## GRAND REVIEW.

To be Made By Santiago Troops Before Mustering Out.

President Promises General Wheeler to Review Parade. General Lee Undoubtedly Will Command Cuban Garrison.

WASHINGTON, August 17.—The President today told General Wheeler that he would review the troops which participated in the campaign against Santiago, that resulted so gloriously for the American arms.  
The grand review will take place as soon as the soldiers are in condition to parade. It will precede the mustering out of the volunteers from which are now at Montauk Point.  
The review, it is now thought, will probably take place in New York City. The date has not yet been fixed. It will depend upon the rapidity with which the men recover from their wounds and the fevers contracted in the Cuban climate.

General Lee.  
Unless a radical change is made in the present plans, General Fitzhugh Lee will command the American troops to be used to garrison Cuba upon the evacuation of the island by the Spanish army.  
The assignment of General Lee to this position will be similar to that of General Merritt in the Philippines.

Movement of the Fleet.  
The Navy Department has issued new orders to Commodore Howell concerning the blockading squadron and the warships that have done duty off the northern coast of Cuba. The vessels had been ordered to rendezvous at Key West. The point has been changed to Hampton Roads. The reason for the change is the danger of yellow fever that would be incurred by being stationed at Key West.

Wheeler Talks of Cuba.  
New York, August 16.—Gen. Wheeler looked the picture of health during his stay in New York. His face was bronzed from the Cuban sun. He had discarded his uniform for a suit of plain black. The general wore an alpaca coat and a campaign hat when he arrived, but later he discarded the hat for a new headgear of straw.

He decided that he had time before the departure of his train to visit a few of his friends here. As the general and his daughters and son were passing thirty-fourth street and Broadway a cabman, who recognized the old soldier, nearly ran over a pedestrian in his haste to inform a group of persons on the sidewalk that the little man with the gray beard was "fighting Joe."

After he had visited several other friends in the Wall street district, General Wheeler bade his children good-bye and went to Jersey City to take the Washington train. On the way over he said:

"I have not the least idea what I have been called to Washington for. My future plans are, therefore, uncertain. Now that the war is over, things begin to look brighter. The Cuban people are anxiously looking for America's capital to come into their island and develop it. It is a magnificent country. Why, the wagon roads at Montauk Point, made in a short time, represent more work than has been done in building roads in Cuba for forty years."

"I am greatly in favor of territorial expansion for this country. It will be the salvation of our people. Such a people, supplying more products than any other country, must have an outlet, and this outlet, I think, we will find in our new possessions."

"How about the Philippines?" was asked. "Do you think it is good policy for the United States to hold them?"  
"I don't know much about the Philippines," was the answer, "but I do know that wherever the American flag waves good government will be found."  
Reverting to the Cubans, General Wheeler said he did not wish to criticize them. "They were handicapped by not understanding our language," he said. "When they understood what was wanted they were good soldiers."  
General Wheeler said he had entirely recovered from the illness which prostrated him when he was before Santiago. He said the camp at Montauk was an ideal one and a place where the soldiers would rapidly regain health.

Havana Lively.  
HAVANA, Aug. 18.—Yesterday and today are holidays, and the churches, the streets and parks have been crowded with people, the city having its old-time normal aspect.  
Everywhere, in the cafes and on the streets, the conditions of peace are still the subject of anxious inquiry, as thus far nothing definite is known. The varying reports received are made the subject of a thousand comments. It is noticeable that the former roughness of tone that characterized the Havana press in all situations in America and Ameri-

cans has disappeared, although these journals still assert their love for the mother country.

The Spanish residents of Cuba have conducted themselves with exemplary discretion since the report was received of the signing of the protocol. Havana is tranquil, and its people are turning their attention to their daily vocations, in the hope of retrieving partly the losses sustained during the period of insurrection and war.

Wherever the conditions of peace are discussed, the opinion is freely expressed by the majority that under existing conditions annexation to the United States would be the best solution of the problem.

Dewey's Report.  
WASHINGTON, August 17.—The following was received by the navy department this morning:  
"Manila, August 13.—Manila surrendered today to the land and naval forces, a combined attack. A division of the squadron shelled the forts and intrenchments at Malate, on the south side of the city, driving back the enemy—our army advancing on that side at the same time. The city surrendered about five o'clock in the afternoon, and the American flag is being posted by Lieut. Brumby. About 7,000 prisoners of war were taken. The squadron had no casualties."  
"On the 7th Gen. Merritt and I formally demanded the surrender of the city, which the Spaniards refused."  
(Signed) Dewey.

