becoming Satisfied.

WASHINGTON, August 16.—Official confirmation of the capture of Manila by the American forces is received from General Merritt.

He cables to the War Department that the city has fallen and that the American flag is floating above the capital of the Philippines.

Yellow Fever.
At Camp Wikoff, Montauk Point, L. I., Dr. Magruder boarded the transport Grande Duchesse today. He found that there were two cases of yellow fever on board and also that there were twenty five suspicious cases among the soldiers.

Retaining.
General Shafter will leave Santiago next Saturday on his way home. With him will come the last of his corps, the Fifth.

General Joe Wheeler is now in New York, having arrived on the ship with Roosevelt. He will go at once to Washington.

The Appointment.
The appointments for the American Peace Commissions to arrange for the evacuation of Porto Rico and Cuba by the Spanish armies are as follows:
For Porto Rico, General John H. Brooks, Admiral Schley and General William M. Gordon.
For Cuba, General James F. Wade, Admiral Sampson and General M. C. Butler.

Madrid and Cuba.
MADRID, Aug. 15.—For the first time in two weeks free communication with Cuba and Porto Rico has been re-established. The first news flashed over the wires was that General Blanco and his staff have resigned. This is not in any spirit of protest; but to avoid having charge of the evacuation of the Antilles.

It is officially announced that the port of Cadiz is reopened. Vessels may enter or leave at any hour of the day or night. The "Flying Squadron" is going to Ferrol Wednesday.

From Manila.
HONO KOKO, August 15.—Manila has surrendered to Admiral Dewey. The Americans bombarded the city last Saturday and were soon in possession.

Governor-General Augusti and his family arrived here today from Manila on the German cruiser Kaiserin Augusta. He refused to say anything, except that he and his entire family were returning to Spain.

The officers of the Kaiserin are reticent regarding Manila. Spanish passengers who arrived on the cruiser say that on Saturday morning Admiral Dewey's fleet advanced against Manila and signaled the garrison to surrender. The demand was refused, the forts were bombarded and the city was taken by assault.

General Augusti, who had relinquished the government the week before to the military governor, was taken off by the German cruiser late at night.

San Juan Waiting.
SAN JUAN, Porto Rico, August 15.—It is now generally known here that peace has been proclaimed, but the provisions of the agreement are not known.

A telegram was received from General Miles at Ponce stating that he had received official dispatches from Washington announcing peace and asking permission to send an officer with confirmation of the statement. General Macias' reply was favorable, and an American officer is expected here today.

Until General Macias has received orders from Madrid it will be impossible to go beyond a suspension of hostilities and the arrangement of preliminaries. As soon as the Madrid orders arrive further negotiations will be entered into and the transfer of the island will be made according to instructions.

Meanwhile there is no relaxation of vigilance in San Juan. The sentinels crisis still resound from the walls of the Morro. The batteries are manned and the guns are loaded as usual.

Attitude of Cubans.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, August 15.—Hours of sober thought have considerably modified the views of the Cubans on the cessation of hostilities. There is no longer any talk here of not recognizing the fact that peace has been virtually declared between the United States and Spain. The Cubans have come to realize that such a view might make the situation disagreeable for them.

The censorship, which was reimposed here a week ago, has been lifted, and I am able to tell of a remark that General Shafter made on this subject to me Saturday. It has been cut by the censor out of my dispatch referring to the attitude of the Cubans.

"I do not believe," General Shafter said, "that the Cubans will go on fighting in the face of the proclamation."

Here he brought down his list on the table by way of emphasis.

"But if they do," he continued, "they will be making an attack upon the United States and will be treated accordingly."

Extreme dissatisfaction is still expressed by the Cubans because they received no formal notification of the suspension of the hostilities, and no request was addressed to the insurgent leaders which would make them parties to the truce. Those who have extreme views look upon this as another manifestation of the contempt in which the United States holds her Cuban allies.

What Garcia may do is hard to tell, but Castillo and other leaders here believe that he will at once cease operations and faithfully observe the proclamation.
