MAY CALL CONGRESS.

The President Considering the Matter. General Miles Order Troops Returned From Porto Rico.

Special to Journal. Washington, August 25.—It is reported in official circles that the President is considering the advisability of calling an extra session of Congress in October 15th.

Secretary Alger will probably have a thorough investigation of the conduct of the war to enable the department to respond promptly to any inquiry by Congress on the subject as soon as that body assembles. The idea is not to make this investigation in the form of a court-martial or court of inquiry based on charges against any one, but to conduct it with reference to historic accuracy for the purpose of a report, so as to bring out all the facts and let the responsibility for the facts fall where it will.

May Call Congress.

President said to be considering the matter. Troops to return from Porto when not needed.

General Miles has ordered all troops not needed in Porto Rico to return to this country. At Porto preparations are being made for the embarkation of the volunteers and cavalry ordered home. The men are delighted at the prospect.

IMPORTANT MEETING.

Of Railroad Commission Next Week.

Two Men Injured. Election Blanks Sent Out. Russell's Soldiers to be Mustered Out. Rail Road Pay Taxes.

Raleigh, N. C., August 25.

The next meeting of the Railroad Commission will be held August 30th. The commission will hear exceptions by the Raleigh and Gaston Railroad as to the new 2 and 2 1/2 cent passenger rates. The Express Company is to show cause why the penalty of over charge should not be enforced against it for requiring the sender of packages to pay express charges and the 1 cent war tax on the receipt. Commissioner Abbott will take another turn at reducing freight rates. The commission will also hear the sworn statements of the different roads, showing the number of passes issued by them this year to attorney's agents etc. It is claimed that this list when made public (as it will be) will show the names of people in all sorts of conditions of life, from U. S. Senators down. Thus it will be seen that this meeting of the commission next week will be full of interest. Nothing official regarding the pass question can be gotten, but there is often pretty correct guesses made of the conditions of things that are said to be kept secret.

There were two men badly hurt on the Southern railroad here yesterday. One was a brakeman who was found on the side of the track unconscious, and the other was a negro man who is employed in the depot yard. He did not see or hear the shifting engine and it knocked him down and passed over his foot crushing it.

The Liquor Dealers' Association has adjourned and selected Wilmington as the next place of meeting.

The Secretary of State yesterday had the clerk in his office busy sending out election blanks to the clerks of court in the different counties.

The Seaboard Air Line and the Southern Railway paid yesterday into the State treasury their State taxes for 1898. The Seaboard paid \$15,131, and the Southern \$20,414. Treasurer Worth also got the taxes due the State from the sheriff of Swain county which he brought suit for amounting to \$2,318.

Senator John W. Daniel of Virginia will speak at Statesville some time during the campaign.

The requisition on the government for equipments for the State guard are for 500 rifles, for blouses, trousers, hats, caps, leggings, blankets, coats, pouches, etc. for 1,000 men. Also two hospital tents, 30 wall, 400 common and 1000 shelter tents, with complete camp equipment.

It is said now that the negroes at Ft. Mason will be mustered out within 30 days at their place of assignment.

It is denied as to the mustering out of the Second Regiment. Some of the men want to come home, and some want to remain in service even for garrison duty. Lt. Col. Davis is now in Washington looking into the matter. It is said that the officers want to remain in service, but the privates do not. That is not strange, getting no glory and but about \$16 per month is not longed for by the men.

OMNIOUS GROWL.

England Demands a Reply From Russia as to China.

British Minister Gives Russia Until Saturday to Answer. England's Fleet Preparing to Menace. Stand Due to Salisbury's Determination.

Special to Journal. New York, August 25.—News of the gravest kind comes from London this afternoon and is current in the English metropolis.

Before Lord Salisbury, the Prime Minister, left for France he told the Queen that he could not carry on the office of Foreign Affairs in the present state of the relations of England and Russia under the restrictions imposed upon him, unless Her Majesty withdrew her frequently expressed veto upon the prosecution of the present line of diplomacy during her life time, if it led to the point of war with Russia, he as Premier would resign, and that he must be given free hand in the case.

Judging from the action of the ministry, the answer of the Queen must have been yielding.

Proposals were immediately made to Russia by the British ministry giving to Russia an absolutely free hand in Manchuria and the ports and terminus of the great trans-Siberian railroad.

In return for this favor Russia must give her formal recognition of the paramount influence of England in the Yang Tze Kiang Valley with a guarantee of its permanence.

The hitch in this arrangement is over the guarantees, England refuses to accept a mere formal recognition and has instructed the British Minister at St. Petersburg that a satisfactory answer must be forthcoming by Saturday.

Preparations are started for a formidable demonstration of the British fleet in Chinese waters in case Russia fails to return a satisfactory answer to the request of the British Ministry as expressed at St. Petersburg.

The Peace Commission.

WASHINGTON, August 24.—It is the general belief here that the President has determined upon the full membership of the peace commission, and will announce his selection this week.

Senator Davis, chairman of the Senate committee on foreign relations, who will be a member of the commission to negotiate terms of peace with Spain, had a long conference with the President today devoted largely to the great question which the administration will have to settle, the control of the Philippines.

Afterward Senator Davis went to the State Department and saw Secretary Day, who is also to be a member of the peace commission.

These preliminaries will be of great importance, as all the diplomatic questions, the examination of old treaties and the many points involved in the new treaty will have to be thoroughly considered by the commissioners. Senator Davis refused to discuss any of the questions growing out of the war or the subjects which might come before the commission. He would neither express his own views nor discuss the sentiment of the people of his own State or other sections respecting the Philippines.

The Return to Spain.

CORUNNA, Spain, August 24.—The Spanish steamer Alicante, with the first of Spain's surrendered soldiers from Santiago de Cuba, arrived here today.

Enormous crowds gathered on the quays, but were not allowed to get near the vessel for fear of yellow fever contagion. All the military and civil authorities of Corunna were present.

Some of the sick will be taken to the Oza Lazaretto, where they will be quarantined. Others will be kept five days in hospital ships before they are sent to their homes. Those who are in good health will be promptly disembarked.

The Queen Regent sent a message to the troops on the Alicante, congratulating them upon their conduct in the field, and saying that she proposed to be the first to welcome them home. The reading of the dispatch was received with great enthusiasm.

The disembarkation is now in progress. There was no yellow fever on board, though sixty died of other diseases during the voyage.