Enter San Juan.  
St. Thomas, D. W. I., Aug. 16.—American officers have entered San Juan, Porto Rico. Vessels of the American fleet are waiting outside the harbor. They will enter as soon as the mines have been removed. The Spanish flag still flies over the fortifications.

The New Secretary.  
WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—Ambassador Hay at London has accepted the office of Secretary of State.  
Mr. John Hay was born in Salem, Indiana, October 8, 1828, being a descendant of John Hay, the son of a Scotch soldier in the army of the Elector Palatine, in Germany, and who immigrated to America about the middle of the last century with four sons.

Hay passed his boyhood in the West. He was graduated from Brown University in 1848, having taken a high rank there as a writer. After his graduation he studied law in Abraham Lincoln's office in Springfield, Ill., and was admitted to practice in that State in 1861. The young student became Mr. Lincoln's private secretary when the latter became President.

He accompanied Lincoln on his memorable journey from Springfield to Washington, and he held confidential relations with the great war President during that important period in the country's history.

After Lincoln's assassination Mr. Hay was made secretary to the American Minister at Paris, and in 1868 was charged with affairs in Vienna, and later was secretary of legation at Madrid, which post he held about two years, and while occupying it wrote "Castilian Days."

## AGAIN PROMISED.

The Penitentiary Report Asked For By Russell.

Senator Butler's Movements. The Negroes at Fort Macon. Federal Prisoners Inspected. Fusion Prospects. Stanley County Bond Decision.

Raleigh, N. C., August 17.  
Senator Butler contrary to expectations did not stay to attend the Populist Executive committee meeting today, but left yesterday with his wife for an extended trip through Texas up through California, the Yosemite Valley, Denver etc. He will open the campaign in Texas by making a speech at Greenville on the 19th. He will also speak at Denver, Salt Lake City, and other places during his trip.

Governor Russell has at last given word of the continued delay as regards the penitentiary report under the superintendency of John R. Smith, and I has written a letter to Claudius Dockery, chairman of the penitentiary board, asking that the report be sent to him at least to let him know when the report will be ready.

The announcement that the negro regiment stationed at Fort Macon will be among the first troops mustered out of service will be good news to the people all down in the vicinity of the camp for these negroes have become not only a nuisance, but a danger there. They leave camp at their own sweet will apparently, behave disgracefully on trains, and have broken into houses and threatened people in Beaufort and Morehead City. To have them sent to Manila was the ardent wish of the people, but it that is not to be done to strip them of military honors will be the next best thing.

St. Mary's school here, will at its fall session, open a complete business course under the charge of Miss Lizzie Lee who is so well known as a stenographer and type-writer.  
Only nine soldiers remain in the camp hospital here.  
The continued rainy weather is making the cotton people look blue.  
Mr. La Don the inspector of prisoners for the United States was here yesterday to look into the condition of things at the penitentiary. He questioned each of the federal prisoners as to treatment etc. He seemed pleased at his inspection, but of course nothing will be known until he makes his report to the Attorney General. There are only 127 of these United States prisoners here, and only five of them are negroes.

It is announced officially that complete fusion of Populists and Republicans on judges and solicitors, is ordered by the State committees of those parties.  
The Mechanics and Traders Fire insurance company of New Orleans is today licensed to do business in North Carolina.

The decision of Judge Simonton as to the validity of the Stanley county railroad bonds is heard gladly. The ones fighting the payment will take the case to the United States Circuit court of appeals at Richmond and from there on to the United States Supreme court.

Dynamite in Chicago.

Chicago, Aug. 17.—An attempt was made to assassinate John Hill, Jr., the President of the Civic Federation of this city, an organization designed to secure good honest municipal government.  
The attempt was made early this morning by means of a dynamite bomb thrown into the bedroom of the Hill home near Belmont station. The bomb exploded, wrecking almost everything in the room where Hill and his wife were sleeping, but although the destruction was great, both escaped injury. The explosion sent a shower of broken glass over those within and tore out the heavy sash, splintered the front walls of the house, and shattered the furniture. All the residents of the suburb were awakened by the shock of the explosion.
